Billion Less Farm Income Predicted

WASHINGTON (AP) — Prospects are that the nation's farmers will wind up 1953 with a total net income one billion dollars under that of 1952, the Agriculture Department said today.

It estimated the farmers' net income for the year at 12½ billion dollars, or 7 per cent below last year.

The gross farm income of farmers for 1953, the department said in a report reviewing the situation, is about 4 per cent under 1952 but total production expenses are down about 2 per cent, thus leaving the farmers a net loss of about a billion dollars from last year.

For next year, the department said, the realized net income should hold at the 1953 level. Gross income may be a trifle lower in 1954 than in 1953, said the report, but probably this will be offset by some further reduction in expenses.

Realized gross income includes cash receipts from marketing of farm products, government payments to farmers, the value of home-consumed farm products and the rental value of farm dwellings. The department said cash receipts from farm products in 1953 should total about \$31,200,000,000, or 4 per cent under 1952.

This drop, in the face of a record high volume of farm marketings, is due to considerably lower prices, the report said.

Package Services By Trolley Sought

BOSTON (AP) — A city councilman has offered a resolve to use Boston's publicly owned trolley car system for package delivery service to help business in downtown Boston, increase revenue on the deficit-ridden system and to help the shopper.

The plan offered the City Council yesterday by William J. Foley Jr. would work this way:

Persons would come into town by trolley car to do their shopping. The store would give them a receipt and put the packages on trolley cars for delivery at the stop nearest their home.

The shoppers then would ride home clear of bundles and pick up the packages with their receipts.
