CHICAGO LIVESTOCK  
CHICAGO (U) — Once again hog traders had a thousand head more to deal with than expected and the market sagged a little in response. Trading was active at the new 15 to 25 cents lower prices.

Cattle developed a steady to 25 cents lower trade while sheep were steady to fully 50 cents lower.

Barrows and gilts sold from \$19.00 to \$20.50 in most cases. Lots of sows were worth \$17.50 to \$19.25. Quality was down in cattle offerings as usual for a Thursday, leaving only a moderate supply of steers grading good to high-choice at \$19.50 to \$22.25. A few loads and lots of good and choice heifers merited \$17.00 to \$23.50.

Woolled slaughter lambs grading good to prime took \$18.00 to \$20.50. Ewes were taken at \$5.50 and lower.

Salable receipts were estimated at 11,000 hogs, 2,500 cattle, 600 calves and 2,900 sheep.

**Wheat Excepted From Acreage Allotments**  
The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced that a producer will, with one exception be required to comply with all acreage allotments established on his farm for 1953 crops in order to be eligible for price support on any basic crop, such as wheat, cotton, corn, tobacco, rice or peanuts, produced on that farm, according to Ken Bahoff, Tulelake Farm Advisor.

The exception applies to wheat, where only those farmers who will be subject to marketing quota penalties if they exceed their established acreage allotments will be ineligible for price support on other basic crops if they fail to stay within their wheat allotments. The marketing quotas apply only on farms with more than 15 acres of wheat. Therefore, if a farmer exceeds his acreage allotment, but does not have more than 15 acres of wheat on his farm, he will not be ineligible for price support on other basic commodities if he observes the acreage allotments for those on his farm. He will, however, be ineligible for wheat price supports.

The Department announced on Oct. 8, that a wheat producer would have to be in compliance with all other basic commodity acreage allotments on his farm, in addition to the wheat allotment itself, in order to be eligible for wheat price support in 1954. The more recent announcement applies that same principle to all other basic commodities.

Eligibility for available price supports on non-basic feed grain and flaxseed crops would not be affected by non-compliance with basic crop allotments. For instance, a producer could be eligible for price support on his oat crop even if he exceeded his wheat allotment.

**Vet's Park To Be City Beauty Spot**

Over eight thousand yards of fill dirt have been hauled into Veterans Memorial Park to date.

The thousands of yards of dirt and top soil, at a cost of one dollar a yard, are being transferred from the excavations being made on Highway 97 south of town. Contractor for the job is W. R. Chrisco, 209 Cook.

Mayor Paul Landry says that the fact that the job was not advertised for bids makes it "irregular." He added that since the dirt was needed right at the time and since there was an opportunity to obtain it from excavations being made, it seemed expedient to make the deal.

"This," the Mayor says, "eliminated about a 30-day delay."

The Park Board was created by a special act of legislation, as a municipality within a municipality, and is not subject to the same regulations as the City Council, according to Landry. Martin Brauner, a member of the Park Board, says that in view of this there is no question of the legality of the deal made with Chrisco.

Previous to "operation fill," George Ledford, engineer for Asphalt Paving Co., and Ted Fillion, assistant city engineer, made a survey to determine how many yards of fill dirt were required. This was at no cost to the Park Board. Asphalt Paving Company took in

**Dawn 'Hiding In Jail From White Slave Traffickers'**

A writ of habeas corpus was filed Thursday in Circuit Court on behalf of Dawn Starr, Oklahoma night club dancer, held in the County Jail here on a fugitive warrant from Los Angeles.

Her attorneys, Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney of Portland and U.S. Balentine of Klamath Falls, claim Miss Starr was fleeing from Hollywood white slave traffickers when she came to Klamath Falls.

The lawyers base the writ on the contention that the dancer is being held illegally on the California warrants. They name Sheriff Murray Britton and District Attorney Frank Alderson as defendants in the action.

Judge David R. Vandenberg set 10 a.m. Friday for a hearing on the petition.

Mahoney declared that Miss Starr has been "hiding" for 83 days in the County Jail.

"The reason she stayed compliantly in jail so long before pleading guilty to a check charge here," Attorney Mahoney declared, "is because she fears for her life if she is taken to California. Her life was menaced by white slave traffickers who tried to force her into a house of prostitution."

"After the girl refused," Mahoney declared, "she fled Hollywood with just the clothes on her back. When she got to Klamath Falls she was hungry and had no place to stay."

Mahoney added that it seemed strange to him that Los Angeles had its "famous dragnet" out all over the landscape "for an orphan girl when dangerous criminals in all varieties are running loose in Hollywood."

The Portland attorney also said that California friends of Miss Starr are financing her battle to escape extradition because they know her story is true.

"I myself believe there is something more behind this attempt by California to gain custody of Miss Starr than a mere check charge," Mahoney continued. "That's what we are going to find out through habeas corpus proceedings. The girl is already on a year's probation in Oregon and confined to this state. It is my opinion if the court doesn't modify that order, California can't take her, anyway."

Attorney Balentine explained that under habeas corpus proceedings the State of California will have to produce concrete evidence against Miss Starr.

"Now it won't be a case of some policeman wanting to take a trip to Klamath Falls at the taxpayers' expense," he declared. "They'll have to show the court something more than a piece of paper."

Under the order issued by the court, Sheriff Britton must bring Miss Starr before Judge Vandenberg for the Friday hearing.

The two defense lawyers say they will present evidence to the court that Klamath County authorities have no legal right to keep Miss Starr in custody.
