

51 Protest Lincoln Probe

SALEM (AP) — Fifty-one residents of Lincoln County, denying charges that there is widespread vice in that county, told Gov. Paul L. Patterson Wednesday that he shouldn't make a state investigation. The delegation was almost entirely from the north end of the county. Residents of the south end made similar statements Monday. Gov. Patterson appeared last week in a delegation asking Thornton's resignation. They claimed that a widespread vice in the county, "washed" the affair. J. W. Lundin, mayor of Taft and hotel operator, told the governor Taft City Council questioned the town marshal last Monday, saying that he said there is no vice in the county. "As far as vice running on the edge," Lundin said, "there's no such thing. Our county is just good, if not a little better, than the rest."

Probe On Where Fish Come From Pleases Alaskan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Delegate Bartlett (D-Alaska) said Thursday it is "imperative" that the United States began investigations to determine the origin of fish in North Pacific waters. Bartlett told Secretary of the Interior McKay in a letter that he was gratified to learn the department is requesting funds to finance a study by the Fish and Wildlife Service. Under the North Pacific fishery agreement reached by this country, Canada, and Japan, fishermen of the latter nation agreed not to fish in North American waters. Japanese fishermen, under the convention, must fish west of a line running through the Aleutian Islands. The Japanese also agreed to make further west if biological investigations proved that some of the fish found within their fishing area originated in North American waters. Bartlett told McKay that many American fishermen believe Japanese fishing expeditions took place this year which had their origin in Alaska streams. "Under existing circumstances," he wrote the secretary, "there is no way to prove or disprove this. The treaty is clear in respect to the intention on the part of all three nations to protect fishing stocks of national origin. "Since the United States has not at stake and since it is the Japanese fishermen who approach our home waters instead of vice versa, it is beyond all doubt of great importance that we gather essential data."

Europe's Newspapers Haul Out Big Type For Harry

LONDON (AP) — West Europe's editors trotted out their big black headlines again Thursday to tell readers the latest developments on the subpoena of ex-President Truman in the Harry Dexter White case. But the only extensive editorial comment was in Britain, where papers of all political shades declared that the summons for Truman to appear before the House Committee on Un-American Activities will blacken the name of America in the court of world opinion. One or two continental papers blamed President Eisenhower or what they called a new Republican attack on the former President. Communist papers cited the subpoena to show the "hysteria" in the United States. In Paris, the leftist but non-Communist paper Combat attacked President Eisenhower for "lifting the brake on extreme right-wing Republicanism."

Jamaica Arrests 2 In Conspiracy

KINGSTON, Jamaica (AP) — A former education minister of this British colony and a newspaper reporter have been arrested on charges of conspiracy in connection with "state secrets." The action was taken yesterday against ex-Minister Lester Simmonds, fired last month by Gov. Sir Hugh Foot on the recommendation of Prime Minister Alexander Bustamante, and Vincent Truman, a reporter for the Kingston Daily Gleaner. National party leader Norman Manley charged recently that secret documents of the colony's Executive Council have been sold to Kingston merchants with one tipoff alone costing the government more than \$280,000 in revenue.
