W. Hugh Baber, Chico rancher, has been chosen "Livestock Man of the Year" by the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce. On Oct. 31, he will be formally presented with his award during the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce night at the Cow Palace during the Grand National Livestock Exposition. The exposition begins Oct. 29, and continues through Nov. 8.

A representative crowd of about 300 Modoc and Lassen residents greeted Lieut. Gov. Harold J. Powers at a reception and dinner given in his honor Oct. 11 at Pioneer Inn. The room was decorated with signs saying "Welcome Home, Butch" and "What Next, Butch?" The reception began at 7:30 p.m. with a buffet dinner dance beginning at 9 p.m.

Walt Robinson, Modoc Fair manager, acted as master of ceremonies making a tribute to the new lieutenant governor, Mrs. Doris Deussen made the presentation of a tooled silver cowboy hat inscribed "To Butch from Modoc County, 1954." Gov. Powers responded with a short address which attributed his political success to his family which had been in the county since his great-grandfather's time. He mentioned that his constituents are more than twelve million, and he pledged himself to continue to serve the people of California with honor.

Irvine Grove of Eagleview read a skit giving a resume of Powers' life. She spoke of his grandfather, from Ireland to California in 1850, and who returned to Cincinnati, Ohio, by way of the Isham of Panama and New Orleans in 1852 with pockets full of gold to buy a herd of cattle and the famous U brand, used on Powers ranch today.
Mrs. Powers family came from Lake Tahoe to Modoc county in the late 1870's. Mrs. Grove said: "Butch Powers is an integral part of Modoc County as Cedar Pass or Chinney Rock."

Big Prostitution Syndicates See Working Oregon

PORTLAND — It seems that major syndicates control prostitution in Oregon. Attorney General Thornton said Tuesday that he was gathering evidence organized prostitution.
Speaking as part of a law enforcement panel at a joint meeting of city officials and financial officers, Thornton said there is evidence of a syndicate operating to transfer prostitutes, travel routes and receive money, but local officials consider this.
"The syndicates won't stop unless the local city officials, supported by the public, something about it."
His other remarks were concerned chiefly with general aspects of law enforcement. It is at local level that laws should be enforced, he said, with the general keeping an eye on the scene around the state.
