CHICAGO 18—Grains had a slightly easier tendency on the board of trade Tuesday after an early attempt to extend the previous session's rally died almost as soon as it got started.

Price changes were small in all pits with soybeans showing a slightly firmer tone than anything else while wheat was slightly easier. Beans responded rather lamely to a sharp boost in soybean oil, quoted at 13 1/2 cents a pound against 13 1/4 cents Monday.

Wheat showed the lack of any stimulating news, a fact which brought the depressing world wide grain surplus back into the picture. There was also some disappointment over the fact West Germany bought some wheat from Canada overnight and none from the United States.

Wheat closed 1/2 lower to 1/4 higher, Dec 1.94-1.94 1/2, corn unchanged to 1/2 higher, Dec 1.43 1/2, oats 1/4 lower to 3/4 higher, Dec 76 1/2, soybeans unchanged to 1/2 higher, Nov 2.73 1/2, and laid unchanged to 58 cents a hundred pounds higher, Oct 17.65.
