## Peace Talk Hopes Rise

PANUNJOM — Allied and Communist diplomats today pumped new life into dwindling hopes for a Korean peace settlement with agreement on an agenda for preliminary talks to arrange a political conference.

op-level negotiators reconvened after a week-long recess and approved an agenda drafted by staff advisers in six secret sessions.

The agreement provides for simultaneous discussion of a time and place for the peace conference and of nations which will attend. Communist insistence on deciding the composition first had deadlocked the preliminary talks for three weeks.

Approval of the agenda will get the stalled preliminary talks under way but U. S. envoy Arthur DeLoach told newsmen: "This is just a key that opens the door. The real hard work is just commencing."

Meanwhile non-Communist members of the Korean Repatriation Commission were increasingly pessimistic over the future of Red interviews with Chinese and Korean War prisoners who have refused to go home.

Explanations have been canceled time straight days because of Communist demands to interview prisoners called up but not interviewed Nov. 5.

## Jerry Lewis 'Living It Up' Despite Knee In Brace

HOLLYWOOD — Despite having his knee in a brace, Jerry Lewis is "living it up" in the picture of the same name.

There have been reports that the zany member of the Martin and Lewis team is ailing. He added substance to the reports when he took a tumble while subbing for Lou Costello on the "Comedy Hour." He injured his knee again.

When I saw him in his Paramount dressing room he was playing songs from his current picture and going through wild contortions of the dance number. He seemed as nimble as a jitterbug with the seven-year itch. But when he sat down for a quiet chat (a rare occasion), he favored the left leg.

"It's all right when I stand up, because the leg is in a natural position," he explained. "But I can't bend it when I sit down. I have to keep it up on a table or something. If I don't, I'll fall on my face when I get up."

Jerry remarked that the stiffness is the result of an old injury. He pulled up his pants leg and showed that the knee was braced and wrapped with elastic tape.

"I could have it operated on," he said, "but the doctors can't assure me that it won't be stiff afterwards. I'd rather have it the way it is."

Lewis isn't letting this trouble slow down the pace that he and his crooning partner have been setting in the past few years. As soon as they finish their picture, they'll take off for eight one-night stands in Texas.

"Who needs to sit down and rest?" asks the comic. "Not Dean and me. We get a lot of talk, even when we're on the road."

## Starlet Dixon Sues Briskin For Divorce

LOS ANGELES — Movie starlet Joan Dixon sued Chicago camera manufacturer Ted Briskin for divorce yesterday, alleging that their marriage lasted only 21 days when he abandoned her last year.

Briskin, former husband of Betty Hutton, sued Miss Dixon for divorce last January, alleging she beat him twice. The suit was not brought to trial, however.

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## Plane Owners Face New Taxes

WASHINGTON — The Civil Aeronautics Administration (CAA) says it will ask Congress to select, through taxes on operators of airplanes, some of the cost of the airway services.

The plan, aimed at an estimated yield of 20 million dollars a year, was described at a news conference Friday as part of a new government's general policy of making industries pay for services rendered. The services in this case include maintenance of airway flight guides and emergency facilities.

"Taxes under consideration include a special one on aircraft fuel and registration fees."

## BAN MAY LIFT

BONN, Germany — The three Western occupation powers have decided to permit free travel between Communist East Germany and West Germany. Allied officials said Friday.

A note to the Soviets announcing this step is now being drafted by the Allied high commission, they said, for delivery to Soviet High Commissioner Vladimir Semenov within a few days.

## GOP Head Hits Notion Of Ike, Demo Congress

TOPEKA, Kan. — The American people "have no desire to tie one arm behind their back by saddling them with a Democratic Congress next year," the national chairman of the Republican party said last night.

Leonard Hall told a dinner meeting of Kansas Republicans that a victory in the 1954 elections would require a hard fight.

Earlier, Hall's predecessor in the national chairmanship, Wesley Roberts, received a standing ovation at the state committee meeting. He was presented with a silver tray by the national party organization bearing the signatures of President Eisenhower, Vice President Nixon and the late Sen. Robert A. Taft among more than 200 others.

Roberts, a Kansan, resigned the national chairmanship under fire after a Kansas legislative committee held he violated the spirit of the lobbying law in handling a 1951 building sale to the state.

Roy W. Cox, 65-year-old Iola grain dealer, was elected state chairman by the Kansas Republicans.

Hall told the 225 a plate meeting that on the domestic front the Republican administration was cutting "the huge socialistic super structure which we call the federal bureaucracy."

## Those Left After Bedroom Battle Blame Each Other

RICHMOND, Calif. — Authorities said Friday two survivors of a bedroom triangle blame each other for the fatal stabbing of Lawrence Johnson, 31.

Deputy Dist. Atty. Douglas Quinlan reported Johnson's estranged wife, Rowena, 40, says she calmly went to sleep alongside her husband's corpse after watching Harry D. Walker, 42, stab him at least 82 times. Originally, Mrs. Johnson said she learned of the killing when a telephone call awakened her and she saw the body beside her early Wednesday.

Both Mrs. Johnson and Walker, an Oakland sewing machine salesman, are held for investigation of murder.

Quinlan said Walker denied being present at the multiple stabbing. Walker said he was in Mrs. Johnson's home at the time but was accidentally locked in the garage until she let him out.

Police said they found on Walker a note which read, "... He's asleep now. Kill him one way or another."

Quinlan said Walker admitted Mrs. Johnson gave him this note but insisted he did not stab her husband.

Originally, Walker denied any knowledge of the killing, when he was nabbed by police after a 12-mile chase in Mrs. Johnson's car. Mrs. Johnson said she recently went to Atlanta with Walker, but left him and returned to her husband, a merchant seaman.

## Soldier Admits Gagging Girl

SEATTLE — Police Saturday were holding a 36-year-old Fort Lewis soldier in connection with the brutal slaying of a pretty tavern waitress whose body was found in her small cottage early Friday.

The victim was Mrs. Opal Montgomery, 31, who was found strangled with a silk stocking. She had a stab wound in her abdomen.

Being held for questioning was Virgel J. Bussenger Jr., who commutes to Fort Lewis from his Seattle home.

City Detective Don Sprinkle said Bussenger admitted strangling the woman when they became involved in an argument at her home following a round of taverns. Sprinkle quoted Bussenger as saying the woman was stabbed as he tried to take a paring knife from her when she came at him with the knife in her hand.

No charges have been filed.

## Oregon-Owned Plane Wrecked

SEATTLE — The wreckage of a light Oregon-owned plane has been found by a hunter east of Wilkeson, 40 miles southeast of here, the Washington state Aeronautics Commission reported Friday.

The commission said the plane was registered to Stanley Clifton, Slayton, Ore. It had been purchased from the Salem Air Service in 1950 by Clifton, the commission said records showed.
