US POW Who Changed Mind 'Had Enough'

SEOUL (AP) - An American war prisoner who quit the Communists and was returned to the U. N. Command today told a news conference, "I had enough of their life."

Cpl. Edward S. Dickenson, 25, of Big Stone Gap, Va., refused to answer almost every controversial question about why he first elected to stay with the Reds.

"I did not want to stay with the Communists any more," he said when asked why he had changed his mind.

Dickenson was among 23 American war prisoners who originally refused repatriation.

Film Censorship Loosening, Producer Haas Claims

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - The film industry's censorship code has loosened up, film maker Hugo Haas said today.

Haas is a fairly lucrative career of playing what he calls accent parts in Hollywood movies. He scraped together his savings and financed, wrote, directed produced "Pickup." The picture was a success, and he has made six one-man productions since then. He starts his seventh soon.

The Haas films generally deal with basic human situations such as the eternal triangle. He has thus come to grips many times with the Breen office, the industry's self-censorship body headed enough, he is a fan of the office.

"They have been very considerate and helpful," he remarked. "I argue with them that my pictures cannot have the big stars and production of major studios, so I must have some other asset to offer the public. That is often sex."

"The Breen office understands my problem. They give in a little and I give in a little. On my last picture, 'Ball,' we went around for three days on the scene where Cleo Moore gets out of the bathtub and into a nightgown. We argued over the shot frame by frame and finally arrived at a compromise."

Haas observed that the code has loosened up in the past year or so. He cited "From Hero to Eternity" as evidence of that. He said "The Moon Is Blue," which did not receive the code's approval, was a fluke.

"That involved a successful stage play that was transplanted almost intact to the movies," he said. "The controversy was over the use of certain words, without which the picture would not have been as effective."

Haas feels the code should be loosened up some more.

"I think it should be changed in regard to punishment," he said. "The ending of a Hollywood picture is always prearranged. The bad must die or be punished and the good must triumph. There can be no suspense or no surprise about what is going to happen."

"But life is not like that. The bad very often are not punished, and the good can suffer. Why can't we make movies that are true to life?"

Town Waits To Be Gassed

HORSE CAVE, Ky. (AP) - This area is gripped in one of the worst droughts in its history, but nobody prays for rain here. It could turn the community's biggest problem into a killer.

Officials have been seeking a solution for four years, but who wants 45,000 gallons of arsenic trichloride?

The chemicals, stored in large tanks along the Louisville & Nashville Railroad, were left behind after the Shaw Oil Co. closed its offices.

There were no complaints until last summer when leakage from one tank killed vegetation in an area almost a mile wide. Startled residents in this community of 1,545 were told that moisture reacts on the chemicals by producing hydrochloric acid fumes and a worse byproduct, arsenic oxide.

The city tried to get rid of it but could find no agency to do the job. It even tried the Defense Department.

Only July 9, the County Health Board issued an ultimatum to the railroad and the oil company to get rid of the chemicals within six days. Nothing happened.

Both were indicted later on charges of maintaining a common nuisance but that was no help since the case is yet to be tried.

"We don't know what to do," says Mayor L. H. Vensel. "We've been safe enough in this dry weather, but we don't know what will happen if it ever rains."
