Learn later that, sickening numbers of them had been sent to slave camps or shot or disposed of other ways as their savage masters desired.

We were properly horrified. We said NEVER AGAIN! And in Korea we stuck to it.

In Korea, we were prepared to fight. We were prepared to die. We were prepared to sacrifice ourselves again to such savage brutality. But the communist purpose, and the communist tactics, were now alienated. We were now likely to ally the Swedes and the Indians.

Even in diplomacy, which is a historically devious business, honesty, decency and stubborn morality pay. I hope we heed the lesson, and think we will. If American diplomacy is based on honesty, decency and stubborn morality it will win friends and influence people all over the world and so in the long run will pay off in a big way.

Speaking of diplomacy, I'm much impressed by King Paul and Queen Frederika of Greece—and also by the manner in which we're handling them.

Note, please, that we aren't keeping them captives in Washington, with maybe a side trip to New York. Today they're sitting at a FARM—in Illinois. It's a farm—not a gentleman farmer's place. It's run by an American couple in their 30's. They raise cows and pigs and corn and hay, which they feed to the cows and the pigs and make a living at it.

Today the Greek king and queen will eat what the city reporters will call dinner, and the noon dinner will include fried chicken, corn squash, bacon—flavored green beans and pie. These viands will be washed down with coffee and milk.

I'd bet my shirt Paul and Frederika will go away thinking Americans are WONDERFUL.

It everybody in Europe could do that the king and queen of Greece are doing today, the hatred and suspicion of Americans that now hover over Europe like a pall would vanish as morning mists vanish under the benign heat of the sun.

One of our great troubles is that we see only OUR BIG SHOTS in Washington and New York and go on saying THIS IS AMERICA. The little people of Europe can't afford to travel in America and go to get their impressions of us from their returning big shots.

Our common, everyday people, who, thanks to the America built by the foundation laid by our founding Fathers can afford to travel in Europe—go abroad in large numbers, but they can't speak the language of the people and so they are reduced to going to London and Paris and Rome and miss the inestimable privilege of knowing what the common, everyday people of Europe are like.

They come back thinking that Europe is no more true than that Washington and New York are America.

Dawn Starr Beats Extradition Rap

Our City's To Be Her Home

Dancer Dawn Starr was freed from the county jail under a writ of habeas corpus Saturday morning.

It now appears that the Hollywood white slave trafficker has been foiled and as far as Klamath Falls is concerned, the final chapter in the Dawn Starr story has been written.

Miss Starr's attorneys told the court that when she came to Klamath Falls she was fleeing Hollywood white slave traffickers who tried to force her into a house of prostitution.

It was learned after Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg ordered her release, that the dancer refused to allow her attorneys, Sen. Thomas P. Mahoney of Portland and U.S. Balentine of Klamath Falls, to file a motion to set aside her plea of guilty to a check charge.

She was placed on a year's probation by Judge Vandenberg after she pleaded guilty to that charge.

District Attorney Frank Alderson who was named as a defendant in the habeas corpus action, was not in court when Miss Starr was released. Deputy District Attorney Joe Thalhofer told the court that Alderson went to Portland on business.

In freeing the dancer, Judge Vandenberg pointed out that in his return on the writ of habeas corpus, the district attorney had failed to offer any testimony that Miss Starr was the person named in a fugitive warrant from Los Angeles.

He also said there was no testimony that California had made any attempt to extradite her.

"If California wanted this lady," the judge added, "extradition could have been effected in two weeks. She had been held in the County Jail here on a fugitive warrant since Aug. 25. The writ of habeas corpus is allowed and I order the petitioner released from custody."

Questioned as to her plans, Miss Starr said she intends to stay in Klamath Falls and find a job.

"I have worked as a nurse's aid, a car hop, a file clerk and a receptionist in a dental office. An elderly lady in Klamath Falls has

offered to take me into her home until I am able to take care of myself."

Miss Starr also said she refused to allow her attorney to attempt to have her plea of guilty to a check charge set aside.

"They thought they could get the judgement set aside on a technicality," she explained. "I don't want that done. Despite anything that has been written or said about me, I have never denied I was guilty. I pleaded guilty. I was placed on probation and I want it to stay that way."

The Day in Brief

A fierce northeastern state snowstorm accompanied by 70 miles an hour winds has left five persons dead in a two-car collision on the New Jersey Turnpike, at least four persons dead in Pennsylvania, some 20 fishermen and hunters missing in and near the Atlantic Ocean, air and highway travel disrupted, and many outdoor sports activities canceled.

Storms also brought discomfort and peril to the plains states of Nebraska, North and South Dakota, Kansas, Oklahoma and Iowa. Where the snow there has stopped it has been followed by rain and cold air.

Oregon Water Corp., Seventh and Pine, reported its office broken into during the night and papers, records and files strewn over the floor, but apparently nothing was taken.

Sessler Inc., 534 Market, was entered after curfew had broken in the back door. Here also things were badly scattered around the office but nothing missing.

The third break-in occurred at Moulding Craft Inc., 312 Market, when a window was pried open in the front of the building and entrance gained to the filling room. After forcing the door to the main office the would-be thieves went through the drawers in desks and scattered papers and records, but missed one drawer containing considerable money.

A few dimes from a Coca Cola machine, a screw driver and a wrecking bar was taken.

Nixon visited Indochina recently on his current Asian tour.

Anti-British Riots Erupt In Italy

ROME (AP)—Violent anti-British riots erupted in Rome and other Italian cities again Saturday in protest against bloody street fighting in the disputed port city of Trieste.

Although Trieste itself remained quiet as U. S. and British troops patrolled the downtown area with fixed bayonets, shouting, stonethrowing Italians battled police in cities up and down the Italian boot.

In Rome, a mob estimated at 12,000 stormed a ring of club-wielding riot police around the British embassy until a barrage of tear gas sent the demonstrators in flight. At least 20 policemen and 100 rioters were injured. There was a similar demonstration Friday at the American embassy.

Another fierce fight broke out in front of the British consulate in Bari, southeastern Italian port city. Fifteen police and twenty students were injured before the demonstrators were quelled.

Police also broke up outbreaks in Milan, Genoa, Naples and Messina, Sicily. Except for one person in Naples, no casualties were reported from these cities, however.

In London, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and the Italian ambassador swapped protests.

In Trieste itself, the situation was quiet but still grim and tense as the embattled city prepared to bury its dead, killed in savage rioting with British-trained police.

American troops marched their posts along the waterfront Piazza Dell'Unita (Union Square) where the bloodiest fighting resulted in four dead Friday. At least six have been killed in wild outbreaks the past three days.

Goosebumps Erupt Into Strike For Heat

LONDON (AP)—Nudes with goose pimples staged a lightning strike in three artists' studios in a Chelsea apartment block Friday because the central heating wasn't heating them enough.

Faced with an urgent SOS from the nude-less artists, the local council, owners of the block, coaxed the shivering models back to work by raising the temperature 15 degrees.

C. B. Morrison Auditor, Dies

Carroll Brooks Morrison, well-known in state auditing circles, died apparently from a heart attack at the family home this morning. Mr. Morrison's death came about 7:45 apparently as he was preparing to rise. He was 58 years old and had been a resident of Klamath Falls for the past 20 years.

Mr. Morrison, who was born in Davis Creek, Calif., was an auditor for the Oregon State Industrial Accident Commission with offices at his home, 159 Hillside Ave.

He was a veteran of World War I, a member of Klamath Post 8, American Legion; Klamath Falls Lodge 1247, BPOE; Lodge F & A.M. York Rite Bodies, Hillah Temple, A.A.M. Shrine, Alturas.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Hilda Morrison, a son Donald and a daughter, Carol Ann, all of this city; a son Willard and a daughter, Kathleen Myers, San Francisco, and one sister, Mrs. Erma Elliott, Alturas.

Funeral services will be announced later by Ward's Funeral Home.

Winter Hits Northeast, Great Plains

A fierce snowstorm powered by 70 miles an hour winds beset more than a dozen Northeastern states, disrupting air and highway travel and leaving at least nine persons dead Saturday.

Another storm, also from the north-northeast, blew across the Plains States with equal ferocity but less discomfort and peril to the less-populated areas.

This was the situation in the Northeast:
In the storm area were these states: New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia, West Virginia, Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Maryland, North and South Carolina, Maine and Washington, D. C.

CRASH KILLS FIVE
Five killed in a New Jersey turnpike two-car collision.
At least four died in the Pennsylvania storm.

At least 20 fishermen and hunters unaccounted for when caught by high winds in and near the ocean.

Outdoor sports activities cancelled in dozens of places.
Trains and buses delayed.
Hundreds of automobiles stalled, many with women and children passengers.

Power and utility lines felled in many localities.
At least 50,000 homes on Long Island without electricity for a time.

Forty-foot waves on the south shore of Long Island and on Staten Island forced evacuation of some 20,000 homes.

More than 24 inches of snow on the ground in Western New York.
At Shinglerhouse, Pa., 28 inches of snow was reported.

Scores of cities throughout the Northeast had more than a foot of snow on the ground.
New York City received 4 inches of snow; Washington had 5; Harrisburg, Pa., 11 inches; Philadelphia, 7; much of Maryland, including Baltimore, more than 6 inches; many cities in Connecticut, Virginia and West Virginia had 2 to 4 inches.

SNOW EASES
The snowfall eased in many sections Saturday, but a heavy rain followed in countless, widely separated areas. It turned the snow on the ground to heavy slush, slowing down traffic to a virtual standstill.

A killing frost reached into Georgia and South Carolina, with frost as far south as Jacksonville, Fla.

In the Plains States, this was the storm situation:
Nebraska, North and South Dakota, Kansas, Oklahoma and Iowa in the path of the snowfall.

Russell, Kan., had 9 inches of snow; Hill City, Kas., 7; Lexington, Neb., 7; Salina, Kan., and North Platte, Neb., 6. Scores of other cities had two inches and more of snow.

Where the snow had stopped, rain fell, also accompanied by cold air. The rain ranged from slight fall to a half-inch at Burwell, Neb., and Rapid City, S.D.

The cool air extended all the way from the Rockies to New England and into the South with the exception of southern Florida.

The stormy weather dealt a knockout blow to football and horse racing, both in the Eastern and Great Plains states.
Two of the three major race tracks on the East Coast canceled their programs today. Racing programs were called off yesterday in Laurel, Md., Camden, N. J., and at Yonkers Raceway, north of New York City.

Three scheduled college football games, one each in Kansas, Nebraska and Pennsylvania, were postponed because of the snow. Scores of high school and junior college games were postponed as far south as Richmond, Va., along the Eastern Coast, while others were called off in Kansas, Nebraska and the Dakotas.

"Many big cities in the East—New York, Philadelphia, Washington, Baltimore, Newark—were hit hard by the storm."

Administration Seen Swinging Into Reds in Government Issue With Bang

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Eisenhower administration has swung behind the Communists-in-government issue with a bang, in a move Democrats described as an effort to offset Republican defeats at the polls.

In Chicago yesterday Atty. Gen. Brownell asserted that former President Truman promoted the White House that White was a Soviet spy.

The charge, bitterly denied by Truman, apparently was the first move of a new administration political offensive.

Brownell's action was approved in advance by Eisenhower and followed by only two days a declaration by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) that Republicans could blame their election defeats on failure to talk about Communists in government.

Within two hours after Brownell's speech was released yesterday, Rep. Simpson (R-Pa.) was saying in a mimeographed statement that the Eisenhower administration will urge "still more intensive efforts" by McCarthy and the House Un-American Activities Committee to uncover Communist infiltration into government.

Simpson, who heads the Republican Congressional Campaign Committee, said Brownell's statement had "further vindicated" McCarthy's position.

Rep. Moulder (D-Mo.), a member of the Un-American Activities Committee, accused Republicans of "stooping to a new low in politics."

"The Republicans have nothing to show the American people insofar as their own record of accomplishments is concerned so they are resorting to McCarthy tactics," Moulder declared.

Truman said in Kansas City he didn't recall the two FBI reports Brownell claimed were handed to Maj. Gen. Harry Vaughan, who was Truman's military aide. Vaughan said in Alexandria, Va., that he "certainly never received any such report," adding that Brownell "seems to be stretching his imagination."

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty told his news conference Saturday that a search of the White House files for the two FBI reports showed "there are no confidential files in the White House from the past administration."

Hagerty said he wanted to point out that it is the "customary procedure" for a President to take away his confidential files at the end of his administration.

He also reiterated that there are copies of the reports mentioned by Brownell in FBI files.

Truman removed voluminous records of his personal correspondence to Missouri where they will be placed in a Truman memorial library to be constructed at Grandview.

Asked if there is any other way the Eisenhower administration can show that Gen. Vaughan received the FBI reports for transmittal to Truman, Hagerty told reporters:

"Ask the attorney general when he returns to Washington Monday."

The FBI declined to say anything about the matter.

Hagerty previously had said Brownell indicated to President Eisenhower the attorney general had learned "the facts" in only the last few days.

Chairman Jenner (R-Ind.) said shortly after Brownell's speech that Vaughan will be called before the Senate internal security subcommittee next Thursday for questioning behind closed doors.

The committee said in a report last August that a Nov. 25, 1945, intelligence memorandum, in which one-time Communist courier Elizabeth Bentley was quoted as naming White as a member of a spy ring, had been made available to Truman.

Truman denounced the whole Brownell presentation as a "desperate" political move after Republican election losses last Tuesday in New York City and New Jersey.

Truman put his reaction this way:
"Apparently the Republicans have adopted the tactics of Sen. McCarthy as a desperate move... It doesn't matter what they do, they can't breathe life into a corpse and they know it... They'll stop at nothing, lies or anything else, to accomplish their purpose. They're scared. They're desperate."

Truman said that "as soon as we found out White was wrong we fired him"—a statement, which

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty challenged as "not true."

Hagerty said White resigned in 1947 as executive director for the United States on the International Monetary Fund. He quoted from a letter Truman wrote White accepting the resignation "with sincere regret."

To this, Truman said: "People are sometimes fired by being allowed to resign." That was the case with White, he said, and the practice is still followed in Washington.

Hagerty said Brownell informed Eisenhower about the matter last Monday and was told it "was his duty to report it to the American people."

He said White House files are being searched in an effort to trace the two FBI reports. He said Brownell indicated to Eisenhower the attorney general had learned "the facts" in only the last few days.

Brownell, former Republican national chairman who is regarded as one of Eisenhower's closest political advisers, told the Chicago Executives Club that Truman's action in naming White to the monetary fund post was "incredible."

He said he was publicly disclosing for the first time that the FBI had sent Vaughan a report on "White's spying activities for the Soviet government" in December 1945, a month before Truman nominated White for the job.

Brownell said that on Feb. 4, 1946, another detailed report on

White's "espionage activities" was forwarded to Vaughan, but that the Senate confirmed White Feb. 6 without its Banking Committee's having learned of the report.

White, who denied being a communist, died in 1948.

HST's Caudle Says He Fought Naming
DES MOINES (AP)—T. Lamar Caudle, former high justice department official, told the Des Moines Register in a copyrighted telephone interview Friday night that he "begged and pleaded" with his superiors to stop confirmation of the late Harry Dexter White in a major government post.

Atty. Gen. Brownell charged Friday that former President Truman named White as U.S. representative on the International Monetary Fund after the FBI had twice told the White House that White was a Russian spy.

Truman has called Brownell's accusations a GOP "headline play" and said "as soon as we found out that White was wrong we fired him." Truman denied he got any spy report on White prior to the high appointment.

Richard Wilson, chief of the Register's Washington bureau, said later's Washington bureau, said Caudle, former head of the Justice Department criminal division, told him he gave adverse reports on White to the then attorney general, Tom Clark, for transmittal to the White House.

By telephone from his law of-

ice at Wadesboro, N.C., Caudle told Wilson in Washington:
"That (FBI) report came to me as head of the criminal division and was marked to show that it was for the White House. It was a sweetheart. I jumped when I read that thing."

"Tom Clark, attorney general, was at Johns Hopkins Hospital for a checkup. I got hold of him and gave him the report. And I said, 'For God's sake, Tom, don't let that appointment go through. It will come out some day and ruin us.'"

Caudle is quoted as saying he later saw a picture of White bowling on the green with the late Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson, who was then secretary of the treasury.

"I got sick at the stomach looking at that picture," Caudle said. Clark, now an associate justice of the Supreme Court, is quoted by Wilson as saying he had no recollection of the White reports from the FBI and only vaguely remembered that White had died. Clark did say he had gone to the hospital for a checkup.
