Don't Worry About Crumbs You May Find In Brand New Toaster

If you find crumbs in your new toaster, it is not because it is old. It has just been tested. Mr. Koch told some 40 Sunbeam distributors and their wives whom he entertained at dinner at the Willard Hotel Wednesday evening. The toaster in the line has been through an actual toast test, and was one of the first shown here to distributors of a full line of merchandise for holiday as well as year-round sale. New to many of the viewers was the Sunbeam electric blanket in four colors which is a recent addition to the line. An innovation with this company is the interchangeable heat control unit between single and dual control blankets.

The improved steam iron was demonstrated and the recommendation that distilled water be used for all steam irons was reiterated.

Probably the largest selling item in the line, according to Koch, is the electric shaver. He told of scientists searching for the largest whisker and their finding that the biggest one is only six-thousandths of an inch in diameter. The comb head on the shaver has openings three times the size of the largest whisker, with the result that the heaviest beard can be cut, he stated.

Hostesses should be pleased with the waffle baker, Koch said, because 80 square inches of waffle can be baked at one time, making two or four attractive servings. The guests showed great interest in the entire line of a dozen items noting the use of molded nylon handles and lids and the improvements in standard appliances. "It looks like an electric Christmas this year," one of the distributors commented.
