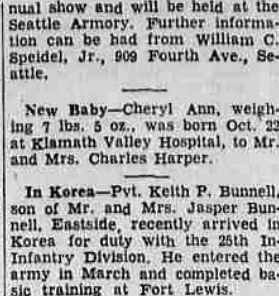

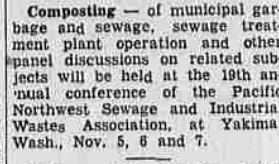

Janes Sees New Navy Era Ahead

LONDON — The use of atomic ships and guided missiles probably will alter completely the makeup and operation of future navies, according to Jane's Fighting Ships, an authoritative British naval publication.

The new 1953-54 edition of Jane's, published yesterday, said greater specialization in the duties of future ships. The Jack-of-all-trades warship will be out of date.

"The construction of the first atomic powered vessels, namely the large U. S. submarines Nautilus and Sea Wolf marks the beginning of a new era of propulsion," said Jane's. These atomic vessels, it declared, "can have far reaching effects not only in the field of naval architecture but also on military strategy in general and naval tactics in particular."

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Senator Against Scheduled Social Security Tax Raise

WASHINGTON — Sen. George (D-Ga) said today Congress should knock down the billion-dollar social security tax increase which becomes effective Jan. 1.

George, senior Democrat on the tax-handling Senate Finance Committee, said in an interview it would be "less than fair" to persons in low-income brackets to let the increase stand while income tax rates go down.

The net result, he said, would be a bigger tax load on "the little fellow" and a tax saving to others. Many persons don't earn enough to be liable for income taxes, but the big majority of wage earners must pay social security taxes to finance the federal retirement and death benefit program.

Personal income tax rates, under existing law, will go down about 10 per cent on the first of the year. The excess profits tax on business expires at the same time. But Jan. 1 is also the date when social security taxes are due to go up from the present 1 1/2 to 2 per cent each on employes and employers.

The Treasury has estimated this total increase, from 3 per cent to 4 per cent on a worker's earnings, will bring in about a billion dollars more a year. Social security taxes are collected on only the first \$3,600 of a worker's wages, so the maximum social security tax jump will be \$18 a year.

President Eisenhower last summer asked Congress to delay indefinitely the social security tax increase, but Congress took no action and the request was not pressed.

"Congress and the executive department are morally committed to eliminate the excess profits tax and to let the last raise in income tax rates expire," George said. "The scheduled increase in social security taxes should not be retained if the other taxes are allowed to decline."

He said he thought the tax rate could be rolled back to the existing 1 1/2 per cent each for employes and employes "for some reasonably brief period" without impairing the social security fund's stability.
