Army Strength To Be Trimmed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Pentagon plans to reduce the overall strength of the Army next year but there is no plan to pare down immediately American ground force strength in Europe.

Secretary of Defense Wilson and his manpower chief, Asst. Secretary John Hannah, sketched in some details at a joint news conference yesterday.

Wilson set out to explain remarks at an earlier news conference which had been viewed in some quarters, abroad as well as at home, as foreshadowing a reduction in U.S. Army strength in Europe.

The secretary asserted that "we have no immediate plans for taking troops out of Europe." Then he quoted from a transcript of his earlier conference in support of his contention that he was talking about "long-run" plans when he associated development of new weapons with the possibility of cutting ground forces overseas.

Official declaration of intention to maintain U.S. troop strength in Europe was immediately hailed as "reassuring" by the French deputy foreign minister, Maurice Schumann, who called on Secretary of State Dulles yesterday.

Schumann told newsmen afterward that he was "definitely satisfied" the U.S. contribution to defense forces in Europe would not be weakened and that "every re-

ponsible person in France" was reassured.

Hannah told the news conference that while the Air Force will remain at approximately present strength (960,000) the Army will end the current fiscal year next June with about 1,423,000 (present strength about 1,530,000) and afterwards would be cut somewhat below that figure.

The Navy, he said, will have a strength at the end of the fiscal year of about 742,500 and the Marine Corps 234,000.

Wilson and Hannah both insisted that the trimming away of non-combat manpower would make no reduction in battle efficiency of the Army. The present 20 divisions will continue, he said, although it was indicated further study might be given.

Hannah expressed the opinion that, even when the combat structure of the Air Force reaches the level of 127 wings (compared with a present 106), an increase of only 10,000 men would be adequate to man that force.

Chrysler Up To 235 Horsepower

DETROIT (AP)—The 1954 Chrysler cars, featuring a new 235-horsepower V-8 engine in some models, go on display in dealer showrooms Thursday.

The new engine, most powerful in any stock car, goes into the Custom Imperial, Crown Imperial and New Yorker Deluxe models. Power output in the New Yorker model has been increased from 180 to 195 horsepower with a V-8 engine. Windsor Deluxe models are powered with a six-cylinder, 119-horsepower engine.

Power output of the Imperials and New Yorker Deluxe models this year was 180 horsepower. This has been stepped up to 235 through major modifications such as adaptation of a four-barrel carburetor, large carburetor air cleaner; larger manifold; larger exhaust and intake valves; enlarged exhaust manifold outlets, and a dual exhaust system.

Blackmer's Career Traces Back To 'Perils Of Pauline'

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—If newcomer Tony Curtis was sweating through his movie scene, there was good reason. He was playing with two actors who had a mere 88 years of film experience between them.

Eager young Tony was holding his own. But he couldn't hope to beat out a couple of scene stealers like Paul Kelly and Sidney Blackmer. These boys have been around.

Although neither of them appear to be an old codger, their experience in movies will amaze you. After they finished their scene with Tony in "Johnny Dark" we discussed their screen past.

"I think I go back farther than anyone around here," said Blackmer confidently. "I was with Pearl White in 'The Perils of Pauline'."

"Hold on!" Kelly corrected. "Can you go back as far as 1907? I do."

"That beats me," Blackmer shrugged, admitting defeat.

Kelly explained that he lived near the old Vitagraph studio in New York when he was a boy. He was doing stage roles at the time, and he would drop into the studio to ask about jobs. He became "the Vitagraph Boy" and starred in the first one and two-reelers ever made.

"I would star in some of the pictures—one of mine ran for six years," he recalled. "Or I would do a bit, like delivering a telegram to Johnny Bunny or Flora Finch. Whenever I left for a stage tour, I would let the studio know when I would be back."

Blackmer broke into pictures even more accidentally.

"In 1911, I was up in New York on a vacation from studying law at the University of North Carolina," he remembered. "I happened to be watching them make some movies in Union Square when I was picked out of the

CAMERA CHATTER

 "Correct Lighting for Color Slides"

"What causes washed-out appearance in color slides? We have all asked ourselves this some time or other.

The difficulty is quite common and is generally known as over exposure of the film. It can easily be overcome by paying strict attention to the proper exposure. Both the washed-out color and the same cause, over-exposure of the film. This means the film receives too much light from the scene being photographed.

Keep in mind and use the two simple exposure controls on your camera. These two controls are the f. stop or light diaphragm and the shutter or speed control. If these are both set properly there will be no lighting difficulty. The film used in the camera needs a constant amount of light for correct exposure, so changing light on the scene requires change in camera settings. The shutter speed can be set fairly constant. You use 1/50 of a second or 1/100 of a second with Kodachrome film for your color slides. Use the f. stop to make the necessary changes in exposure. For example, if the sun is extremely bright the f. stop you should use is f. 8 with 1/50 of a second shutter speed. On the other hand, if the day is rather cloudy or dark it is wise to use a f. 5.6 opening. Be consistent in the handling of your camera—pick a medium shutter speed and use the same type of film most of the time. Get well in mind the three

conditions (sunny, cloudy and dull weather), then get correct exposure by just having to change the f. stop which is sometimes called the lens opening of your camera. Follow the easy directions that come with your photographic equipment. Remember that the manufacturer of your fine photographic equipment has spent a lot of money and made use of the best brain to make your picture taking easy and pleasurable for you and me. Follow directions; then you will find slide-taking a very easy and pleasurable experience.
