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Tomorrow's Elections Will Show Way Wind's Blowing

Observers anxious about which way the political winds are blowing will be adding up fingers tomorrow in the elections of New Jersey, Virginia and New York City.

New Jersey and Virginia elect governors. There is also a special House election in New Jersey's 6th District. New York picks a new mayor, as do a number of other cities, including Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Little Rock.

In no case, perhaps, is there a clearer-cut test of the popularity of the Eisenhower administration because of the many state and local issues involved. But the results will be closely watched, particularly in the wake of the upset Democratic victory in a Wisconsin special House election three weeks ago.

President Eisenhower is on record in support of all the Republican candidates. His press secretary, James C. Hagerty, said so last week after some confusion had developed in the wake of the President's statement at a news conference that he was interested in seeing the GOP retain control of Congress next year.

The President some weeks ago posed for pictures with Paul L. Troast, Republican candidate for governor of New Jersey. He and Theodore R. Dalton, GOP candidate in Virginia, had a chat at the White House but not, the President has said, about politics. Another recent White House caller has been Harold Riegelman, GOP candidate for mayor of New York.

In brief, this is the picture: New Jersey — Troast opposes Robert B. Meyner for governor. Both are relatively unknown politically. Troast is chairman of the authority which built the New Jersey Turnpike; he has never run for office before. Meyner made an unsuccessful bid for the State Senate in 1951. Democrats are not counting too heavily on wresting the State House from the GOP, nor in winning the 6th District House seat. Democrat Harrison A. Williams Jr. is running there against Republican George F. Hetfield. Rep. Clifford Case, a Republican, resigned to create the vacancy.

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Justice Raps Handling Of Criminal Law In The U. S.

CHICAGO (AP)—Justice Robert H. Jackson of the United States Supreme Court said today the administration of criminal law is "a humiliation and discredit" to lawyers and the nation.

This country, he said, is plagued by unprecedented delinquency among young people and "shocking crimes."

On the international scene, he added, there is a great struggle for military supremacy—in which "no nation is more force-minded than our own."

The associate justice of the highest court declared such conditions hurt a challenge to the leadership of the legal profession.

He was the No. 1 speaker at ceremonies held in connection with the laying of the cornerstone of the new American Bar Center on Chicago's South Side.

Jackson, in his prepared remarks, stated:

3 Wives Locked Up; 15 Children Born In Captivity

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Police announced Saturday the arrest of a 42-year-old Mexican textile worker accused of keeping at least three wives under lock and key for years.

The man, Manuel Fragozo Villaseñor, was picked up when a search for a woman who disappeared 16 years ago led to the discovery of the first of his three spouses. The other two wives were found later. Police said the three had borne Villaseñor 15 children in captivity.

Neighbors who had hitherto regarded Villaseñor as a reputable person were so indignant when he was arrested that police had to protect him from assault.

Police discovered that Marcela Fuentes Bolanos, 34, had never been outside Villaseñor's house since he took her there as a bride and locked her up.

The authorities later discovered

wives, a 36-year-old sister of Marcela and a 28-year-old woman, both being held in confinement. Police said they believe the textile worker may have even more mates, not yet discovered.

Villaseñor's home is in a suburb of Mexico City.

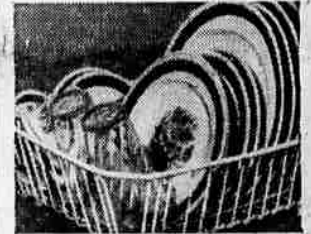
