West Angus Take Honors

Without the Dale West Angus ranch entries from Merrill there wouldn't have been any Pacific International stock show last weekend in Portland. Jokingly stated local livestock enthusiasts, who saw the West herd carry off five first places and take second place in two more events.

Top honors won by West was the "Best Herd of 10" which included nine heifers and one bull. First place was won on the "Best pair of Females" which consisted of one summer yearling and one senior yearling heifer.

In the "Best get of Sire" class the Merrill herd again took top honors with one junior yearling heifer, one summer yearling heifer, one senior yearling heifer and one summer yearling bull.

Taking two top honors was Blackbird DW 5, who carried away the title "Grand Champion Female" and took first place in the summer yearling heifer class.

The two second place awards were won by a summer yearling bull and a senior yearling bull. In addition to prizes won by the West herd, Head Herdsman Royal Champion received much praise for his handling of the animals by all who witnessed the show.

Following the show 38 Black Angus sold for an average of \$634 per animal, with the highest going for \$1,600. Again the West herd scored a point when a yearling heifer sold for \$1,500, second highest of the sale.

The White Shield Home exists to give security, understanding and medical care to unmarried expectant mothers. Its work can best be understood through its case histories. Here are two—anonymous.

Ruth, 20, had a speech impediment, was rejected by her parents and made fun of by her brothers, sisters and schoolmates. She was a good student but life became so miserable for her at 17 that she left school, and eventually her home, and went from one unsatisfactory job to another. Her speech impediment limited her friends as well as her employability and she sought companionship wherever she could find it.

She had a good mind and responded quickly to the sincere friendship and acceptance she found in White Shield. She was persuaded to enroll in school and later got a good office position where her speech impediment is not important and is making friends with people who respect her abilities.
