The accident occurred about 4 p.m. on a straight stretch of highway, when True apparently lost control of the vehicle, swerved to the east side of the road and plunged down the embankment into the canal.

Passing motorists pulled the driver from the car, partially submerged in water.

No other car was involved in the accident, according to state police, who investigated.

Brownell Says FBI Was Ignored

and detailed report on White "and his espionage activities" and delivered this to Gen. Vaughan to be given to the President, on Feb. 4, 1946.

"And yet the Senate Banking and Currency Committee was permitted to recommend White's appointment on Feb. 6 in ignorance of the report."

"The Senate itself was allowed to confirm White on Feb. 6, without the Senate being informed that White was a spy."

VAUGHAN'S DENIAL

In Alexandria, Va., Vaughan told a reporter that he has no recollection of ever having known White, and "certainly never received any such report" from the FBI.

"I can't conceive of J. Edgar Hoover (the FBI director) giving such a report to my office rather than to the Department of the Justice," Vaughan said.

"It seems very illogical," he added, saying that as far as he was concerned, Brownell "seems to be stretching his imagination."

IKE KNEW

At the White House, press secretary James Hagerly said President Eisenhower had advance knowledge about Brownell's speech and had approved it.

Hagerly said Brownell told Eisenhower about the matter last Monday and informed the President that he planned to disclose it in his Chicago speech Friday.

"The President told the attorney general it was his duty to report it to the American people," Hagerly said.

FILES BEING SEARCHED

In reply to a question, Hagerly said White House files are being searched for any trace of the two FBI reports on White which Brownell said had been delivered to Vaughan.

In response to another question, Hagerly said Brownell indicated to Eisenhower that "the facts" regarding White had come to the attorney general's attention only within the last few days.

Brownell said the FBI reports on White were given to Vaughan in December, 1945, and on Feb. 4, 1946.

FIRE OR RESIGNED?

Although Truman spoke of having "fired" White, newspaper files show that the White House announced on April 9, 1947, that White was resigning as executive director of the International Monetary Fund.

The White House made public at the time a letter from Truman to White in which the President said he was accepting the resignation with "sincere regret and considerable reluctance."

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—"Somebody goofed." That's the explanation for a million dollar show that didn't go on.

Thursday night 1,800 people gathered at Pan Pacific auditorium for a "Pageant of Progress" to introduce the 1954 Lincoln-Mercury cars. They included 1,500 auto men from 11 western states and film stars and executives.

Present were Judy Holiday, Debbie Reynolds, Robert Cummings, Broderick Crawford, Marjorie Main and many others.

After dinner the guests were ready for a show that was to star Red Skelton, Jack Carson, Jane Russell, Rex Allen and Dan Jolley.

Eddie Rio, local agent of American Guild of Variety Artists, said the show hadn't been approved by the union.

Studio bosses argued that the show had been passed by the Hollywood coordinating committee, which okays free appearances.

"This affair is not for charity," Rio replied. "I told them two days ago they had to pay the artists."

Rio would not approve a money deal on the spot. "No contracts have been signed," he said.

The disappointed audience was dismissed. The performers went home and Skelton was seen backstage tearing up his ad lib.

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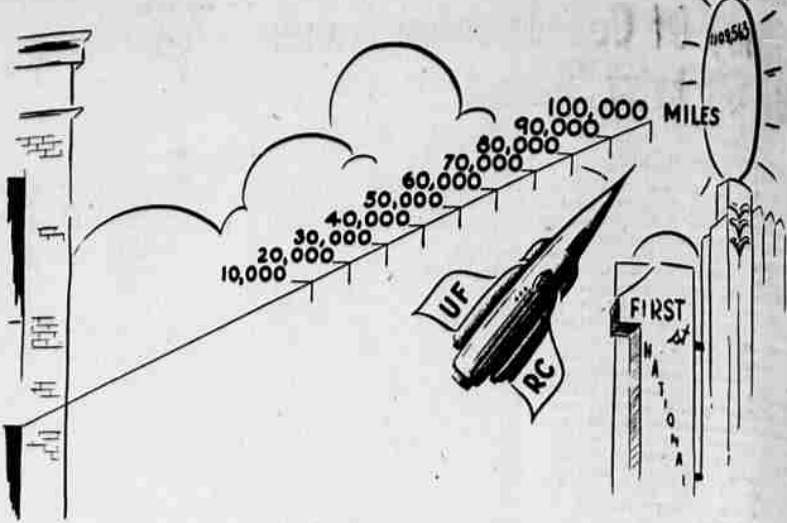

On the Record

Verbal fireworks punctuated the Dawn Starr habeas corpus hearing in Circuit Court Friday as the comely Oklahoma dancer, aided by two lawyers, fought to evade extradition to Hollywood.

At the outset of the hearing District Attorney Frank Alderson and Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, a defense lawyer, of Portland became embroiled in a bitter argument.

Mahoney accused the district attorney of being "negligent in his duty" when he failed to prosecute a barber involved in the original Starr case.

"This girl was originally arrested on complaint of a barber who shaved her legs," Mahoney declared. "I feel the district attorney has been negligent in his duty when he didn't prosecute the barber for violating the state barber code and contributing to the delinquency of a minor."

Alderson countered with the statement that Miss Starr was a little old to be involved in a contributing to the delinquency of a minor case. The dancer gave her age as 20.

When Co-Defense Counsel U. S. Baletine pointed out that Miss Starr had been held on a fugitive warrant since last August and the state of California had taken no steps yet to extradite her, Judge Vandenberg interposed.

"That's an old story," the judge declared. "Our officers pick up robbers and other dangerous criminals."
