Steak Dinners Don't Compensate For Milk Payment

ST. CHARLES, Mo. (AP)—It cost an O'Fallon, Mo., farmer \$52.20 to discover four steak dinners don't make up for an unpaid milk bill.

The farmer, George Sherman, told Magistrate Webster Karrenbrock yesterday he intended to pay for the steaks he and three friends ate until he saw the restaurant owner—O. W. Karrenbrock.

"I recognized him as a fellow who owed my daddy a milk bill," said Sherman.

"When was the milk delivered?" Magistrate Karrenbrock asked.

"In 1936," said Sherman.

The magistrate ruled the milk bill was no excuse; fined Sherman \$35 on a charge of obtaining food under false pretenses, added \$10 court costs and ordered Sherman to pay for the four \$1.80 dinners.

Gilchrist High Hears Fire Talk

Albert Wisendanger, Salem, executive secretary of the Keep Oregon Green Association, spoke to the students of Gilchrist High School Tuesday morning on what organizations are doing about forest conservation.

Wisendanger stated that in 1953 there were fewer man-caused fires than in any year since 1940. Factors which reduce fires are new laws, more rigid fire inspections of logging operations; more caution on the part of logging operators; the work of organizations such as Keep Oregon Green and the fine support of these educational campaigns by the newspaper and the radio.

Following a clever demonstration of the use of the Trapper Nelson packback, Wisendanger brought home his point that everybody loses when timber burns by showing 59 colored slides of Oregon's forests and the destruction caused by fire.

A movie, "The Frying Pan and the Fire," concluded the forceful and enjoyable program aimed at showing students how they might help reduce losses from forest fires.

The grade school students were given a separate talk and were shown the movie, "Smoky Bear."

Farm Discontent Acknowledged

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.), saying Republicans cannot afford politically to discount farm discontent, declared today the GOP faces "a whale of a big problem" in drafting a new agriculture program.

Knowland, the Senate Republican leader, said he and other GOP congressional chiefs expect to sit in with Eisenhower and Cabinet members on the formation of the administration's program to be laid before Congress in January.

The California senator wouldn't commit himself in advance on expected demands in Congress for continuance of fixed, high-level price supports for major field crops.

But he said discontent over farm price declines evidently was reflected in the election of a Democrat in Wisconsin's traditionally Republican 9th Congressional District two weeks ago.

"I don't think Republicans can ignore the significance of that election," he said. "It was a warning signal that should not be discounted."

Wolgast Recovers

CAMARILLO, Calif. (AP)—Old time lightweight champion Ad Wolgast apparently has escaped from his latest brush with death in the state mental hospital here.

Stricken with a respiratory ailment several weeks ago, the 63-year-old man who won the lightweight title in 1910 and lost it in 1912 is back sitting and dozing in his wheelchair.

Wolgast is a mere shell of a once rugged ring fighter and has been in and out of mental institutions since 1916. He last fought a match in 1920.

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Divorce in Hollywood has been much in the news since the John Wayne trial, which wound up yesterday.

The upholders of the filmtown's virtue often claim that the divorce rate here is lower than the national average. That may be true when you consider all film workers. But the average among stars is something else.

There have been many long-term marriages, such as those of Bob Hope, Pat O'Brien, Irene Dunne, Robert Young, Fred Astaire and Abbott and Costello.

But these are offset by stars who have married four times, including Clark Gable, Rita Hay-

worth, Lana Turner, Humphrey Bogart, Bette Davis, Myrna Loy, Mickey Rooney, Ginger Rogers and even Bill (Hopalong) Boyd.

Among those who have wed three times are Ida Lupino, Judy Garland, Joan Fontaine, Errol Flynn, Greer Garson, Ava Gardner, Victor Mature, Janet Leigh, etc.

I had a chat about divorce and related matters with Mickey Rooney, an expert on such things. Last week the much - but - now - happily - married actor got a break from the courts. A judge decided that even though he is \$16,533 behind in alimony to his third wife, Martha Vickers, he is doing his best by paying \$250 a week.

Many California males feel that the state's laws favor women overwhelmingly, and Mickey agreed with this view. "But I think the courts are changing a little," he added. "The John Wayne trial seemed to be the start of that

change."

Missing Sitter Did A Favor

LA CROSSE, Wis. (AP)—Fifteen-year-old Evelyn Hartley is missing—probably dead—today because she did a favor on Saturday night for a girl friend.

The popular high school junior, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Richard Hartley, has been the object of intensive search since her disappearance in mid-evening five nights ago from the home of Viggo Rasmussen. She was there only because a classmate at La Crosse High School asked her to substitute on a baby-sitting job.

"Evelyn had done no baby sitting for three months," said Dist. Atty. John Bosshard. "Her father tells us she filled in for Rasmussen's regular baby sitter so she could go to a football game. The chances are Evelyn was an accidental victim."

Bosshard declined to name the girl she substituted for.

The football game, between La Crosse State College, where both Dr. Hartley and Rasmussen are professors, and River Falls State College, also was attended by the Rasmussens.

The possibility that a boy friend of Evelyn's might be involved in her disappearance was discounted by Bosshard.

"All the boys she's ever gone out with—and there aren't many—have been cleared," he said. "She had few dates and no boy friend. We've even cleared boys who had asked her for dates and had been refused."

Bosshard discounted also a report from Milwaukee that a mysterious man described as being six feet tall and weighing 180 pounds might be involved in the case. The man being sought by Milwaukee police, left a bundle containing two blood-stained shirts at a railway station bootbox stand. The district attorney said it seemed unlikely to him that a man that size could have entered the 14-inch basement window of the Rasmussen home.
