Jeffreys, Sterling Happy In Real Life, On T-V

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—As ghosts of real life, Anne Jeffreys and Robert Sterling are the happiest married pair you can find.
 Their other-worldly existence can be seen Friday over CBS-TV on "Topper." Anne and Bob play Marion and George Kerby, the playful wraiths who make life miserable for Cosmo Topper, enacted by Leo G. Carroll. These are the roles played in the film version by Constance Bennett, Cary Grant and Roland Young.
 "Topper" on TV has been well received and appears set for a year's run and perhaps much longer. That means the versatile Sterlings will be tied down to the TV film grind. I asked how they like that.
 "It's a rugged life," she said. "We're up early in the morning and home late at night. We've been in town a couple of months and most of our friends don't even know we're here. We haven't had time to see them."
 "We make one half-hour show in three days and do two a week," he said. "We work three weeks and have one week off."
 "Our big night of the week is Saturday night," she said. "No matter how tired we are, we go out on the town. But we never see our friends, because Hollywood people don't go out on Saturday night. By 11:30, we start yawning and fighting to stay awake."
 "It's terrible confining, but not

much different from other fields in show business," he said. "You always have to be somewhere at a certain time and give out with a performance."
 "Sometimes I feel as if it's all for nothing," she said. "You do one, they put it in the can and you start another one. I miss the reaction you get with a live audience."
 "But you can't knock success," he said. "If this show catches on—and we've had good reports on it—it will be great for us. The important thing in our business is to have a hit, no matter what medium it is in."
 Anne and Bob can share a bit of satisfaction in returning in triumph to Hollywood. They weren't given a chance to show their potentialities in the movies. Anne has a fine soprano voice, but she was never allowed to display it in films. When she was under contract to RKO, she was generally relegated to cowpoke dramas.
 Bob was rising fast at MGM before the war. Spencer Tracy picked him to play in "A Guy Named Joe," and he was all set for the role. A notice from Uncle Sam ended all that. Van Johnson got the part and rose to stardom.
 "I came back from the war and found I was 14th in line for roles," he said. "I didn't work for a whole year, and I begged to be released. Paramount, Warners and Universal wanted to sign me. The week after I finally got my re-

lease, the bottom fell out of the English market for Hollywood films. The studios weren't signing anyone."
 Bob went back to New York and did some fine work on TV and in "Gramercy Ghost" on Broadway. Anne did shows like "Street Scene," "Three Wishes for Jamie" and "Kiss Me Kate," which she performed 885 times. Their romance started while both were in Broadway shows and were known as "the lovers of Shubert Alley."
 They started working together when Anne's mother dropped an
