

Italian Bread Great For Teeth

NEW YORK (AP) — Eating tough foods like Italian bread was recommended Tuesday to cut down on tooth decay.

But Tuesday a physician and dentist reported experimental evidence that chewing makes teeth more chemically resistant to decay.

The story is given by Dr. H. H. Newman, physician, and Dr. Nicholas di Salvo in an exhibit at two-day ceremonies marking the 20th anniversary of Columbia University-Presbyterian Medical Center.

Monkeys were forced by surgery to chew foods only on one side of their mouths. Tests using radioactive phosphorus showed a greater turn-over of phosphorus in the teeth which did the work. This could mean better chemical make-up to resist decay in exercised teeth.

Their exhibit says some of the world's worst fed people have the best teeth, while many people getting vitamins and balanced diets have decay. Toothbrushes have only limited usefulness in preventing decay, heredity has little effect, while fluorides in drinking water may be helpful, they added. They theorize that teeth, like muscles, need exercise to avoid becoming weak.

Egypt Has First Hanging

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Egypt Tuesday hanged the first of its citizens convicted in the current series of trials of persons charged with treason and plotting with a foreign power to undermine the Egyptian state.

The condemned man was Mahmoud Sabry Aly, formerly employed by the British armed forces. The revolutionary court had found him guilty of spying for foreign interests during and before 1952, and of arresting and torturing Egyptian patriots "to extract confessions harmful to the country's safety." The foreign power was never identified publicly.

TOKYO (AP) — A five-man group headed by Junichiro Kobayashi, president of the Alaska Pulp Co. Ltd. of Tokyo, will leave Nov. 4 for Sitka, Alaska, to make preparations for establishing a U. S. Japan corporation there, Kyodo News Agency said Tuesday.

U. S., Greece Sign Base Pact

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Hess (R-Ohio) said Tuesday on his return from a trip to Europe that agreement between this government and Spain for U. S. naval and air bases in that country "may well mark Communism's last forward movement."

Hess, calling the agreement "one of the most important steps in the forging of our defense set up," made no mention of a new agreement signed Monday with Greece. Presumably his statement was prepared in advance of the announcement of that pact.

This agreement is similar to others which this country has signed with various North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) members. Spain is not a NATO member.

Watchers Of Watchmen Get Dias In First

HONG KONG (AP) — Maybe they should have had watchmen to watch the watchmen who were watching the watchmen.

The British Army hired Chinese guards to watch over some tarpaulins in a compound. It then assigned two privates — John Henderson, 20, of North Ireland, and Peter Downs, 19, of Glasgow, Scotland — to watch the watchmen. The privates sent the Chinese off on a fake errand. When the Chinese returned, 27 tarpaulins were gone. One of the Chinese spotted a truck leaving the compound. Tracing of the truck led to the conviction of the two privates in court Tuesday. They were sentenced to six months at hard labor.

Hunter Shows Woman There's Bears In Woods

SQUAW CREEK CANYON, Calif. (AP) — Hunter W. S. Lloyd swears it happened.

A woman walked up to him yesterday in the woods, he said, and asked: "My husband's trying to hunt bear, but there aren't any around here, are there?" Suddenly a piece of redwood bark fell to the ground. Lloyd looked up and fired. A 250-pound black bear tumbled out of the tree and dropped at the woman's feet.

Hadn't Counted His Money Lately

BOSTON (AP) — Police today had in custody a man they said tried to steal a \$25 topcoat from a department store — although he had \$11,000 in cash in his wallet.

Police said Chester Sargent, 60, expressed surprise when told how much he had in his wallet, saying he thought there was about \$5,000 but wasn't sure as "I hadn't counted it for some time." His landlady told police she reduced his \$4 weekly rent a quarter after he pleaded poverty. His record shows he was sentenced to three years in prison 23 years ago as a common and notorious thief.

Vandenberg Absent Until Oct. 23

Judge David R. Vandenberg has been summoned to reside in Portland on the circuit bench until Oct. 23.

In the meantime, U. S. District Judge James Alger Fee is holding Federal Court in the Circuit Court room in Klamath County Court House.

When he returns from Portland, Judge Vandenberg is expected to rule in the case of Dawn Starr, Oklahoma night club dancer, charged with issuing a bogus check. Miss Starr is alleged to have given the check to a Klamath Falls barber in payment for shaving her legs.

Defense Counsel Ben Goddard filed a demurrer to the indictment against Miss Starr, claiming it did not state a crime and was defective in other respects. The judge took the matter under advisement.

Youth Knives Chief's Tires

BERNALILLO, N. M. (AP) — Eighteen-year-old Steve Trujillo aimed his razor-sharp homemade knife at the wrong set of automobile tires, on the wrong car.

He is now serving a 25-day jail sentence on charges of drunkenness, possession of a deadly weapon and destruction of private property.

The tires were the private property of Eulogio Silva, Bernalillo police chief.

COLOMBO, Ceylon (AP) — Ceylon's new prime minister, Sir John Kotelawala, held on to his old post as transport minister and took over the defense and foreign ministries in the new cabinet he named Tuesday. Sir John succeeds Douglas Senanayake, who resigned as prime minister Monday because of ill health.
