

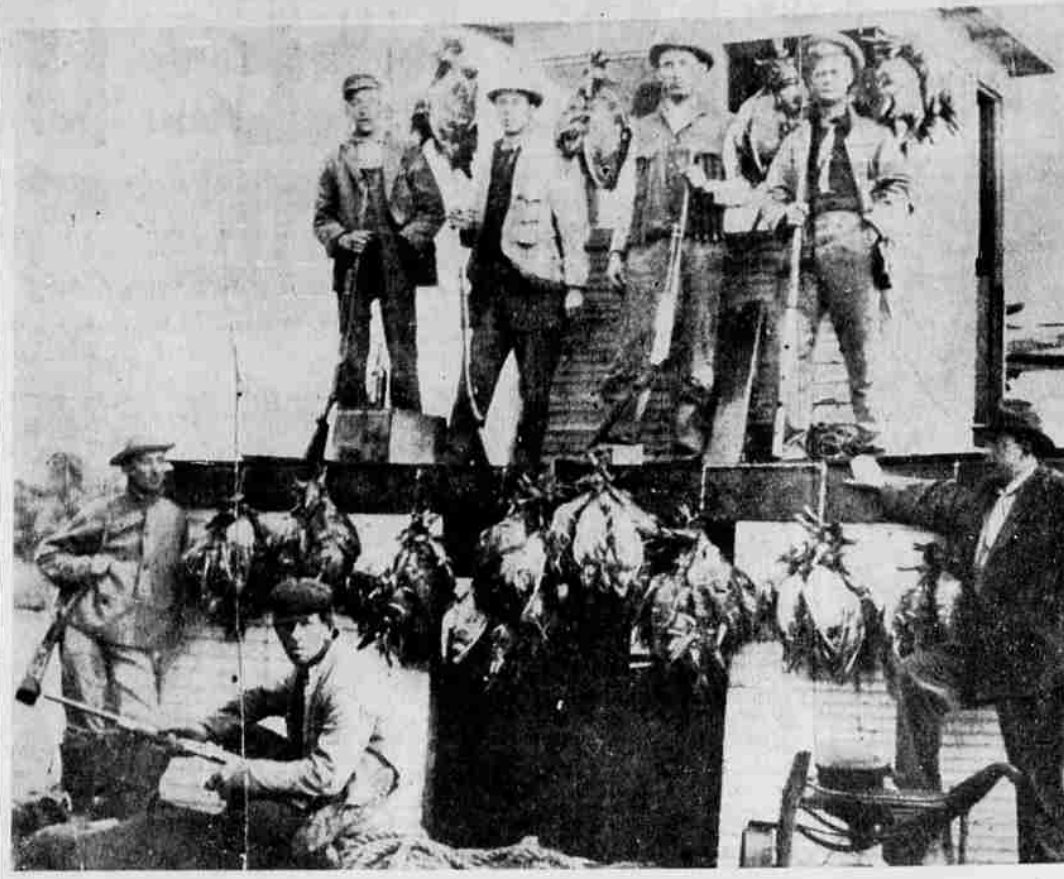

The Groaner To Take Big Plunge Into Television

 HOLLYWOOD — The Groaner is going to take the big plunge into television. One of the last big entertainers Crosby has finally consented to grace the home screen with a show of his own. But he'll make only two programs this season, according to present plans.

"Will he ever do a weekly or monthly show?" "Not on your life!" he scoffed. "Not unless they fire me! Paramount!"

The crooner disclosed his plans on the set of "White Christmas," the Irving Berlin Musical he's doing with Danny Kaye (another TV holdout), Rosemary Clooney and Vera Ellen. As soon as he's through with the film, he'll go to work on the TV show. One is due for telecasting Dec. 27, the other next week.

His present radio sponsor (General Electric) has first call on his TV services.

"We'll shoot the films with our own outfit, Bing Crosby Productions, at Hal Roach studios," he reported. "Or we might have it done by Desilu (the Desi Arnaz Lucille Ball company)."

"The show will be like a musical short. We'll pre-record the music and shoot one half-hour show in a day. If we take any longer than a day we can't make any profit from the show. I don't think we'll have much trouble. I'm pretty good at singing to a play-back. We ought to be able to knock off a song an hour."

Crosby referred to the method of filming musical numbers that is employed in the movies. Live songs are recorded beforehand. Then the record is played back on the movie set while the singer coordinates his lip movements to the sound. Thus the singer can concentrate on his visual aspect without worrying about the quality of the music, which is already assured.

Bing has made three TV appearances in the past. He and Bob Hope conducted a cross-country

Closing Indian Hospital Talked

WARM SPRINGS, Ore. (AP) — Problems connected with plans to close the 20-bed Warm Springs Indian Reservation hospital were discussed at a meeting here Thursday.

Among those attending were medical representatives of the Indian Affairs Bureau at Portland, Central Oregon county officials and Indian spokesmen.

Bureau representatives said better medical care for Indians could be provided more cheaply at Redmond and Prineville hospitals. They said it is becoming more and more difficult to staff the reservation hospital.

Dr. J. J. Dentman, for years the physician at the hospital, is retiring and no replacement is in sight, they said, although a doctor will be sent here to handle outpatient service. It is planned to assign bed patients to a government hospital at Tacoma or to hospitals in nearby communities.

No date for closure of the hospital has been set but Indian Bureau spokesmen said lack of funds would make it impossible to continue operation of the reservation hospital on the past basis.

"They suggested that the hospital might be taken over by Jefferson County or a combination of Central Oregon counties, Henry A. Dussault, Jefferson county judge, said there is a possibility Jefferson and Crook counties could acquire it for treatment of welfare patients.

Vernon Jackson, secretary of the Warm Springs Tribal Council, which represents the 200 Indians on the reservation, urged continued governmental operation of the hospital. He indicated the Indians feel their medical care would suffer if it were closed.

In Portland, Col. E. Morzan Pryse, regional head of the Indian Bureau, said the Government's concern is getting better care for the Indians at less cost.

Ex-Partisan Thinks Major's Death Ordered From Above

NOVARA, Italy (AP) — A shapely, dark-haired former partisan agent testified Friday she was sure that it former Lt. Aldo Icardi ordered the slaying of Maj. William Holohan he did it on superior instructions.

Cornelia Solbiati, 27, now owner of a fashion shop in Busto Arsizio, said Icardi, former OSS officer who now lives in Pittsburgh, Pa., had frequently asked her to keep big sums of money.

"She also said she had a 'very deep affection for Icardi,' and then hastily added that they considered each other 'like brother and sister.'"

Miss Solbiati told the court it was impossible for Icardi to have ordered the slaying of the major — head of the wartime mission behind enemy lines — to get the mission's funds. She said Icardi at that time could get all the money he wanted from local industrialists who were "more than happy to fulfill any request of his."

Miss Solbiati concluded her testimony by declaring that she felt sure that Icardi, "after all, had planned Holohan's murder, he did it on superior instructions."

Icardi and ex-Sgt. Carl Lo Dolce of Rochester, N.Y., are being tried in absentia for the 1944 murder of Holohan. U. S. courts declined to extradite them. Three Italians are also being tried and are in court.

Ubaldo Piazza, a Novara area business man, testified that he gave Giuseppe Manina — one of the three Italians accused of the murder — the potassium cyanide which was later put in Holohan's soup in an initial attempt to kill him. The major was later shot, and his body thrown into a lake, from which it was recovered years later.

Chrysler Buys Briggs Plants

DETROIT (AP) — Chrysler Corp. expects to acquire all auto body and parts making plants of the Briggs Manufacturing Co. within the next 60 days for 35 million dollars.

President L. L. Colbert of Chrysler said officials of both firms already have agreed on the purchase, but that approval yet must be obtained from Briggs stockholders.

Briggs' 12 major plants in the Detroit area normally employ from 35,000 to 40,000 and its acquisition by Chrysler will make it the Detroit area with 130,000 to 140,000. Ford, now the largest, has 100,000 to 110,000.

Chrysler is not acquiring the Briggs Beautyware division, which makes plumbing and kitchen fixtures.

Colbert said, however, Chrysler plans to acquire all principal plants of Briggs, plus machinery and equipment.

Briggs Manufacturing Co., was founded by the late Walter O. Briggs Sr., who died Jan. 17, 1952. He also was owner of the Detroit Tigers of the American League. W. O. (Spike) Briggs Jr., now president of the Tigers, he resigned as a Briggs vice-president last May.

Briggs makes all Plymouth bodies for Chrysler and also produces Packard's bodies, as well as both automobile and airplane parts and assemblies.

A Packard spokesman said Chrysler's purchase of Briggs would have no immediate effect upon Packard.

When rumors of the purchase developed some time ago, he said that Packard president, James J. Nance contacted both Briggs and Chrysler and was assured Packard would be supplied bodies until it could work out a new agreement with Chrysler or make other arrangements.

'Moon Is Blue' Gives Portland Chief Ban Power

PORTLAND (AP) — The City Council gave the Portland police chief power here Thursday to bar youngsters from any shows to which the chief objects.

An ordinance gave him authority to ban those under 18 from movies or other theaters, and made theater owners liable if the youngsters are admitted.

Council members said the film, "The Moon Is Blue," now showing in Portland, led them to take the action.

Del Morris Boosted Notch In Oakland

Del Morris, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Morris of 1940 Fremont Street, has been promoted to the position of merchandise manager of the big Montgomery Ward and Company store in Oakland, Calif., it was learned from Howard Stroud, Ward manager here.

Morris was assistant manager of the Ward's store here before being appointed store manager at Centralia. He has been in Oakland about a month.

Following Mass, the group will breakfast at the Winema Hotel with the candidates as guests.

One Year For Killing Mother

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — A Marine engineer who pleaded guilty of fatally beating his 63 year old mother in an argument over \$300 was sentenced to one year in jail Thursday.

Russell F. Pyne, 38, was accused of striking Mrs. Mildred Le-onore Pyne with his hand after accusing her of taking \$300.

Later the money was found in a secret compartment in Pyne's suitcase.

Pyne was given the comparatively light sentence on a manslaughter charge after his attorney argued the man had not used a weapon, and that his mother's head had struck a stove as she fell. The attorney also pointed out Pyne was intoxicated.

Benson Doesn't Want Cowmen's Caravan Around

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Benson Friday urged the president of the National Farmers Union to call off a cattleman's caravan due to reach Washington Sunday night.

Benson made public a telegram to James O. Patton, the union head, at Denver, in which the secretary urged that Patton "reconsider exposing working cattlemen to hardship of caravan."

Benson's telegram said he thought the caravan "would accomplish nothing." He added: "You and I both know that a conference involving such a large number of people is not suitable for an adequate exchange of ideas."

Patton had said the caravan was intended to give Benson or President Eisenhower "the opportunity to talk with men who have borne the full brunt of the livestock depression." About 250 cattlemen were expected to make the trip.
