CHICAGO LIVESTOCK

CHICAGO (AP) — Receipts of hogs were just about in line with expectations Tuesday and all offerings moved into buyers' hands at steady prices. Top was \$21.00 for several loads of choice 180 to 220 pound weights.

Cows held steady to 25 cents higher, vealers steady and bulls steady to strong. But demand for slaughter steers and heifers was very slow and prices no better than steady to weak.

Top price for steers was \$30.75, the same as Monday.

A pretty good demand developed for all types in the sheep pens with both slaughter lambs and sheep steady. A few choice and prime woolled lambs sold at \$20.00, the top.

Salable receipts were estimated at 14,000 hogs, 7,000 cattle, 600 calves and 2,000 sheep.

CHICAGO (AP) — Most grains were thrown back for losses by quiet heavy selling pressure on the board of trade Tuesday.

The market opened weak inactive dealings, distant wheat contracts running up losses extending to 2 cents. Then a slow recovery, led by soybeans, started. Soybeans moved above their previous close despite weakness in crude soybean oil.

Oats lagged throughout the session on news of more imports from Canada. Corn firmed at one time as Ireland bought 360,000 bushels. But toward the finish corn and wheat fell back again and even soybeans had trouble in trying to hold slight gains.

Court May Visit Witness

A bedside session of Circuit Court in Klamath Valley Hospital loomed Tuesday when it was reported that a divorce case witness reported to have been beaten and thrown from an automobile, was still confined there.

Attorney U. S. Balentine, counsel for William T. McGaughey, Klamath Falls automobile company sales manager, who is involved in a marital battle with his wife, Cora, said the injured witness was in no condition to appear in Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg's court.

The witness is Ethel Pearson, also known as Ethel Joe.

"I questioned the woman at the hospital Monday night," Attorney Balentine declared. "She told me she got in a car with her common-law husband, Harry Pearson, an enrollee of the Klamath tribe. She claims she can't remember what happened after that until she regained consciousness at the Klamath Indian agency clinic."

Judge Vandenberg said he will hold a court session in the hospital, if necessary.

FBI Chieftain Warned Aide About White

and radio hookups.

Truman had charged that Brownell "lied to the American people" in his original speech Nov. 6 which touched off the whole controversy.

In that speech, Brownell had contended that Truman promoted White despite FBI reports warning that White was a Russian spy.

FBI Director Hoover was sitting by as Brownell testified.

Chairman Jenner (R-Ind.) told reporters that Hoover also would testify.

Hoover himself told reporters that "it will depend on developments" when and if he testifies.

"I'll answer any questions the committee wants to ask me," the FBI director said.

Although interest centered on the Harry Dexter White case—a and Brownell's charge that Truman promoted White despite FBI reports warning that White was a Russian spy—Jenner emphasized the broader nature of the committee's study.

SPIES SEEN

In an opening statement, Jenner said there is ample evidence of Soviet espionage by high government officials in past years, and declared Communist infiltration "was not a question of one man, or even of isolated cases."

Brownell and Hoover were closeted with members of the committee in Jenner's office for about half an hour before the public hearing began under the glare of klieg lights and before 11 television and movie cameras.

A round of applause greeted the arrival in the jam-packed hearing room of Jenner and other committee members with Brownell and Hoover.

Brownell had a lengthy prepared statement which he delivered first of all.

Brownell said in it that it had been said that he implied in his Chicago speech of Nov. 6, touching off the whole controversy, "the possibility that the former President of the United States was disloyal."

"I intended no such inference to be drawn," Brownell said.

"When this subcommittee completes its investigation, I believe that you will conclude, as I did, that there was an unwillingness on the part of Mr. Truman and others around him to face the facts, and a persistent delusion that Communist espionage in high places in our government was a red herring."

"And I believe you will conclude that this attitude, this delusion, may have resulted in great harm to our nation."

CHALLENGE

Brownell went on to challenge Truman's assertion that he kept White on in government service to avoid disclosing FBI surveillance of the suspect.

Truman had said Monday night that Brownell "lied to the American people" when the attorney general asserted that White was appointed to the International Monetary Fund after Truman knew that he was a spy.

Truman's version was that he permitted White's appointment to the International Monetary Fund to go through so as to avoid a tip off of FBI investigation of alleged subversive activities by some government officials.

Brownell said that if it had been the plan in 1946 to continue White in office so that he and others in the alleged spy ring might be trapped, "arrangements would have been made to insure absolute control of the subjects and the situation."

He said it would have been necessary to prevent secret documents from reaching White and the other suspects. He added that top U.S. officials would have had to be warned to watch White and the others.

"The records fail to indicate that any of these minimum precautions were taken," Brownell declared.

"The record fails to show that anything was done which interfered with the continued functioning of the espionage ring on which White was a part."

"It seems to me," Brownell said, "that this explanation of White's appointment—that is, that he was appointed and allowed to remain in office for more than a year in order to help the FBI trap him as a spy—raises more questions than it answers."

"While under suspicion and surveillance, White was, we are told, appointed as the first U.S. executive director of the fund. He was also its chief architect. The opportunities afforded him in that capacity for betraying the country were very great."

At another point, Brownell said he had promised when he assumed office that he would expose evidence of Communist infiltration of government and of corruption.

"I shall not be deterred from carrying out my duty by personal abuse," he said.

Check Artist Faces Count

Louis Jose Mays, 63-year-old bogus check writer, who talked his way out of probation revocation several weeks ago, may not fare so well when he again faces Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg Wednesday morning.

Mays told Judge Vandenberg the years ago after he was charged with giving a Klamath Falls used car dealer a bogus check as the down payment on an automobile.

He wrecked the car half an hour after he gained possession of it. Car dealer pled him with drinks and induced him to write the worthless check while he was intoxicated.

The judge placed him on one year's probation and confined him to the state of Oregon.

Mays then disappeared. He was next heard from when he was sentenced to 27 months in prison in California on a check charge. After completing the term, he was brought back to Klamath Falls as a probation violator. He told the judge he left Oregon because he couldn't obtain employment. He said he was fired from two jobs when employers learned he was on probation.

The court heeded his plea for "another chance." Last month Mays, a disabled World War I veteran, was arrested in Eugene. Police there said after he failed to cash a \$3,000 bogus check at a used car lot, he succeeded in passing another spurious check for \$12 in a hotel.

Eugene authorities decided to allow Mays to be returned to Klamath Falls as a probation violator. Deputy Sheriff Don Hammond left for Eugene Tuesday morning to take him into custody.

Nine Hurt in Strike Riots

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Nine persons reportedly suffered minor injuries Tuesday morning in a series of violent incidents in the vicinity of the huge strike-bound plant here.

Eight city and county police cars were sent to the scene before order was restored.

The Columbus Dispatch said 20 to 30 strikers massed at several plant gates and stoned some cars. Police refused to estimate the number of persons at the plant gates.

The trouble came only a couple of hours before the union, the CIO-United Auto Workers, Local 927, was to appear in Franklin County Common Pleas Court to show cause why it should not be cited for contempt for violation of a picket-limiting order issued Oct. 29, the day the strike started over the issue of wages. The order limited pickets to four at main entrances and two at smaller entrances.

Forest Fire Figure Told

PORTLAND (AP) — There were 3,194 fires in national forests of the Pacific Northwest this year, the Forest Service reported Monday.

But these fires burned only 1,542 acres, a new low for the region, Kermit W. Linstedt, fire control chief, said.

The previous low for the 26 million acres of land protected by the Forest Service was 3,031 acres in 1948.

In Oregon, 1,061 acres were burned by 818 fires and Washington lost 481 acres in 282 blazes.

Some 317 fires were man-caused. Linstedt said. Hunters were blamed for 130 in October. That was a 26 per cent increase over the number reported in October last year.

Damp weather and cooperation by forest workers and visitors were credited with the low fire loss.

McCarthy To Demand Time

NEW YORK (AP) — Sen. McCarthy (
