Building Of Riddle Plant To Be Sped

RIDDLE — The 400-man labor force building the 28 1/2 million dollar ferro-nickel smelting plant here will be increased to more than 1,000 soon, officials of the M. A. Hanna Co. reported Sunday. The plant, which will employ about 400 when completed, will process ore from nearby Nickel Mountain—the largest nickel deposit in the United States.

California-Oregon Power Co. and the Bonneville Power Administration will supply the power. Furnaces in which the ore is to be smelted will require 750 kilowatt hours of power to reduce a single ton. The plant is expected to extract about 25 tons of iron-nickel a day from 1,700 tons of ore. Nickel is used in making stainless steel alloys.

Portland Printers Raised To \$109.50

PORTLAND — The AFL Typographical Union voted Sunday to accept a new contract with the Oregonian and Oregon Journal which raises weekly wages \$4.50.

The agreement raises printers' pay to \$109.50 for 36 1/4 hours of day work or \$114.50 for night work. The new contract, which also provides for minor changes in working conditions, is retroactive to Aug. 1.

In addition, printers will receive a \$1 weekly increase for the month of July.
