Red Explanations Deferred Indefinitely After Walkout

PANMUNJOM (U) — The delay-riddle Communist efforts to win 22,400 ex-Red soldiers home to communism halted indefinitely today after the Reds were turned down flat on demands that the POWs be dragged to the explanations by force if necessary.

Stung by the rebuff from India, Switzerland and Sweden, the satellite Polish and Czech delegates on the Neutral Nations Repatriation Commission (NNRC) walked out yesterday and gave no indication when they would return. They did not show up for today's NNRC meeting.

The explanations apparently were postponed indefinitely — at least until the NNRC can get operating again.

Observers speculated that the Red walkout could be a prelude to dropping their persuasion efforts entirely in an attempt to avoid more of a propaganda whipping than they have already taken in two days of interviews.

Only 19 of 921 Chinese who heard the Red pleas to return home chose the door of communism. The others refused—most of them with raucous, violent denunciations of the Reds.

Despite the lopsided results, the interviews with the 7,800 Chinese POWs had been proceeding smoothly, but the 14,600 Koreans completely stopped the show with a belligerent refusal to even listen to the Red persuaders.

In the repatriation commission Monday, the Polish and Czech members pressed the Red demands that the Koreans be brought to the interviews by any means necessary.

Outvoted by the other three members, they left, stopping all action by the NNRC.

At Bern, the Swiss government made public orders to its NNRC delegate to try to avoid the use of force against prisoners "under all circumstances."

The new delay left the Reds facing a rapidly narrowing time for talking. Under the truce terms, the interviews must end late in December—Dec. 23 by Allied in-

Children of the Roy Farnums are Ryan, who is in the first grade, and two pre-school children, Pamela and Douglas.

The Duke Goodies, whose house the Stevensons are occupying, have moved to an apartment in the home of Mrs. Fern Gordon.

Chief Idaho Power Engineer Testifies On 3-Dam Plan

WASHINGTON (U) — An Idaho Power Co. engineer said Monday reservoirs underlying the Snake River plain will yield water for irrigation in Idaho "for a long time."

Testifying at a Power Commission hearing on Idaho Power's application to build three dams in the river between Idaho and Oregon, Robert A. Hogg predicted a steady irrigation growth in the area and said he could foresee no depletion in underground reservoirs.

He said the reservoirs would be "recharged" annually by 1,600,000 acre feet of water, enough to irrigate 800,000 acres. By 1977, he estimated, irrigation acreage along the Snake would be increased by 225,000 acres by pumping and more than 500,000 acres through use of surface water.

John Mason, commission attorney, questioned Hogg on details in his three-year study of the effects on further irrigation of stream flows and power development along the river.

Hogg has testified that Idaho Power's three proposed dams which would store one million acre feet of water, and would be the largest economically feasible projects in the middle reach of the river.

The federal Hells Canyon Dam, which also has been proposed in the area, would impound more than three million acre feet of water.

Absentia Trial Motion Denied

NOVARA, Italy (U) — An Italian judge Monday rejected a move to dismiss charges against two Americans, accused with three Italians of the war-time slaying of their superior officer, Maj. William Holohan.

Pietro Choivenda, court-appointed defense attorney, asked for dismissal at the opening session of the trial. He contended an Italian court has no jurisdiction over an American soldier for an alleged crime on Italian soil occupied by an enemy army.

Court President Francesco Sicher overruled the motion, saying the international law which the defense attorney cited did "not apply to common crimes."

The Americans, being tried in absentia, are ex-Lieut. Aldo Icardi of Pittsburgh, Pa., and former Sgt. Carl Lo Dolce of Rochester, N.Y.

The government accuses Icardi of planning the murder of the New York City major behind Nazi lines in northern Italy in 1944. Lo Dolce is accused of firing the fatal shots after an earlier attempt to poison Holohan failed.

Italy asked extradition of the two Americans to stand trial, but U.S. courts ruled that they could not be extradited.

A house armed services subcommittee which investigated the slaying also ruled that there was no legal way to prosecute them in United States.

The Italian defendants, were fighting as partisans in North Italy at the time, and are charged with participating in Holohan's murder.

Holohan, Icardi and Lo Dolce parachuted behind Nazi lines to arrange supplies for partisan groups in North Italy. The government charges that a dispute arose among the men as to how the supplies should be distributed.

US Gets Tough With Israel

WASHINGTON (U) — The United States has notified Israel it will withhold American financial aid until the Israeli government stops trying to divert waters of the Jordan River along the Syrian border.

Informed officials who reported this Monday said the State Department regards Israel's Jordan River project as a violation of United Nations armistice in the Israeli-Arab war.

The notice of intent to suspend American grant aid was given about two weeks ago. The Israeli government apparently is ignoring American protests. Latest reports indicate the work force on the project has been almost doubled and floodlights have been brought up to permit night work.

The United States gave Israel about \$5 million dollars in economic aid last year as part of a comprehensive plan to better living conditions in the Middle East.

The specific amount Israel was to get from this year's fund has not been determined yet. Congress provided a total of 225 million dollars for the Middle East region in this year's foreign aid bill.

The Israeli attack on three Jordan villages last Wednesday has further angered State Department officials and may result in an extension of the ban on aid to Israel until this problem has been settled, too.

Yugo-Italy Talks Sought

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (U) — Yugoslavs were puzzled Monday over the latest Big Three pronouncement on the explosive Trieste dispute; but their leaders stood fast in their threat to march in if Italian troops move into Zone A.

There still was no official comment on the West's invitation to Yugoslavia and Italy to meet with the United States, Britain and France to discuss the burning Trieste question.

Yugoslavia's chief U.N. delegate Leo Matas said Sunday in Washington he thought his government might be inclined to accept. But President Tito and other speakers already have declared they feel such a meeting would be of no use if Britain and the United States held in advance to their decision to pull out of Zone A of Trieste and turn it over to Italian administration.
