## Washington Merger Flops

SEATTLE (AP)—The directors of the Puget Sound Power & Light Co. have voted to remain in business, canceling plans for the \$4 million merger with Washington Water Power Co. to be sold to live public utility districts.

The decision was announced Thursday by the power company's president, Frank McLaughlin, never a strong advocate of the merger with the Spokane firm, who recently announced he would work to preserve PSP&L as a "going concern."

Five public utility districts in Washington have been engaged in extensive negotiations with the company for a joint purchase of its properties. The plan has been stalled in court proceedings and difficulty in raising the money needed.

The company's merger agreement, recently approved by Washington's Public Service Commission, was "not against the public's interest," had a Nov. 19 deadline. Washington Water Power's president, Kinsey Robinson, had expressed hope the deadline would be extended to permit completion of the deal. He would not comment when informed of Puget's decision.

The purchase by the PUDs had a Nov. 20 deadline.

## Top Negotiators Meet Tomorrow

PANUNJOM (AP)—Top U. S. and Red negotiators return tomorrow to discuss plans for a Korea peace conference after a week's recess while staff advisers worked in secret on an agenda. The advisers ended a series of six secret meetings today but refused to give any information on the results. However, they apparently reached some sort of agreement since the top delegates were called back.

Meanwhile, Gen. John E. Hull, U. N. Far East commander, said in Korea he would "absolutely" press for the release of all remaining anti-Red Korean and Chinese war prisoners on Jan. 22 if the already late conference hasn't begun by then.

By this, Hull meant the U. N. would object to any Red claim that any prisoners be held longer for any reason.

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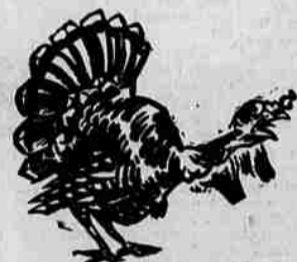
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
