Illinois Puzzles Mentor

CHICAGO (AP)—Is the Illinois football team really as good as it looked in beating powerful Ohio State 41-20 Saturday? That's something even Illinois Coach Ray Eliot wonders about.

"I just don't know," he mused on returning from the unexpected victory at Columbus. "Maybe that was just a flash in the pan. Maybe we actually have developed into a steady team. How can you tell now?"

Eliot was still shaking his head over the performance of his sophomore-loaded squad.

AMAZED
"We were all simply amazed," he said. "I just didn't know they could do all that. Of course, we had our share of breaks. We recovered four Ohio fumbles—that sort of thing. But the boys were really great."

How does Eliot explain this sudden surge in the heights from the lackluster Illinois showing in being tied by Nebraska 21-21 in their opening game?

"Well, I think we were green against Nebraska. I wish we'd had a game under our belts before we played them. But we've been improving every week, apparently. We beat Stanford (33-21), and I think we were up for Ohio."

"Possibly Ohio State was looking past us to some of their future opponents."

NO EXPLANATION
"But it's hard to say. You just can't explain that sort of an up set."

Then Eliot turned with a frown to the future.
"Talking about upsets, how about Minnesota? My scouts tell me Wes Fessler's guys did a terrific job in knocking over Northwestern (30-13). We've got to play them next Saturday."

"And remember, we're not going to be able to sneak up on anyone after this. Those Gophers look like they found themselves Saturday. I only hope we have."

Freshmen Lose To Medford
The Medford freshman wallowed in Klamath Falls, 32-7, Saturday on Modoc Field.

Medford quarterback McAuliffe spearheaded the Medford attack and proved unstoppable for the Klamath eleven. McAuliffe scored for Medford early in the second quarter as the winners counted once more in the second quarter, once in the third and two more in the fourth.

Lee McGill scored Klamath's only touchdown in the fourth quarter with a 85-yard scoop on a kick-off return.

Body Of Hunter, 72, Found

GATES, Ore. (AP)—The body of Clarence Johnson, 72, missing in the woods near his home here since Oct. 2, was found Saturday.

Johnson, who was in the woods to locate a deer hunting site, apparently was the victim of a heart seizure.

Two Seio men, Earl Daver and Joe Duchaine, who were in the area to inspect timber, found the body.

Seven others have died of heart attacks since the deer season opened Oct. 3. There have been two gun shot deaths and five have been wounded.

Johnson is survived by the widow, a son and two daughters, all of the Gates area.

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Huskies 'Up' With Troy Tie

SEATTLE (AP)—A brand new air of confidence pervaded the Washington campus Monday as the Huskies, who startled the football world Saturday by playing the vaunted Trojans of Southern California to a 13-13 tie, set their sights on next Saturday's brush with Oregon in Portland.

It wasn't a matter of holding the Trojans even. Washington played the invaders off their feet and only two long runs late in the tussle saved USC from a stunning defeat.

FIGURES

Look at the figures: Washington made 12 first downs. Southern Cal got four, all in the second half and one of those from penalties. Mighty Troy could advance the ball only nine net yards in the entire first half and Washington lost more yards from penalties than USC gained by carrying the ball.

One bunch of penalties possibly cost the Huskies the winning touchdown in the second quarter, the period in which they did all their scoring. Chewing up the fearsome Trojan line, Washington made it first down on the USC 8. Then Stewart Crook, workhorse of the Husky backfield, plowed to the 4 but an offside penalty nullified the gain.

PENALTY
Sophomore Bob McNamee hit for seven but Washington drew a 15-yard penalty, and then another to leave the count at fourth down and 45 yards to go. All the team could do was punt.

Washington drove 65 yards for the game's first tally, chewing up the USC line with short gainers. Jack Kyllingstad plowed over from the 2, but the try for the extra point was deflected and hit the crossbar. Less than two minutes later McNamee hopped on a Trojan fumble at Southern Cal's 13 and five plays later Sandy Lederman sneaked over from the 2. Bobby Dunn kicked the extra point.

Ten of 14 Not Enough

TAMPA, Fla. (AP)—Quarterback Raymond Ygual of Our Lady of Perpetual Help completed 10 of 14 passes in a 19-12 loss to Largo last week. All of the completions were to end Jesse Rogers.

The pair might have done better but Ygual was pitching a wet ball in a steady drizzle and Rogers was playing with a heavily taped broken hand.

UCLA-Stanford Tilt Tops Coast Schedule

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Pacific Coast Conference teams battle it out this weekend in football encounters headlined by the clash between title contenders, UCLA and Stanford at Palo Alto.

Each has won two conference games and is undefeated and untied in the league. California, only other club in the conference with no losses or draws, has won once in league play.

UCLA will lay a more imposing record on the line than Stanford.

Rookie Leads Cougars

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—A 19-year-old rookie fullback, playing his first full game as a member of the Washington State varsity squad, provided the spark that carried the Cougars to a 7-0 football win over Oregon in Saturday's homecoming game here.

Vaughn Hitchcock, 190-pound sophomore from Hayward, Calif., reeled off 27 yards in the day's longest gain on the ground, in an 83-yard Cougar touchdown drive in the second quarter, and batted down an Oregon pass that might have provided the equalizer in the fourth quarter.

SOPHOMORES
Hitchcock was one of several sophomores Coach A. Kircher promoted to the first string after WSC's 54-12 defeat at Iowa a week earlier. The rookies ran well, penetrating deep into Oregon territory in the third and fourth quarters but couldn't muster the punch to cross the Ducks' goal line.

Oregon's main threat came in the first period. The Ducks moved 68 yards downfield but George Shaw's fourth down pass on the 17 was knocked down by the Cougars.

BOGGED DOWN
Another Oregon drive in the closing minutes of the fourth quarter went 40 yards but bogged down on the WSC 42 after Hitchcock batted down a Shaw pass, and Shaw was smothered when he tried to get away another.

Shaw was outstanding for the Ducks. He completed 13 of 27 attempted passes for 163 yards through the air.



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Rasslers Lose To Ramblers

TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—The rasslers turned their talents to football Sunday but didn't know enough holds to stave off a 20-6 defeat by the Seattle Ramblers in the "Muscle Bowl" played for charity before 7,256 delighted fans.

The approximate \$10,000 gate went to Tacoma Boys Clubs, with the two teams collecting only a free meal following the tussle.

Two ex-pro footballers, Luther Lindsey and Frank Stojack, got in nearly the full hour and Lindsey was the team's defensive star. Also in the action were such worthies as The Ram, the Masked Marvel and Ivan Kamaroff.

Mrs. McCormick, 23, was dashed against the rocks along Marine Stadium when the speedboat towing her made a sharp turn.

Thirty-four stitches were necessary to close the wounds.

Cal, Illinois Lead Upset Binge

NEW YORK (AP)—The college football season isn't even half over but it already looks like most of the coaches who predicted dire things as a result of the one-plate system were right.

The men weren't the least bit happy when the NCAA outlawed the two-plate setup. Many said they wouldn't be able to cope with the new system.

The results after three weeks seem to bear them out. There always are upsets, but some of the scores are inexplicable, like California's 40-0 massacre of Penn and Illinois' 41-20 shelling of Ohio State Saturday.

HEADACHES

From the very first day of the season when Mississippi Southern trounced Alabama, the big name coaches have been holding their heads. Georgia Tech, until it whipped Tulane, 27-13, Saturday, had scored exactly one touchdown in two previous games. Oklahoma, until it whipped Texas, 19-14, had not won a game.

Musclemen like Michigan State, Michigan, Southern California, Baylor and Duke all had their troubles. All Southern Cal, rated the co-favorite for the Pacific Coast Conference title, could do was tie Washington 13-13 on a 70-yard return and a 78-yard pass interception.

SUBSTITUTE

Michigan State, rated right behind Notre Dame in the national rankings, had to call on substitute back Evan Slonic to score the tying touchdown, then go on to beat Texas Christian 26-19. Michigan beat Iowa 14-13 on sophomore Lou Baldacci's conversion. Baylor edged Arkansas 14-7 in the last three minutes, and Duke beat Purdue 20-14, notching the winning touchdown just 39 seconds before the end.

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon State Beavers took their fourth straight Pacific Coast Conference loss Saturday and for the fourth time this season failed to cross the enemy goal line.

The undefeated Stanford Indians, scoring twice in the first period and once in the third, coasted to a 21-0 victory over the Beavers for their second straight Conference triumph.

THREATEN
The Beavers threatened twice but both drives collapsed before the defense set up by the Indians. In the second period, OSC intercepted a Stanford pass on the visitors 35 and moved the ball to the 14 before the Indian defense applied the brakes. In the final period, the Beavers recovered a Stanford fumble—one of four logged against the Indians—on the Stanford 37, and drove to the 6 before they were stopped.

76 YARDS
Stanford's first tally came when the game was 4 1/2 minutes old, halfback Ron Cook racing 76 yards through the middle to a touchdown. Quarterback Bob Garrett passed 20 yards to end John Steinberg for another Stanford tally in that period. The final touchdown came at the start of the second half and culminated a 75-yard drive downfield.

STYMIED
The 49ers found themselves stymied through the last 22 minutes after losing their ace quarterback, Y. A. Tittle, who fractured a cheekbone scoring the West Coast eleven's final touchdown in the third quarter.

Jack Scarbath, All-America from Maryland, was the big gun in the Redskins victory. Two passes, covering a total of 88 yards, gave them their touchdown and Bill Dudley booted the remaining points. Jimmy Finks completed 23 of 44 passes, two for touchdowns, but the Steelers needed Nick Bollock's 28-yard last period field goal to beat the Cards.

Passing also played a big role in the victories of Baltimore and Los Angeles. The Colts' Fred Enke completed 14 out of 31 for 236 yards and two touchdowns while Norm Van Brocklin and rookie Rudy Bukich rattled the Packers' defense with accurate aerials.

After enjoying a day off Saturday, Notre Dame plays Pitt this week. Michigan State continues its quest for the Big Ten title against Indiana, which isn't figured to offer much opposition.

Ohio State and Penn, the two victims, play each other.

The fact that California—reputedly a sub-par outfit this year—beat Penn was not what amazed the experts. It was the way Pappy Waldorf's lads put the Quakers through the meat grinder. Unless it was a fluke, UCLA and Southern Cal may have some competition for the POC title.

NEW YORK (AP)—Could Commissioner Bert Bell have been thinking only of one half of the National Football League when he made the prediction that every team in the circuit would be stronger and in the thick of the pennant fight?

Here it is the third week of the league's 84th season, and three clubs in the Eastern Conference—Philadelphia, Chicago's Cardinals and New York—have not won a game. The Eagles of Philadelphia do have one tie.

By contrast the Western Conference has only one winless team—the Green Bay Packers.

LEAD
The standings after one game Saturday and five yesterday show the champion Detroit Lions leading the Western division with three victories in as many starts. But the San Francisco 49ers, Baltimore Colts and the Los Angeles Rams are only a game back, each with 2 and 1 records.

In the Eastern Conference the Cleveland Browns hold their usual place at the top but the surprising Washington Redskins also have a perfect record. However, the Redskins have one less victory, having been tied by the Eagles. Pittsburgh's Steelers trailed by a game.

LIONS WIN
The Lions took over the undputed lead of their division yesterday by edging the 49ers 14-12. Baltimore and Los Angeles remained in strong contention with respective 15-14 and 13-20 victories over the Chicago Bears and Green Bay.

Cleveland sat out yesterday after beating the Eagles 37-13 in a Saturday night contest. The Redskins turned in their second triumph in a Sunday affair, edging the Giants 19-9 and Pittsburgh scored 17 points in the last quarter for a 31-28 conquest of the Chicago Cardinals.

The winning touchdown in yesterday's Detroit-San Francisco thriller came in the third period on a 49-yard pass from Bobby Layne to Leon Hart. Donk Walker passed to Cloyce Box for another TD and picked up seven points with his toe, including a 25-yard field goal.
