

Rezoning Arguments Heard; Council Postpones Action

City Council Monday night postponed action on the proposed rezoning of a portion of Main from canal to the intersection of Main and Martin after a hearing on the pros and cons of the plan.

In opposition to the rezoning, Clarence Humble presented petitions to the Council signed by property owners in the area. Humble said it was not to expect property investors to office for the sake of one or two individuals who would profit by a rezoning or by sale of property in a business area.

Minimum Wage Talked

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Eisenhower administration was reported to be seriously considering asking Congress to increase the present 75-cent-an-hour minimum wage.

Former Secretary of Labor Martin P. Durkin had decided before resigning last month to ask the House to raise the minimum to \$1.00.

Durkin's successor, James P. Mitchell, is now putting finishing touches on all the department's legislative proposals. Responsible agencies, both on Capitol Hill and in the Labor Department, said they expect Mitchell will give full support to a higher minimum wage and that the odds are in favor of White House endorsement.

Wheelchaired Hunter Fights Off, Kills Bear

YUBA CITY, Calif. (AP) — A cripple confined to a wheel chair for 15 years yesterday related how he killed a 225-pound black bear in northern California's Sequoia National Forest.

Armit, 50, was seated in his wheelchair on a hillside when he spotted a bear 60 feet away. He fired his last shell and hit the bear in the hind leg.

"He got up and came at me again. When he got about a foot away, I poked him off with the barrel of my gun. The bear kept spitting all over me. I circled him. I threw a couple of rocks at him."

Armit said he managed to get the bear down the hill. "When he came in close, I let him have it between the eyes. He was pretty dead then."

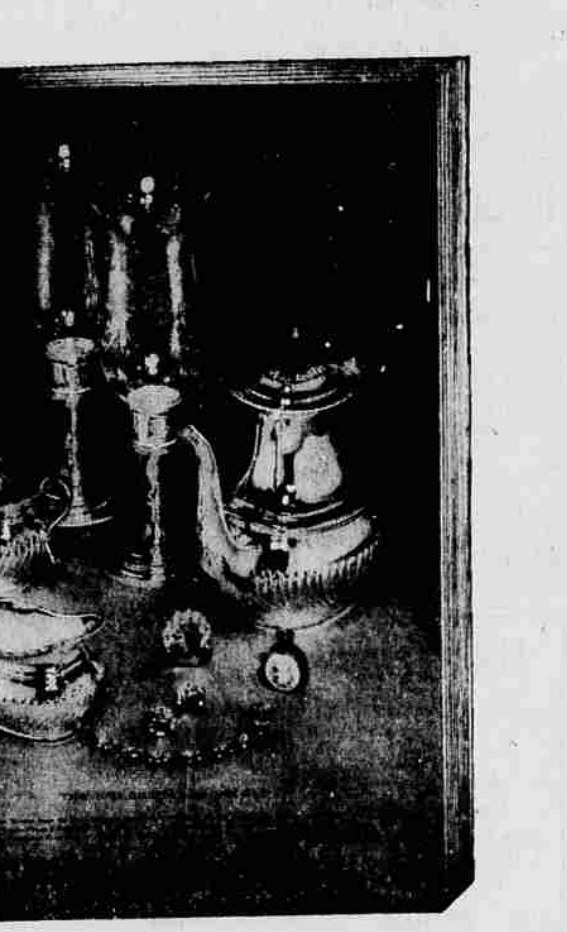
