'Replacement' Baby Restored

TULSA, Okla. (AP)—A young Indian sailor and his wife, joyed at recovering their baby boy unharmed but bitter at his kidnaper, prepared today to return home.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Duane Stammer, still almost unable to believe 5-month-old Richard Lee was safe in their arms, were to leave by plane for Evansville, Ind.

They uttered words of bitterness at Mrs. Tommie Dene Doughty, a 17-year-old former carnival stripper with a mother complex who admitted taking the child while baby-sitting for the Stammers Friday night.

"It doesn't matter to me what they do to that girl," said the 18-year-old mother. "I have no sympathy for her. She had none for me."

Meanwhile, Mrs. Doughty, who said she wanted the child to replace one lost at birth, began to show the first signs of remorse from her jail cell at Muskogee. The twice-wed girl, held under \$20,000 bond on kidnaping charges, insisted:

"I didn't commit no crime. I was going to take the baby back. I got to thinking about how his mother felt, it made me feel awful."

But Stammer, 20, and his wife, who had given the baby up for lost, were unforgiving, remembering the teen-ager's vow to get Richard Lee again when he is grown.

They flew to Oklahoma yesterday when the FBI announced it had arrested Mrs. Doughty at her parents' home near Bokchito shortly after she completed the flight by bus and hitchhiking.

Cunningham—himself the father of four children—was picked up by police Friday night when he went to a designated site to get the money.

U. S. Marshal Harold Sexton took him to Portland where he will be held for \$15,000 bail pending federal court action.

Judy Garland Working On Movie, First In Four Years

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Judy Garland is working in a movie for the first time in four years. By her own admission, she's better than ever.

Miss Garland is acting in "A Star Is Born," a remake of the 1937 film classic that starred Janet Gaynor and Fredric March. For a variety of reasons, the set has been closed until recently. The first two weeks of shooting had to be scrapped when Warner Brothers decided to make it in Cinema-scope instead of the normal screen. Also, there were reports of tantrums.

But when I saw Judy on the set, she was just as nice as pie. She giggled her way through a comedy scene in a projection room and was jolly with the crew. She wore a red dress and a ready smile and seemed slimmer down from her previous poundage. Still curvy, but nicely so.

When she finished the scene, she plumped down in her dressing room and remarked that she thought she had improved in her four-year absence. Her last film at MGM was "Summer Stock" with Gene Kelly.

"I think I've become much better since then," she said candidly. "I know it sounds awful to say, but I never really liked myself on the screen before. But now I go to the rushes and I actually enjoy them. I even cry a little at the sad scenes."

"The four years have done me a lot of good. I got out and met the people and sang before live audiences. It improved my timing, and my voice is better too. I think I look better. I don't have that 'little girl' look any more."

I asked if she felt any trepidation in doing a remake of a movie that is so well remembered by so many people. "A Star Is Born" is still playing the TV circuit.

"No, I think we're on safe ground," she remarked. "We are adding elements that the first movie didn't have. We have songs in this one, and Cinema-scope. In some ways, the story is improved. The first picture had no scenes to show why the two leads became top stars; there were no scenes from their own pictures."

"But our picture will show why the girl reaches the top. There will be six musical numbers" (by Harold Arlen and Ira Gershwin). "The picture is being produced

by her husband Sid Luft and James Mason plays the fading movie hero, formerly done by Fredric March. Charles Bickford is the producer, the Adolphe Menjou role, and Jack Carson is the press agent, which Lionel Stander did. Carson explained that scene in which he tells the actor he's washed up has been toned down in this version and I asked her future plans.

Folks Of Ex-POW Sore At Magazine Reds Sent Them

GREENSBORO, N. C. (AP)—The parents of a soldier who was a prisoner of war in Korea received a magazine from the Communists last week. "Just a bunch of filthy lies," the father exclaimed when he looked at it.

The magazine, postmarked London, England, was delivered here to Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Rollins. It claims to be a souvenir of "your good food and good times you ex-prisoner of war relative had while a prisoner of the Chinese People's Volunteers."

The Rollins' only son, Charles, 23, a released POW, came home last month and re-enlisted.

Young Rollins was indignant. He phoned Greensboro Postmaster J. Tracy Moore "to see why they let such propaganda go through the mails."

Postmaster Moore said: "If it contained lottery tickets or obscene pictures we could remove it from the mail. But we have no local authority here to remove it from the mail even though it is lies."

He asked Rollins to turn it over to postal authorities, however, for forwarding to Washington.

The 94-page magazine was published by the Chinese Peoples Committee for World Peace, Peking, China. It was sent to Rollins by the Britain-China Friendship Assn, 228 Grays Inn Rd., London, W.C.1, England.

The magazine contains several dozen pictures of POWs apparently having happy times in prison, eating Thanksgiving Day feasts every day in the week, swimming and playing games, and living in "a typical POW camp on the shores of the beautiful Yalu River. The scene is pleasant and peaceful."

A mimeographed letter inside the front cover says, "Should you or your ex-prisoner of war relative wish to be kept in touch with developments in China, we should be glad, on the payment of two dollars per annum, to send copies of 'China Reconstructs,' the bi-monthly periodical published in China, and other material published by this association."
