WASHINGTON (U.S.) — Chairman Jenner (R-Ind.) of the Senate internal security subcommittee said Thursday there was "no doubt" that derogatory information on Harry Dexter White was delivered to former President Truman.

Jenner, making the statement at the conclusion of a subcommittee hearing, said he saw no reason for calling Truman as a witness "because the record speaks for itself."

Opinions In Indian Case Bog Down Circuit Court

Circuit Court was bogged down in a welter of legal opinions Thursday after Judge David R. Vandenberg reopened the jurisdictional hearing in the Gloria Wilma Barkley murder case. The crime occurred on the Klamath Indian Reservation.

Assistant Attorney General Wolf D. von Otterstedt was permitted to enter the case as an associate of District Attorney Frank Alderson. He filed a supplemental brief in which he contended that the state of Oregon, upon admission to statehood, had full territorial jurisdiction over all its territory, including the Indian Reservation of the Klamath Tribe. Von Otterstedt also stated:

"Such jurisdiction extended over all crimes committed on the Indian reservation, except insofar as jurisdiction was withheld by treaty of federal statute."

When Judge Vandenberg called a two-hour recess at noon, it appeared evident that the assistant attorney general would attempt to convince the court that under a law enacted last August by the federal
