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No Word Yet on Jurisdiction Of Indians Parley in Salem

No word had been received here late Monday on results of a conference called in Salem by Attorney General Robert Thornton on jurisdiction over Klamath Indian Reservation crimes.

Klamath County District Attorney Frank Alderson is attending the parley. U.S. Dist. Attorney Henry Hess of Portland, also is at the conference.

In the meantime, Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg said Monday he is still waiting for evidence that the state has the right to try Gloria Wilma Barkley, reservation Indian, charged with the butcher knife murder of her mother.

Judge Vandenberg refused to allow the alleged matricide to be arraigned in his court last month until jurisdiction was established. He halted a four-day hearing on the case and advised District Attorney Alderson to confer with the attorney general.

The Associated Press reported from Salem that Attorney General Thornton said he would issue a statement later in the day. Thornton said he was reluctant to comment on a case pending in court.

During the hearing in Klamath Falls, Attorney J. C. O'Neill, counsel for the Barkley woman, objected to a Circuit Court trial for his client.

It was O'Neill's contention that when the federal government relinquished its right to prosecute certain Indian crimes on reservations under provisions of a law signed by President Eisenhower last August, this power reverted to the Indian tribal council.

To support this contention, the attorney cited the Treaty of 1870 in which the Indians acting as a sovereign nation gave to the federal government the right to prosecute certain crimes committed by tribesmen, including murder.

O'Neill told the court that the state of Oregon has never had jurisdiction over the Indians or the Klamath Reservation, and that under the treaty any power over the tribes given up by the government went back to the Indians—not the state.

Judge Vandenberg says he cannot rule on the jurisdictional issue until additional evidence is presented to the court. Specifically, he wants to know if the Klamath Tribal Council has taken any action to modify the Treaty of 1870.

When the state offered a certain resolution adopted by the tribal council in 1951, Judge Vandenberg demanded that the original short-hand notes be produced in court. Vera Chase, official stenographer for the tribal council, told the judge the notes had been misplaced.

"Nothing further can be done by this court," Judge Vandenberg declared, "until concrete evidence is presented showing we have jurisdiction."

The Barkley woman who is alleged to have fatally stabbed her aged mother, Mabel Barkley, three times with a butcher knife, is held in the County Jail. She is charged with second degree murder.

Keno Woman Dies in Sleep

A resident of Klamath Falls since the fall of 1936, Mrs. Anna P. Zarosinski, native of Buchanan, N. D., died in her sleep at the family home at Keno, sometime Saturday morning, Oct. 31. She was 59 years old and the wife of Theodore (Ted) Zarosinski.

Mrs. Zarosinski had complained of feeling ill upon retiring the night before and members of the family had not disturbed her Saturday morning. About noon, her husband became concerned because she had not called for assistance and found her dead in bed.

She was the mother of three well-known KUHS football and basketball athletes—Don, Joe and Ed Zarosinski. She was also a member of Sacred Heart Catholic Church, Klamath Falls.

Surviving are her widower Theodore Zarosinski, Keno; daughter, Mrs. Anastasia Morrison, Klamath Falls; sons, Don, graduate of Oregon State College now serving with the U. S. Air Force, Anchorage, Alaska and called home by the death of his mother; Ed, attending the University of Oregon Dental School, Portland; John, Ray and Lou, Klamath Falls, and Joe of Medford; sisters, Mrs. Mary Williamson, Buchanan, N. D., and Mrs. Ella Schmitt, Jamestown, N. D.; brothers Alex Kaiser, Watertown, Minn., Joseph and Vincent Kaiser, Buchanan, N. D.; Carl Kaiser, Jamestown, N. D.; 10 grandchildren.

Funeral arrangements to be announced later are in charge of O'Hair's Memorial Chapel.

Adenauer Gets New Strength

HAMBURG, Germany (U)—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's "Hamburg bloc" uprooted the Socialists today from their stronghold here in Hamburg state elections which also steered the federal government's hand for pushing through its pro-Western policies.

Complete official returns from yesterday's voting gave the bloc-Christian Democrats, Free Democrats, the Germany party and the Refugee party—62 of the state Parliament's 120 seats. The voters also ousted the Socialist state governor, Minister President Max Brauer, in favor of an Adenauer man who will have the power to appoint the state's three representatives to the upper house of the federal Parliament.

Those appointments will give Adenauer's coalition the two-thirds majority it needs in the Bundestag, the federal upper house, to get parliamentary approval of plans to rearm Western Germany and ally her closely with West Europe's defense setup. The coalition already controls a two-thirds majority in the lower house, the Bundestag.

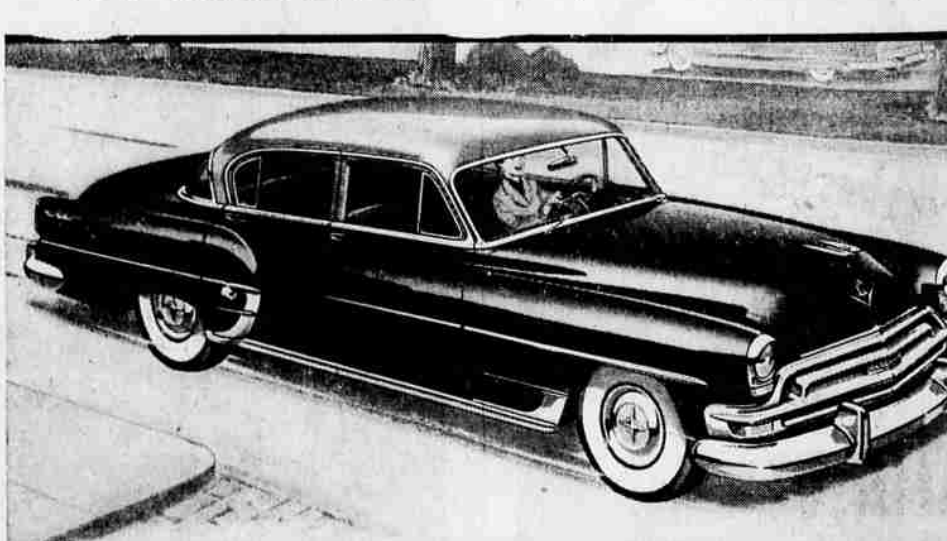
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
