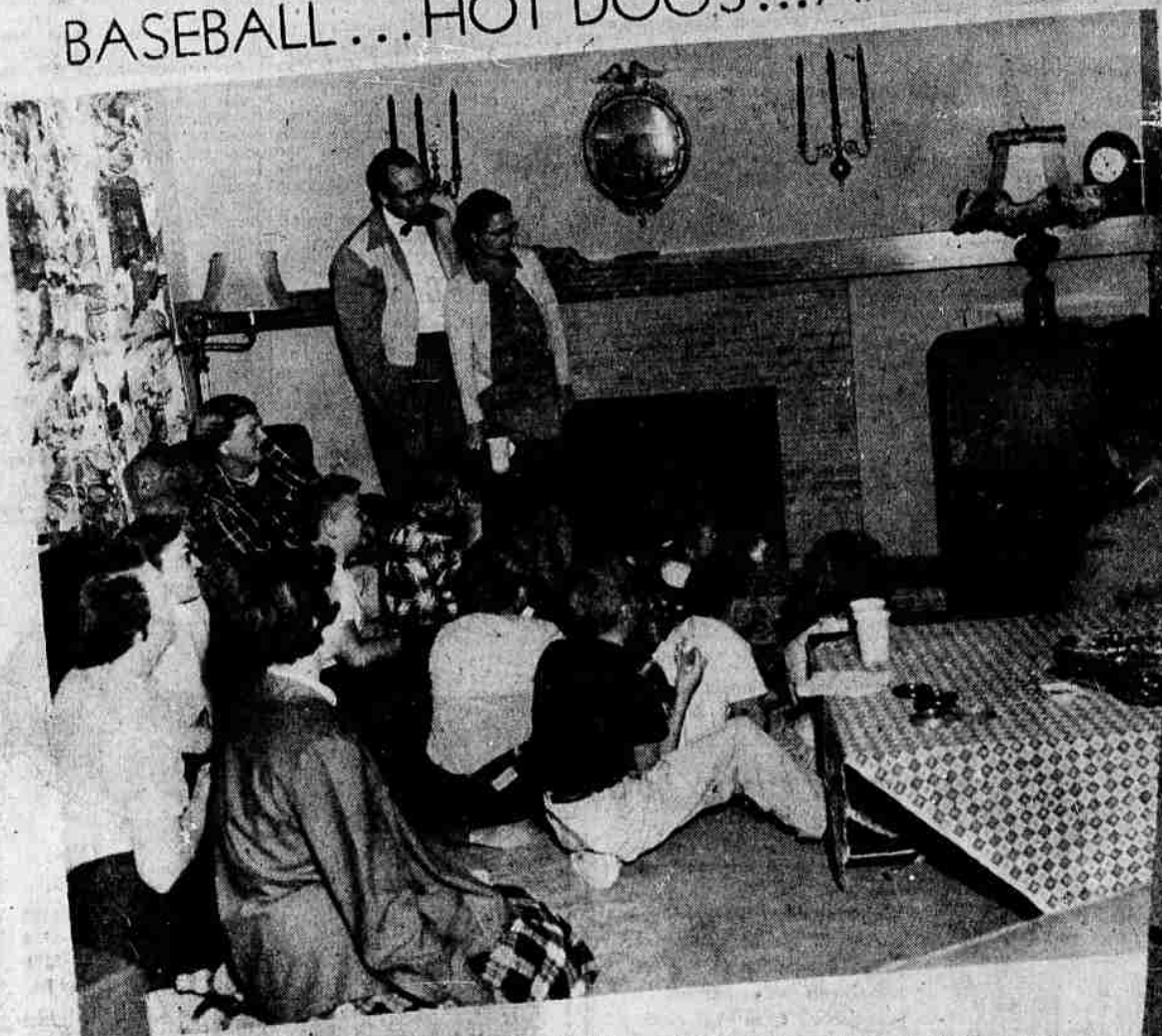

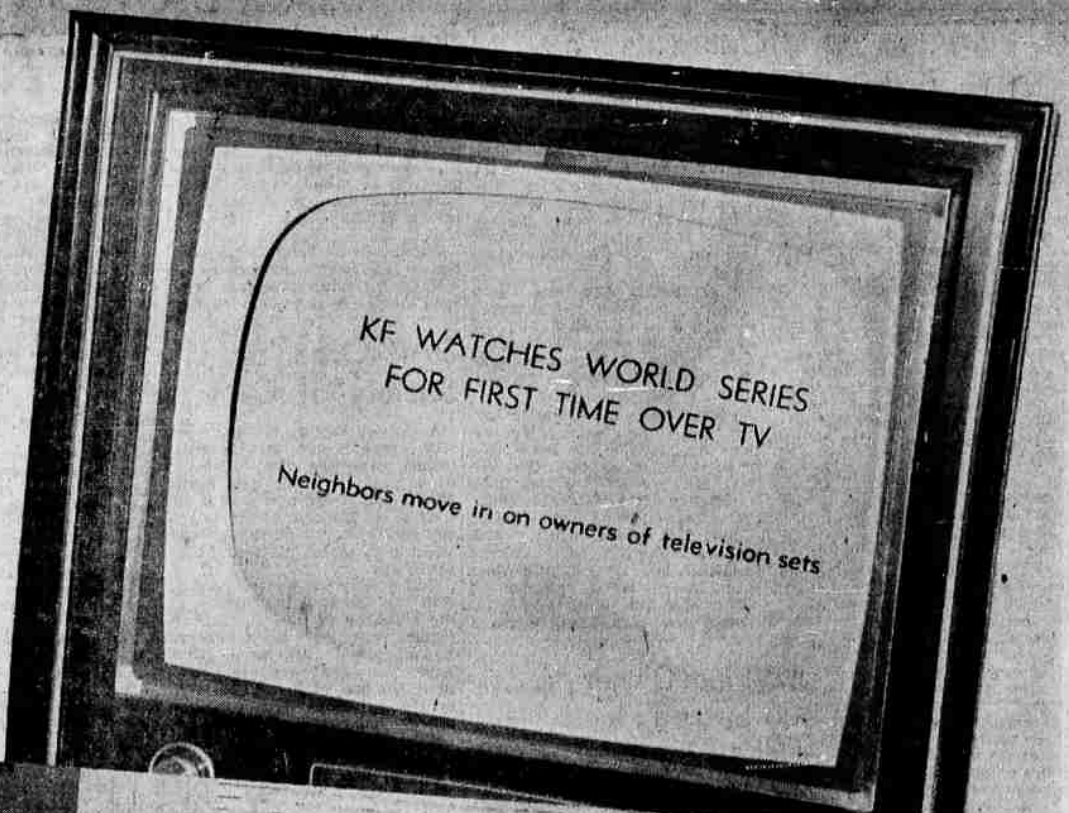
BASEBALL...HOT DOGS...AND TV!!
