## Utah Gets 5-10 Inches Of Snow

OGDEN, Utah (AP)—Winds and heavy snows grew through Utah yesterday.

The fast-melting snow, in southern Utah, ranged from 5 to 10 inches deep, and the winds, rolling down the western slopes of the Wasatch Mountains, produced gusts measured at 85 miles an hour in at least one northern Utah spot.

## Suspended Sentence Unsuspended Quick

HAGERSTOWN, Md. (AP)—Joseph D. Swope, convicted last March of collecting money under false pretenses and given a suspended sentence, was brought into Circuit Court again yesterday.

He was charged with representing himself as a preacher and collecting money for a church broadcast.

After parole officer Frank L. George testified, Swope took a poke at him. George floored Swope with a hard right uppercut.

Handcuffed and held by deputies, Swope was given his original sentence of three years in the house of correction.

## J. R. Taylor Dies Of Injury

Injuries suffered Oct. 5, in an accident at his Lakeview ranch, proved fatal Oct. 21 to J.R. (Raymond) Taylor, 31, resident of this area since 1907.

Mr. Taylor died in an Oakland hospital without regaining consciousness. He was flown by ambulance plane to the Bay Area the day before his death.

He was cutting calves at the time a horse fell and rolled over him, inflicting serious head and spine injuries.

Mr. Taylor was the son of Mrs. John Taylor and the late Mr. Taylor, residents of Merrill since 1907, where Mrs. Taylor still lives.

He was married in the fall of 1927 to Josephine Honig, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Honig, pioneers of Malin. The family lived on one of the first homesteads opened to settlement on the Westside of Tulelake for 23 years, selling the ranch property three years ago to move to Lakeview where they purchased extensive ranch holdings known as the Mulkey properties.

Survivors include his widow Josephine, three sons, John Boyd, 24, with the U.S. Air Force engineers in Korea who was flown to his father's bedside; Warren, 22, and Duane, nine-years-old, all of Lakeview; his mother, Mrs. Taylor, Merrill; three sisters, Mrs. Bee Anderson, Merrill, Mrs. William Hanson, Washington D.C., and Mrs. Aubrey Fleming, Henley.

Funeral services will be held Monday morning, Oct. 26, in the Presbyterian Church, Lakeview, with final rites and commitment in the IOOF cemetery, Merrill.

## October Heat Wave Breaks

Drought-relieving rain hit wide areas in the Southern Plains and Texas Panhandle Friday as cooler air moved into the central part of the country, breaking an October heat wave.

Heaviest rainfalls in three years fell in the Texas Plains Thursday and rain continued during the day in the Southern Plains and parts of the state. Falls measured up to 8 1/2 inches in some areas of the drought-stricken country near Lubbock and Matador.

Heavy falls also were reported in Northern Texas and in Southwestern Oklahoma. The wet belt extended to Northern Illinois and the Northern Great Lakes region.

The deluge in some Texas areas closed highways, disrupted communications and forced some families to evacuate their homes.

The leading edge of the cool air mass reached Chicago during the night and moved eastward. Chicago's 87 above Thursday was one of the nation's highest readings and marked the eighth straight day of 80 or above.

Showers fell Friday along the Southern New England and Middle Atlantic Coast and the upper Mississippi Valley and Northern Great Lakes region.

Light rain fell in sections of the central and southern Rockies and the Far Southwest with snow in the mountain areas. Fair skies were reported along the Pacific Coast, in the Northwest and in most northern areas east of the Mississippi River.
