"Red China extended a peace feeler to Japan today after signing a \$1 million dollar trade pact with an unofficial mission of Japanese legislators. BUT A CONDITION OF THE PACT WAS THAT JAPAN MUST BREAK OFF RELATIONS WITH NATIONALIST CHINA AND THE UNITED STATES."

Did you ever hear the blood-chilling buzz of a rattlesnake's tail TOO CLOSE TO YOU FOR COMFORT?
If so, you'll understand that move on the part of communist China. The communists understand that Japan, like Britain, MUST EXPORT TO LIVE. So they're making offers to buy what Japan HAS TO SELL.

Don't think such offers aren't enticing. If you're in business, nothing is more alluring than a customer who offers to buy IN LARGE QUANTITIES what you have in stock. Both Britain and Japan are in business. They must buy raw materials abroad and sell their finished products abroad or in time their people will starve.

The chief objective of the communists is to split our allies off from us by offering to buy what we have to sell and at the same time pointing out that the United States WON'T BUY WHAT THEY HAVE TO SELL.
It's a smart trick.

So far, we have tried to make friends by the process of PAYING MONEY for friendship. It isn't working too well. Selling friendship for money is humiliating, and our friends know it and are ashamed of it.

They'd rather trade with us. I'm pretty sure we're going to have to quit paying our friends with WPA money and start buying from them what they have to sell.

This Senator Williams of Delaware is a really WONDERFUL person. Listen to this dispatch from Washington:

"Republican Senator John Williams of Delaware says he will ask congress to deny federal pension rights to Alger Hiss and two former co-workers in connection of corrupt practices while in office."

"He added:
"This is wrong. No public official who has been convicted by the courts of having used his position to enrich his own personal fortune or who willfully betrays his country to a foreign power should be pensioned at the expense of the American taxpayers."

(Hiss will be eligible for good behavior release from prison early in the coming year. He is now 51 and will be eligible for a federal pension at 62 because he served nearly 14 years in government agencies. It was brought out at his trial that during most of these years he was systematically betraying his country.)

You'll remember, I hope, the background of this Senator Williams. He was a feed merchant in a little town in Delaware when he got the idea he'd like to serve his country in congress.

Some time after he got to Washington, he had a run-in with the internal revenue bureau. He had paid his income tax, but was bumped to pay it again. He had paid WITH A CHECK, and was able to prove it. The incident started him to thinking. What happened to his payment? Did somebody stick it in his pocket? If so, might that not be going on pretty generally.

He started digging in his quiet, non-spectacular country store fashion, and what he turned up shocked the country.

I wish we had more men like him in Congress, and FEWER GRANDSTANDERS. I think we'd be better off.

I'm not too badly scared YET by this Democrat who got elected to congress in Wisconsin the other day. Before getting upset, I'm going to wait and see WHAT KIND OF MAN he is.

If we can get enough GOOD MEN in our government, I'm pretty sure we'll have GOOD GOVERNMENT.

French Say Red Division Wiped Out

SAIGON, Indochina (AP) — A French high command spokesman said Friday French forces have virtually wiped out the Vietminh's elite 320th division during the last 10 days of fighting.
Two divisions of French mobile forces supported by tanks, artillery and planes have been fighting the Communist-led Vietminh division. The spokesman said the Vietminh unit has lost nearly 4,000 men and cannot now carry out its assigned objective—infiltrating into the interior of the Red River delta to reinforce the 60,000 Vietminh troops already behind French lines.
The spokesman said it is now possible for Gen. Rene Cogny, French commander-in-chief in North Indochina, to throw his forces farther south toward the big Vietminh base at Thanh Hoa, headquarters of the enemy's 304th division.
French losses during the 10-day battle were not disclosed, but the spokesman said they were "relatively light."

Break Hoped On Sitter Case

LA CROSSE, Wis. (AP)—Only a lucky break, it was felt by authorities today, will turn up any concrete evidence in the disappearance of 15-year-old Evelyn Hartley six nights ago.
Police Chief George Long, who had admitted his department is "up against a stone wall," was joined by Dist. Atty. John Bosshard in the belief that it now is a matter of fortune whether searching parties which have been combing the rugged countryside will come up with anything tangible.
"If we get a good break we may develop something," said Bosshard. "So far we have had none, despite the fact our searchers have worked hard at their job."

The Day in Brief

The United States has made a formal request that the U.N. General Assembly take up U. S. charges of Red atrocities in Korea.

The U. N. Security Council will resume its debate this afternoon on Syria's complaint against Israel that an Israeli hydro-electric project on the river Jordan is diverting waters from Syria in violation of 1949 armistice agreements.

The Communists have rejected U. S. envoy Arthur Dean's plan for setting up the Korean peace conference.

Communist exponents will resume their persuasion talks at Pannunjom tonight now that the violently anti-Red North Korean prisoners have agreed to leave their compounds to listen.

South Korea's air force chief has accused the Reds of sneaking 400 fighter planes into North Korea—a violation of the truce.

The French command in Indochina says French successes the last 10 days on the battlefield will hold up the Communist rebels' threatened autumn offensive. The Reds' elite 320th division is reported virtually wiped out.

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Velde Claims Navy Tapped By Red Cell

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Velde (R-Ill.) said Friday a super secret Communist cell of at least 3 persons had access to vital Navy Department secrets during World War II.
Velde, chairman of the House Un-American Activities Committee, said the full story of Communist infiltration in the Navy Department will come as "a terrific surprise to people" when it can be told in full. The Navy had no comment.
The House committee has heard eight witnesses in the case, and Velde told newsmen at least five others remain to be heard. He said three of the total are women.
"The full expose of the case will have to be delayed for the present time for security reasons and to prevent any interference with justice," Velde stated.

He did not elaborate on this. The committee Thursday disclosed that the investigation involves Morton Sobell, convicted of espionage along with Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. The Rosenbergs were executed in June. The espionage charged to Sobell did not include atomic secrets, and he was sentenced to 30 years imprisonment.

Velde said of the eight witnesses thus far heard in closed session, only one has been "cooperative"—that is, talked freely to investigators. Committee sources said this witness had named the others as colleagues in a Communist ring within the Navy Department having access to confidential and secret information.
The committee also announced that one witness already questioned had admitted that after leaving Navy employ he received Army contracts, one of them involving use of restricted photographs.

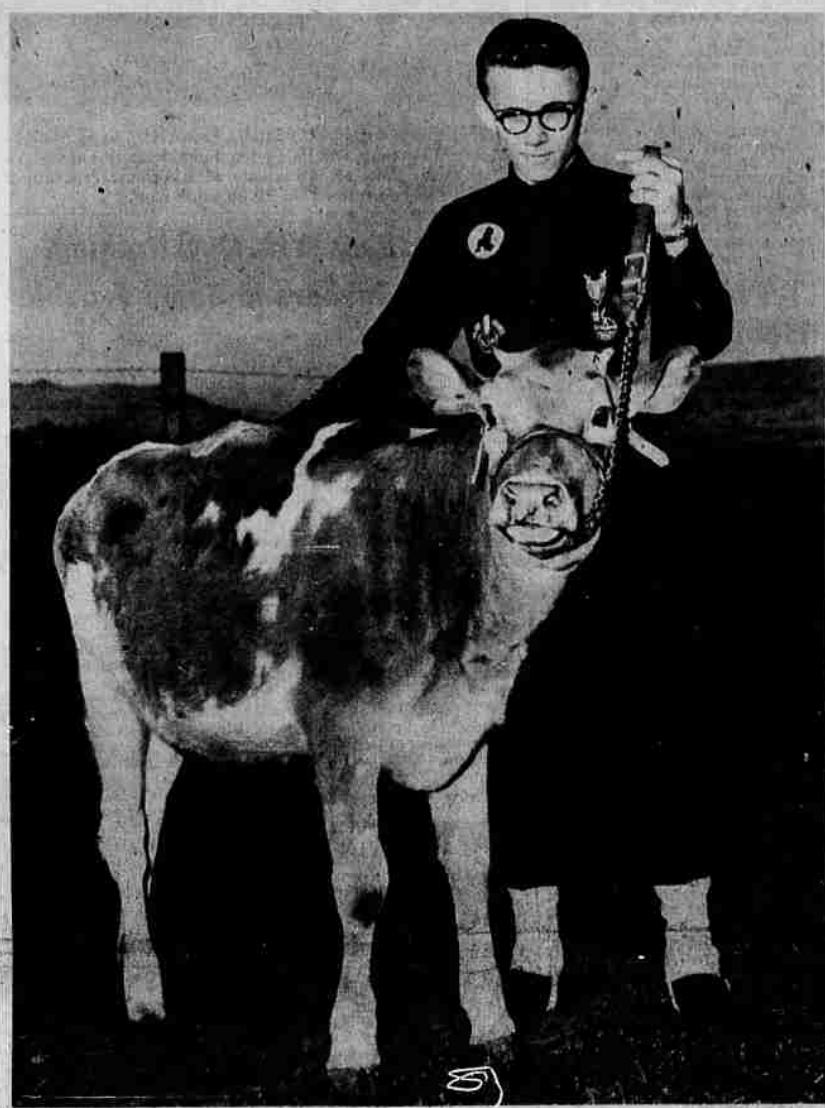
Pianist Killed; Substitute Due

Trieste Pull-Out Said Worked Out

LONDON (AP)—Britain and the United States reportedly have worked out detailed arrangements for withdrawing their troops from Trieste territory and handing the area over to Italy.

Informants said the plans were drawn up in four days of secret talks ending yesterday. They presumably will go into effect when the two nations decide to pull out their Oct. 31 deadline for the strategic zone.

U.S., Britain Talk Mode of Prosecution

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — The United States Friday formally asked the U. N. General Assembly to take up its charges that Communists in Korea committed atrocities against American and Allied captives.

The request was contained in a letter from Chief U. S. Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. to Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold. The letter merely asked that the item be put on the Assembly's agenda. It was not accompanied by an explanatory memorandum telling why.

U. N. Sources said they expected a meeting of the Steering Committee Monday to decide whether to agree to the U. S. request.

The British delegation expressed horror at the U. S. Army report telling of the torture, murder and starvation deaths of 29,815 persons—including 6,113 American soldiers—behind Red lines in Korea.

He said the British delegation was consulting with the Americans on the most effective tactics to use in prosecuting the charges in the U. N. his was the first statement by any American ally on the gruesome story which was unfolded by the U. S. Army's War Crimes Division.

The British pointed out, however, that the report was strictly an American Army production and had not been drawn up by the American-led unified command fighting in Korea.

The spokesman said Britain was not consulted before publication of the original documented report nor by the American delegation here before it decided to press charges.

Lodge's letter and the British expression of horror came simultaneously with a renewed American campaign in the 60-nation Political Committee against a Russian-directed torture center in North Korea. The United States charges spurious confessions of waging germ warfare were wrung from American airmen there.

Dr. Charles Mayo, distinguished surgeon and U. S. delegate, said last week that the propaganda campaign was directed from Moscow came in the movie news from that capital. He said a film opened in 21 Moscow theaters this week showing Americans of all classes plotting horrors against the Soviet Union.

Russia's Jacob A. Malik retorted that during 4½ years in the United States he had seen dozens of anti-Soviet films screened here.

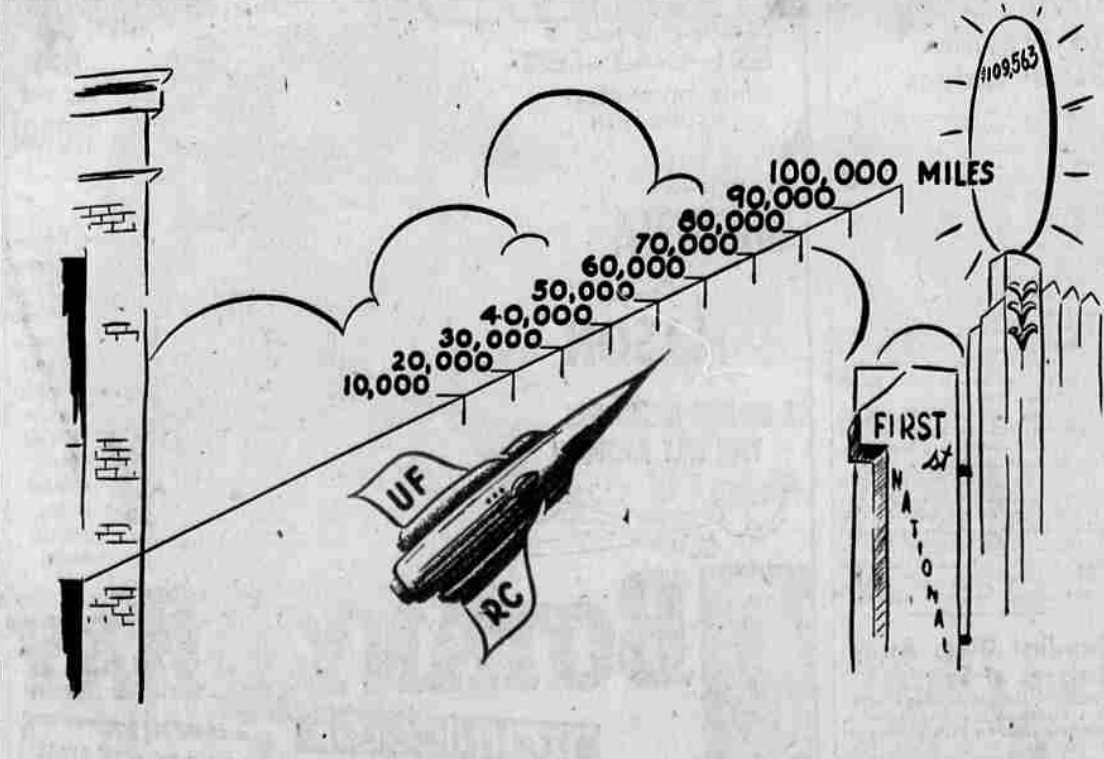
