HONG KONG (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon landed at this British crown colony today, accompanied on the last 40 miles of his flight from Indochina by 12 Royal Air Force Vampire jets.

A 19-gun salute welcomed Nixon. Thousands jammed the tiny airport to get a glimpse of the first U. S. vice president to visit here since World War II.

Newsman Lauds Papers

CHICAGO (AP)—Norman E. Isaacs, president of the Associated Press Managing Editors Association, said Wednesday "newspaper know-how, objectivity, fairness and responsibility have increased steadily."

Isaacs, managing editor of the Louisville Times, made the statement in his report to the organization of editors of Associated Press newspapers.

He recalled that since his election to the APME presidency a year ago he had traveled to various parts of the country and had "pleaded everywhere for a high ethical concept of journalism." He added:

"We all know that newspapering faces new challenges. Radio, television and news magazines—the service magazines—all these are but repeated challenges.

"Newspaper know-how, objectivity, fairness and responsibility have time. All of us are better newspapermen today than we were ten years ago. APME alone has contributed tremendously to our education.

"But we are not yet good enough."

Isaacs asserted that, for further improvement, newspapering must adopt a "professionalism of the spirit." He explained:

"We have to approach our calling with the devotion of the minister, the skill of the doctor, the thoroughness of the scientist.

"Put them all together. You will have a fine, understanding, objective and responsible public servant.

"None of us can ask for any higher calling. Let us give our newspapers the love, the devoted attention and the high skill they need to flourish and grow.

"Let us all pull together to take newspapering forward."

Ag Group Meets Criticism Of Ike Rule At Pendleton

PENDLETON (AP)—The House Agriculture Committee opened a farm hearing here Wednesday and ran into immediate criticism of the present administration and the way things are going.

The initial criticism came from speakers representing the Grange and the Farmers Union, but later cattlemen took the floor and their opening speakers defended Secretary of Agriculture Benson and his controversial reorganization program.

Rep. Hope (R-Kan.) and members of his committee, a 16-man line across an auditorium stage before 500 farmers, made occasional notes but gave no indication of their reactions.

Committee members also declined to be quoted on Tuesday's election results in the east.

In the first hour and a half of the hearing, seven men spoke, representing Oregon and Washington Granges and Farm Bureaus, the Oregon Farmers Union, the Idaho Co-operative Council and the Oregon Wheat League. Five of them were critical. Two were non-committal.

It was the Farm Bureau spokesmen who withheld comment. They said their county organizations were now voting on farm topics and it would be premature to give an organization opinion.

A. Lars Nelson, master of the Washington Grange, spoke strongly against the Department of Agriculture change eliminating seven soil conservation service regional offices.

"In no field is non-partisanship so essential as conservation," he said. "Obtain economies, yes, but not at the expense of the destruction of an action agency whose functions are deeply needed and whose accomplishments we are proud of."

And, he went on, the secretary of agriculture was undemocratic in "consistent refusal" to hear soil conservation district representatives before announcing the reorganization plan.

The whole federal farm program needs to be brought up to date, J. P. Smith, Twin Falls, Idaho, said. "The parity price base reaches back to 1914, he pointed out, and many regulations need to be put in understandable terms."

Harley Libby of the Oregon Farmers Union said it is time farmers got the security offered in other industry. Farmers, he said, are willing to accept the hazards of growing crops, but want security in their markets.

This security theme was stressed, too, by Elmer McClure, Oregon Grange master. He compared the farmers' security need with what labor now gets through unemployment insurance.

Eighty-two names were listed as speakers at the one-day session and committee aides said they assumed 20 or so more would be added, a record number for the committee's hearings which covered the midwest and east before opening a western tour at Cheyenne Monday.

There, as here, committeemen found strong sentiment for supporters.

Secret Relationship With Widow Related By Negro

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)—Her eyes led me to believe she might appreciate attention."

Oakland police say a Negro band drummer, Johnny Warren, told them that what started his secret relationship with the blonde widow of a wealthy Alaska auto dealer whom both are charged with murdering.

Warren, 33, was arrested here. The widow, Mrs. Diane Wells, 31, was picked up in Seattle on indictments issued by federal grand jury in Fairbanks, Alaska. Her son, Marquam Wells, 4, was taken to the home of a Seattle attorney.

Her husband, Cecil Wells, 51, president of the Alaska Chamber of Commerce, was found shot to death in his bed Oct. 17 at Fairbanks.

Mrs. Wells was his fifth wife.

Oakland police inspectors James Magini and Don Ainsworth said Warren, a husky 6-footer, was picked up here at his sister's home yesterday. He denied any knowledge of the slaying.

The officers said they took a 23-page statement from Warren last week when they questioned him for 19 hours, then freed him.

They quoted Warren as relating Mrs. Wells made advances with her eyes while dancing with her husband at the Fairbanks Golf and Country Club.

Warren said he telephoned her and was invited to her apartment for a drink. Secret meetings at a musician's friend's apartment in Fairbanks followed. He said he and Mrs. Wells discussed divorcing their mates.

The friend, Kenny Wadsworth, was a witness before the Fairbanks grand jury which indicted Warren and the widow.

Mrs. Wells had reported her husband's death to police. She said their apartment was invaded by two men who knocked her unconscious and, she assumed, shot her husband.

U. S. Commissioner Cameron Wolfe scheduled a hearing on Warren's removal to Fairbanks Tuesday. He said no extradition proceedings are required under federal jurisdiction.

Isles' President Doesn't Like Our Ships In Harbor

MANILA (AP)—With five U. S. warships anchored in Manila Harbor less than a week before the Philippines election, President Elpidio Quirino declared Wednesday "I'll resist any attempt on the part of any foreign power to set foot on our shores to intervene in our domestic affairs."

It was Quirino's strongest statement yet in his campaign charges that the United States is intervening in the islands' presidential election. The U. S. embassy has denied the charges.

The aircraft carrier Wasp and four destroyers arrived here Tuesday on a cruise with fleet units in the Far East.

The American-owned Manila Bulletin said editorially Wednesday the presence of the warships is "a sign of watchful interest" in the election.

Speaking at a rally in Lipa City, Quirino bitterly assailed the opposition Nacionalista Party which he said advocates U. S. intervention in the election. The Nacionalistas deny this.

Filipino voters choose next Tuesday between Quirino and his Nacionalista opponent, Ramon Mag-saysay, as President.

Professor Mum, McCarthy Says

NEW YORK (AP)—Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) said Wednesday a Harvard University professor who worked on secret radar material for the Army Signal Corps in World War II had refused to tell whether he ever gave any of the data to the Communists.

The physics professor, not identified by McCarthy, appeared as a witness Wednesday at a closed hearing before McCarthy's Senate permanent investigations subcommittee.

The senator quoted the professor as saying he is not a Communist now and was not on March 1, 1951, but that he declined to say whether he was one on Feb. 29, 1951.

He quoted the professor as refusing to say whether he knew of any Communists who worked on secret radar projects, whether he ever attended Communist Party meetings or whether he had "in doctrinated" any students in communism.

McCarthy said Abraham Brothman, who served a prison term in the Rosenberg atom spy case, could be another witness Wednesday.

Director Leonard Nears End of 30-Year Association

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Next March 1 director Robert Leonard comes to the end of a 30-year association with one studio. That's something of a record in this business.

Insurance Firm's Chairman Ousted

NEW YORK, Nov. 4 (AP)—Directors of the Equitable Life Assurance Company of the United States tonight announced Thomas I. Parkinson, involved in a controversy with state insurance authorities, will end his term as board chairman next February.

Alfred H. Bohlinger, New York state superintendent of insurance, had accused the 71-year-old Parkinson of "nepotism" in guiding the firm's advertising to an agency controlled by his son.

The directors met in a special session that dragged on for 12 hours. The meeting was called by Bohlinger after Parkinson refused to resign his \$100,000-a-year job.

Parkinson has served as chairman of the board and a director of the company for 26 years. The directors' announcement said under his direction "the society has grown to third place in the life insurance field."

The directors said he will not continue in office after his present term expires on Feb. 18.

Bohlinger did not question financial soundness of the company.
