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Klamath Co. Council PTA Hears President

Mrs. Helmer Lindstrom, president of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers, conducted the annual Klamath County PTA School of Instruction Thursday, Oct. 22, at the YMCA.

Mrs. Lindstrom said the National PTA theme for the next two years is "Better Homes, Better Schools and Better Communities" and we can not accomplish this without work. Our National Congress of PTA has the power to do many things and, while local unit members are just part of the National PTA, they are the most important part.

Mrs. Lindstrom reviewed the PTA policies which are "non-partisan, non-commercial, non-sectarian, and not to interfere with administration of our schools." She said, "We must not let our cooperation with school administration go too far and turn into interference."

"Oregon now has the best PTA teacher recruitment program in the United States," she announced. "Last year the OCPT granted 111 scholarships, a total of \$13,320.00, to young students studying for the teaching profession in Oregon. The

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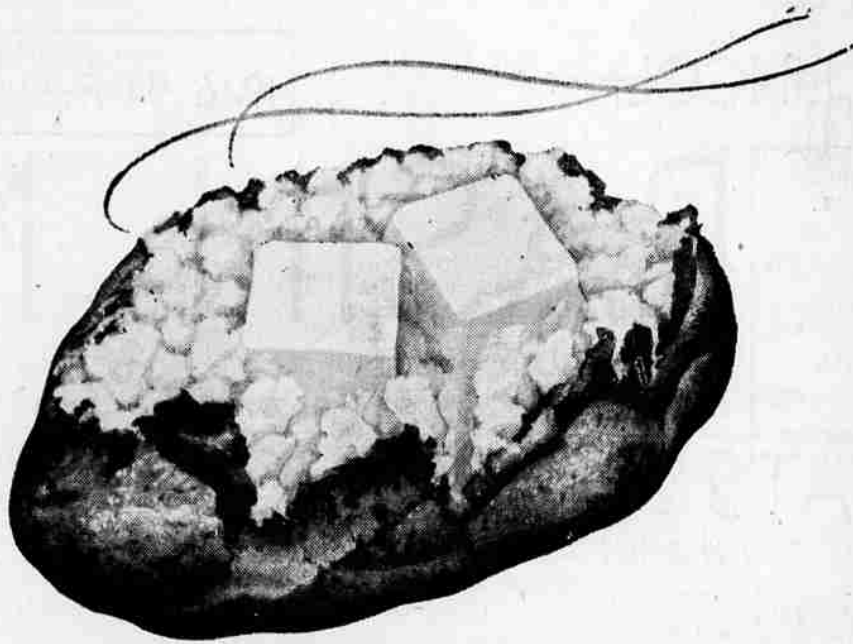
