

First Baptist Church Enters Education Building Sunday

Sunday, Oct. 11, will be Entrance Day at the First Baptist Church. On that day the church will formally enter its new educational building which will accommodate more than five hundred people in Sunday School.

The two story building, containing 8,400 square feet of floor space, provides adequate and modern departments for people of all ages, according to Dr. E. M. Causey, pastor. Nursery and beginner children are cared for adjacent to the mothers rooms and convenient to the church worship auditorium. Parents will have complete freedom with their small children in taking part in all the services of the church.

Throughout its thirty-five rooms, the building is equipped for the most modern methods of Bible study for boys and girls, young people and adults. Having been planned by the Department of Architecture of the Southern Baptist Convention, the building is estimated to be worth \$65,000 and is said to be the best of its kind in the Klamath Basin.

"At 9:45 a.m. Sunday a faculty of 35 consecrated Christian people will begin what is believed to be a new era in the work of this church which is one of the landmarks of Klamath Falls," said Dr. Causey. "This faculty, together with the other officers and leaders of the church for the new church year, will be publicly installed in their offices at the 11:00 a.m. worship service. At 5:15 p.m. the young people of the church will have charge of the opening exercises of the weekly Baptist Training Union and will present a story of the baptism of some newly converted people and the observance of the Lord's Supper."

Beginning Nov. 1 Bill Bullock of Ranger, Texas, will begin his work with the church as Director of Religious Education and Church Music. Mr. Bullock is well prepared by training and experience for work in both these fields.

Immediate Step-In of FBI Into Kidnap Cases Argued

WASHINGTON (U)—Three members of the Senate Judiciary Committee said today they favor amending federal law to permit the FBI to step immediately into all kidnapping cases—but a fourth member disagreed.

Milani Chicken House Burns

Fire on the Ernest Milani dairy farm on South Washburn Way Thursday afternoon destroyed a chicken house and a stack of baled clover and grain straw.

The fire apparently started along the S. P. right of way adjacent to the farm and spread to the stack of straw estimated at 75 ton.

Suburban, KPFA and Klamath County fire equipment kept the blaze from spreading to other farm buildings.

The chicken house was partially covered by insurance, but none was carried on the straw, according to Mrs. Milani.

However, Sen. Olin D. Johnston (D-Me.) said the law was "deliberately written" as it is and he knew of no need for changing it.

Under the federal anti-kidnaping law, passed in 1932 after the fatal abduction of Charles A. Lindbergh Jr., the FBI cannot officially enter a case for seven days unless it is known the victim was carried across state lines.

The law provides a maximum penalty of death.

It says that failure to release a victim within seven days "shall create a rebuttable presumption that such person has been transported in interstate or foreign commerce."

 LONDON (U)—Prime Minister Churchill traveled Friday to Margate where he will deliver an important policy speech before his Conservative Party's annual conference Saturday.

Kefauver said that, when Congress returns in January, he intends to introduce an amendment to the law. This, he said, would provide for an immediate presumption that interstate commerce is involved in kidnapping, thus calling in the FBI without any waiting period.

Kefauver, who headed a nationwide Senate crime probe two years ago, said he generally favors preservation of state law enforcement rights. But, he said, it is virtually impossible for a kidnapping not to involve interstate commerce.

Aside from this legal angle, Kefauver argued that knowledge the FBI would immediately swing into action would be an additional deterrent to kidnappers—a point also made by Kilgore and Hendrickson in separate interviews.

Both Kefauver and Kilgore said the seven-day waiting period "sort of puts the FBI behind the eight ball."

Johnston, however, observed that the FBI can and does cooperate with state and local police, upon request. Most state kidnapping laws are as tough or tougher than the federal law, he said.

Both Kilgore and Hendrickson advocated giving the FBI authority to tap telephone wires in kidnap cases and to use evidence thus obtained in court.

At present the FBI can tap wires with the permission of the attorney general but such evidence is not admissible in federal courts.

Cotton Grower Vote Certain

WASHINGTON (U)—The government Thursday estimated this year's cotton crop at 15,598,000 bales—a level that will require a vote by growers on whether they want production controls on next year's crop.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson is expected to proclaim marketing quotas on the 1954 crop either Friday or early next week.

The indicated crop, coupled with reserves from past crops, will create a surplus supply under terms of farm law requiring use of production controls, subject to grower approval.

The controls question will be submitted to growers at a referendum to be held in early December. Approval by at least two-thirds of the growers voting would be required to make the controls operative.

A control program would be designed to reduce plantings from about 24,500,000 acres this year to about 17,500,000 unless Congress should change the law before planting time to allow a somewhat larger planting goal.

Quotas were last invoked on cotton in 1950.

Growers already have voted quotas on next year's wheat crop and producers will vote Dec. 15 on quotas for peanuts for the next three crops. Quotas already have been approved for most types of tobacco next year.
