

'Triangle' Girl Won't Leave Jail As Long's Lover's In

CHARLOTTE, N. C. (AP)—A comely office employee, being held as a material witness, continued to refuse bond and remained in jail today with her employer, who police say bludgeoned his wife to death.

The husband, Richard Russell, 35-year-old businessman charged with murder, said he knew nothing of his wife's death last Saturday. He told police he saw his wife before he went to sleep and found her body when he awoke.

Russell said that his petite 33-year-old wife was "agreeable" to his plans for a divorce but did not know of his love for Miss Barbara Griggs, 23, who worked in his pest-exterminating supply business.

Held under \$5,000 bond as a material witness, Miss Griggs said she doesn't want to leave the jail where Russell is held without bond. In police headquarters Saturday, Russell put his arms around the sobbing Miss Griggs and said, "I love her better than anything else in the world."

The body was found in the Russell's shop below their apartment. Police said bloodstains on the upstairs bedroom ceiling placed the killing in that room, where Russell maintains he slept, through the night. He said he saw his wife as he retired in their bedroom at 1:30 a. m. Saturday, and found her body in a downstairs storeroom when he awoke about 7 a. m.

The coroner, Dr. M. W. Summerville, said she died about 2 a. m. Police said their investigations led them to believe the husband killed her at that time, dragged the body downstairs, spent the next five hours or so cleaning up evidence, then called police.

The coroner said Mrs. Russell was killed by a blow on the head. The weapon has not been found. She was the former Althea Matilda Schmid of Allentown, Pa., and a funeral home here said the body will be sent to Pennsylvania for burial.

Questioning of Russell, who was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1935, began when police, noting some leaky plumbing, found a pair of his trousers, cut into strips, in waste pipes of his two-story office-apartment on the fringe of the downtown business district. Police quoted him as saying he last saw the pants when he hung them in his bedroom closet a day before the slaying.

Mrs. Russell was slain on the eve of a week's visit by her husband's parents, Dr. and Mrs. E. D. Russell. The father, a retired Ephrata, Pa., physician, stood at the side of his son in the police station the day of the slaying.

Man Held For Armed Robbery

Charles Jackson, 26, is in the Klamath County Jail today on a charge of armed robbery following a stick-up on South Sixth Street about midnight Sunday.

Jackson is alleged to have accosted William J. Jones, about 35 at South Sixth and Altamont Drive, stuck a knife in his back and relieved him of his wallet, containing \$175 to \$200, according to Oregon State Police.

Jackson was picked up later on Broad Street and lodged in jail.

Pair Nabbed In Stolen Car

While conducting a routine road check on Highway 31 near Silver Lake Sunday evening, Oregon State Police nabbed two teenagers in a car reportedly stolen from Reno earlier in the day.

The boys gave their ages as 14 and 15 and stated their home was in El Sobrante, Calif. They were returned here and turned over to juvenile authorities.

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Indians Unsure Of Freer Life

PORTLAND (AP)—Representatives of four Oregon Indian tribes told Indian Commissioner Glenn L. Emmons Sunday they do not favor immediate withdrawal of federal control of their affairs.

Spokesmen for the Umatilla and Warm Springs tribes were critical of the Portland office of Indian Affairs but they said they wanted to remain under government custody.

Wade Crawford, representing the Klamath Tribe, said that group was withholding judgement until technical advisers could tell them how they would fare if custody was terminated.

The Grande Ronde—Siletz representative, Vince Meeker, said the tribe wants money which it has won from the federal government in law suits charging treaty violation. After the money is turned over, "We don't care what you do about termination," he said.

Emmons said he hoped that all the Indians in the nation might eventually be able to operate and manage their own property.
