Middle Class Shuffles

NEW YORK (AP) — The recent flurry of action in the lively middleweight class, including the title scrap between Carl (Bobo) Olson and Randy Turpin, has resulted in an overhaul of the ratings of the 160-pound division by Ring magazine. Only a few minor changes were made in the other weights.

Olson's decisive triumph over Turpin gave the division its first champion since Ray Robinson retired Dec. 18, 1952.

Turpin, of England, was placed on the No. 1 spot, followed by Floyd Patterson, followed by (2) Rocky Castellani, Joey Giardello, Philadelphia (4) Gil Turner, Philadelphia; (5) Joey Giambra, Buffalo; (6) Ernie Durando, Bayonne, N. J.; (7) Charley Humez, France; (8) Ralph (Tiger) Jones, Yonkers, N. Y.; (9) Randy Sandy, New York; (10) Garth Panter, Salt Lake City.

Turner, Durando and Panter were not on last month's list and Giardello was moved up a notch. Humez fell from No. 4 to No. 7.

The heavyweight ranks were kept intact with Roland La Starza, Dan Baccaroni and Heinz Neuhaus, running in that order behind champion Rocky Marciano.

Floyd Patterson's victory over Wes Bascom sent the Olympic 165-pound champion back into the ratings, this time in the No. 8 contender's post.

Del Flanagan of St. Paul, who handed Steve Marcello his first defeat advanced from sixth to fifth among the welterweights. Johnny Saxton took over the No. 3 slot from Turner who was moved into the 160-pound class.

In the lightweight division, Art Persley of Red Cross, La., was returned to the first 10 as a result of wins over Phil Kim and Henry Davis. He was given the No. 8 rating. Montreal's Armand Savoie, who meets lightweight champion Jimmy Carter in a title fight in Montreal Nov. 11, was boosted from ninth to sixth.

Bruins Favored

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The UCLA Bruins and the University of California play in the top game of the Pacific Coast Conference Saturday, each determined to brighten their Rose Bowl prospects.

Halfback Paul Cameron and his UCLA teammates are favored to win and stamp a record of four conference victories against one loop loss on the books. UCLA also has two non-league triumphs.

California's Golden Bears, winner of one conference game and loser of the other, plus a one-two mark in non-conference competition, loomed a big threat for the Uclans.

Upwards of 60,000 fans are expected to see the affair, a clash between California's two biggest state universities.

Cameron and company were nosed out by Stanford, 21-20, but came back strong last week to wallop Washington State, 44-7.

California, boasting its best balanced attack since Lynn O. Waldorf came to Berkeley, will have to bounce back from a bad case of fumbling and a 20-32 defeat by Southern California last week.

Trojans Drill At Multnomah

PORTLAND (AP) — The Southern California Trojans, who will meet Oregon in a Pacific Coast Conference game here Saturday, scheduled a workout in Multnomah Stadium Friday after a flight from Los Angeles.

Rose Bowl Survival Battles On

Rose Bowl chances of three top contenders are at stake Saturday in Pacific Coast Conference football headlines.

California and UCLA, each once beaten in the league, clash in a "make or break" game at Los Angeles.

UCLA is favored by two touchdowns.

The conference pace setter, Stanford, appears to have an easier assignment against twice bopped Washington State at Palo Alto. Stanford is a solid choice to run its PCC victory string to five. It has neither defeat nor tie in the title scramble.

Southern California, defending champion, figures strongly over Oregon at Portland. The big USC club, which thumped California 32-20 last week, is ineligible to a repeat Rose Bowl visit. The Trojans won their last New Year's Day from Wisconsin. Oregon is a four time loser.

Washington is a mild favorite to turn back Utah in a non-conference intersectional at Seattle. The former has won two, lost and tied one in the league and still may be considered in the run to the big bowl.

Oregon State, scoreless and loser in five before blanking weaker Idaho, travels to East Lansing to meet Michigan State. Until the upset by Purdue last week, Michigan State ranked second in the national AP poll. There is no reason to believe Oregon State has the physical assets to emulate Purdue.

DO OR DIE

The do or die UCLA-California game may develop into a duel between the Pauls—quarterback Larner for California and left half Cameron, directing the UCLA single wing. Both are All-America candidates.

Cal has a 1-1 league record. UCLA has won three but lost 20-21 to Stanford. UCLA was the pre-season choice to grab it all in the conference.

Two undefeated power-packed teams from smaller schools, California Poly and College of Idaho, see action. The former goes after its sixth consecutive win Friday night, meeting Whittier while College of Idaho seeks number seven in its game Saturday with Lewis & Clark.

Midgets Post 20-0 Victory

Jim Scott's Junior High Midgets ended their football season Wednesday with a 20-0 win over the Fairview-Fremont eleven.

It was the third win in four games for the Midgets; Mills tied them 6-6 earlier in the season.

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Leahy Will See Irish Against Navy on TV

NEW YORK (AP) — The crazy-quilt college football season swings into the second half tomorrow with Notre Dame, Maryland, Baylor and West Virginia the only undefeated-untied survivors among the big boys.

The Irish, the No. 1 team in the country, tackle Navy at South Bend minus their coach, Frank Leahy, who collapsed during the halftime intermission of the game with Georgia Tech last week. Leahy will watch the proceedings from his home via a closed television circuit while the team is directed by a platoon of his assistants headed by Joe McArde.

Notre Dame rates a better-than-three-touchdown favorite over the Middies, who until they were upset by Penn last week, were regarded as about the strongest team in the East.

BREEZE

Maryland, the class of the South and No. 2 in the weekly Associated Press poll, has a breeze in South Carolina as it races toward the championship of the new Atlantic Coast Conference and a bid to the Orange Bowl.

Baylor, which is stepping cautiously in its quest for the Southwest Conference title, plays Texas Christian in a loop game.

West Virginia, ranked fifth behind Illinois, holds the longest current winning streak of major teams—11—but its opposition has been on the weak side. The Mountaineers play Penn State tomorrow, and if they win, their place in the top 10 will be solidified.

Penn, the Ivy League club with the suicidal schedule, tackles Michigan at Ann Arbor, and it would be too much to ask George Mungler's lads to spring two upsets in a row. Their 9-6 triumph over Navy must have taken plenty out of them.

FAVORITE

The new favorite for the Big Ten title, Illinois, also gets a stiff test in Purdue, the outfit that pulled the shocker of the season by handing Michigan State its first defeat in 29 games last Saturday. On paper, the Illini should win it, but Purdue, loser of its first four games before whipping State, is "up."

For its part, Michigan State will be in no mood to trifle with Oregon State and the Spartans could run up a big score. Georgia Tech, State's brother under the skin—11 had a 31-game undefeated string snapped by Notre Dame last week—also has a relatively easy assignment in Vanderbilt.

The NCAA's coast-to-coast television game of the day will send Pitt against Minnesota at Minneapolis.

In the Far West, South California, which has looked better with each passing week, is the choice over Oregon, while UCLA, which would like nothing better than to make the Rose Bowl, has no settle in California.

Marciano To Meet Cockell

PARIS (AP) — World heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano will fight the British Champion, Don Cockell, in a 15-round title bout next June, Al Weill, the world title-holder's manager, said Friday.

The match will be held either in London or in America, "where ever we could get more money," Weill said.

Weill came to Europe as manager of middleweight Ernie Durando who knocked out the French idol Charlie Humez, a week ago.

The manager made his announcement of the heavyweight bout, after a one hour talk with Jack Solomon, Britain's boxing promoter who arrived Thursday by plane.

"No final decision on the matter will be taken, however," Weill said, "until I talk with International Boxing Club Manager Jim Norris, next week at New York."

Earl MacDonald Whips Sizbette

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — Earl MacDonald of Vancouver Thursday night gained a unanimous decision over Seattle's Dick Sizbette in a middleweight scrap that featured Vancouver's weekly fight card. It was MacDonald's 19th win in 21 professional fights.
