

Bogart Almost Did Picture For W. C. Fields, Mae West

HOLLYWOOD (U)—Humphrey Bogart was telling about how he almost did a picture with W. C. Fields and Mae West.

Sound like odd casting? Well, this was in the days when Bogart was playing two-gun menaces in an assortment of pictures. He recalled the incident on the set of "Sabrina Fair." I mentioned that this was the first film he has made at Paramount and now he has worked at just about every studio.

"Every one except Universal," he said, "and I almost worked there once. It was back in 1940, and Warners told me to report to Universal and see about a loan-out."

"I went over there and the producer told me I was needed for a role in a picture starring W. C. Fields and Mae West. He said it was a great part and told me to read the script. I went into an office and read it.

"The script was fantastic. There would be a scene and then a lot of blank pages. It would say, 'Routine to be written by Mr. Fields.' Then there would be some more scenes and some more blank pages—Routine to be written by Miss West."

"I was panicky. I didn't know what to do. So I left the script on the desk, raised a window and climbed out. I left the studio and never heard a word about the picture afterwards. To this day, nobody has mentioned it to me!"

WILDWOOD, N. J. (U)—Sebastian B. Ramagosa, 57, millionaire race horse and store owner, died tonight in Burdette Tomlin Memorial Hospital of a cerebral hemorrhage.

Ramagosa was said to be the first person to sponsor dance marathons during the 1930s. Among those employed by him were Red Skelton, Frankie Laine and June Haver.

His enterprises were concentrated in Wildwood, where he owned 70 stores, a local bus company and a turkey farm. Other interests were nationwide. He owned a stable of racing horses which were in meets throughout the East.

He had operated 110 marathons throughout the nation prior to World War II.

During the winter, he lived at his Milford, Pa., estate. By his side when he died were his wife Jeanette and three sons, James, William and Gilbert.
