No Markets Tomorrow

NEW YORK (AP) — All financial and commodity exchanges throughout the United States will be closed tomorrow, Wednesday, Nov. 11. Various livestock reports will be gathered by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Stocks

WALL STREET — The stock market declined in a moderate manner Tuesday without developing signs of weakness. The fall carried to between 1 and 2 points at the outside. Losses were small.

All security and commodity markets will be closed Wednesday in the United States and Canada for Armistice Day.

There was something of an air of pre-holiday quiet about the market, but it was noticed that trading tended to diminish as prices receded. Trading came to an estimated 1,300,000 shares. That compares with 1,440,000 shares traded Monday when the market was down on average.

Feed grains held quite steady throughout the day even though they couldn't manage any advance. Cold weather in the Midwest created some demand.

Clearance was good by the close at \$20.10 to \$20.40 on most butcher weights and \$17.50 to \$19.00 on larger lots of hogs.

Good to prime steers and yearlings sold from \$19.00 to \$28.00; good to low-prime heifers took \$17.00 to \$24.50.

Prime wooled lambs kinds were taken at \$18.00 to \$20.00 while good and choice shorn were \$17.25 to \$18.00. Ewes brought \$6.50 and below.

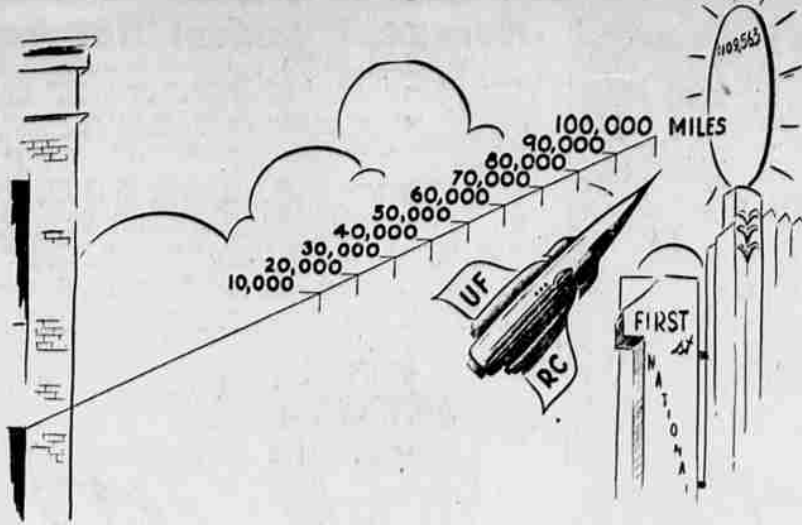

with a letter of praise he did not fire him outright and let the American people know all the facts.

The Senate group did not say that Gov. Byrnes would be asked to testify but a committee spokesman indicated that this may happen, if agreeable to Byrnes.

It was plain the committee was out in any case to put formally on the record Byrnes' statement that he saw such an FBI report, talked with Truman about it, and suggested that Truman withdraw White's nomination for the monetary post.

On his face, this apparently clashes with Truman's assertions that White was "fired" as soon as it was learned he was "wrong."

White took the monetary post in early 1946 and served for over a year. So far as the public record goes, White then resigned voluntarily. However, Truman has said that White was "fired" by asking for his resignation.

The Senate group's move was only one indication that congressional Republicans were preparing to dig into every corner of the controversy touched off when Atty. Gen. Brownell declared last week that Truman promoted White despite an FBI report that White was a Russian spy.

In addition, the House Un-American Activities Committee has announced it wants to question Vaughan, also on Thursday.

And Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), chairman of the Senate investigation subcommittee, declared "it begins to look more and more as if Truman will have to be called as a witness."
