CHICAGO LIVESTOCK — With demand good for the third straight day this week, hogs sold at strong to 25 cents higher prices Wednesday. One load of choice 200 pound offerings brought the top of \$21.25, up 25 cents from Monday and Tuesday.

Cattle continued weak. Cows and vealers held steady while bulls were steady to 50 cents lower. Top prices for high prime steers was \$31.00.

Slaughter lambs and sheep were largely steady. Good and choice lambs sold at \$18.00 to \$19.50.

Salable receipts were estimated at 11,000 hogs, 14,000 cattle, 400 calves and 2,000 sheep.

CHICAGO GRAIN — A report the Foreign Operations Administration was discussing exports of surplus American farm products with representatives of West Germany created aggressive buying in soybeans on the board of trade Wednesday.

Several soybean deliveries scored new seasonal highs. The discussions with West Germany involved a plan for that country to pay for American farm products with German currency. Soybeans and tobacco were mentioned as the products under consideration for export.

Other cereals borrowed some strength from the upturn in soybeans. However, gains elsewhere were not very large as there was nothing in the news to bring buying into cereals other than soybeans.

Night Cop Up For Thefts

GOLDENDALE, Wash. — Grand larceny charges were filed Tuesday against Goldendale night Marshal Dean Bay in connection with a liquor store safe robbery and thefts from three business establishments here.

Sheriff E. C. Kaiser said Bay, named night marshal here five months ago, confessed to the \$1,500 liquor store robbery Sept. 5 and admitted thefts from a garage, service station and hardware store.

Kaiser said almost "enough loot for a hardware store" was found in Bay's apartment after his arrest.

The sheriff said Bay was taken into custody after four wheels which had been stolen from a garage here were found on his automobile.

He was charged with four counts of grand larceny in information filed with the county clerk by Prosecutor Thurman Ward.

Bay, 25, is married and the father of two children. He formerly lived in La Grande, Ore.

Mild Weather Hanging On

There were a few cool spots but generally mild weather continued Wednesday over most of the eastern two-thirds of the nation.

It was a little cooler in the Middle Atlantic states and in the Northeast. However, generally fair weather prevailed. There was some cloudiness in the western Gulf of Mexico and light rain in Southwestern Louisiana.

Cooler Pacific and Canadian air advanced eastward, with the leading edge extending southwestward from Northwestern Nebraska to Western Arizona.

Light snow continued over wide areas in the Northern Rockies while rain or snow hit sections of the Southern Rockies. There was considerable cooling west of the Continental Divide.

Temperatures Tuesday were in the 70s over the Southeast states and in the 60s into New England.

Probation On Check Given

A 27-year-old ex-convict who was met at the gates of Oregon State Prison Oct. 30 by Sheriff Murray Britton when he was released after serving one year on a bogus check charge, was given five years' probation Wednesday when he appeared before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg for sentence on another bad check count.

The judge said he was taking into consideration the fact that Copelin had been sentenced to prison on a check charge from Eugene after the offense in Klamath Falls. The court ordered the defendant to make good three spurious checks given Basin merchants.

"You just got out of prison," Judge Vandenberg said. "If you violate your probation, I will give you double the ordinary sentence. You must get a job at once and stay within Klamath County."

Goodwill Plan Eyed

A committee including Paul Campbell, director of the YMCA, Mrs. Alina Urquhart, administrator of public welfare and Mrs. Margaret Sheridan, president of the Klamath County Tuberculosis and Health Assn., has been appointed by the Inter-agency council, representing several local public groups to investigate the possibility of a coordinated program for goodwill giving during the coming holidays.

Mayor Paul Landry will call a meeting in the near future of heads of the various organizations to work out plans for a clearing house for names and gifts in an effort to prevent duplication.

Plans for the proposed system were taken up at a recent meeting of the Inter-agency Council at the YMCA.

Mrs. Isabelle Brinker heads the council this year. The council has been enlarged recently to include an increased number of organizations.

Court Halts Extradition

An attempt by California authorities to return Alfred E. McCasland, 33, to Bakersfield on a fugitive warrant alleging a bad check offense, was blocked Wednesday by District Judge D. E. Van Vactor.

Detective George Sterlich of the Bakersfield police department appeared at the hearing with Ben Miller, Bakersfield automobile dealer. Miller claimed the defendant gave him a bogus check in November 1947 in payment for an automobile.

Attorney George Proctor, counsel for McCasland, declared California was trying to make a "collection agency" out of the district court. He elicited from Miller on the witness stand that his chief interest had been getting his money back.

Judge Van Vactor held that under California law, the statute of limitations had run out in the case. He ordered McCasland released from the County Jail.

Sex Offense

George Wilson Small, 33-year-old oiler for the Southern Pacific Railway, was held in the County Jail Wednesday on a sex offense involving a minor girl. He is specifically charged with contributing to the delinquency of his 13-year-old daughter.

Small was arrested at 3 a.m. Wednesday after a physician had furnished information concerning the case. Small was to be arraigned late Wednesday before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor.

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago's block-square City - County Building may get its first bath at a cost of \$200,000 since it was built 48 years ago. The request for the cleaning job has been sent to the county commissioners and the City Council.

Tule School Plans Eyed By Officials

TULELAKE — Plans for a new elementary school building here, further jelled at a meeting last night of school officials with Frank T. Schroeter, field representative of the school planning department of the state of California.

Conferring with the school building specialists were members of the joint elementary school board, Douglas Thomas, chairman, Ross Ragland, clerk, and Mrs. Lila Duckett, Tulelake. From the Siskiyou County superintendent's office, Yreka, were George Luttrell, assistant county superintendent and administrative adviser and Jerry Edwards, in charge of curriculum, child-welfare and attendance; Howard Perrin, Klamath Falls architect; Bob Fries, principal of the elementary school and E. L. Coyner, principal of the high school.

A delegation of interested persons from the Winema School district on the West side was also present to present a petition bearing 25 names, favoring consolidation of the Winema and Tulelake districts. The petition presented the advantages of consolidation and will be presented to the county elementary board.

Schroeter favored the proposed plan.

Construction of the new building will be financed jointly by a school bond levy that will be presented for a vote of the district residents, probably in December, and by \$50,000 that will be made available by the state of California. Estimated cost of the building will be more than \$200,000.

Present plans call for 20,915 feet of floor space, the structure to incorporate the present primary rooms and auditorium that will be completely remodeled. The unit built in 1948 from old buildings from the war relocation center will be torn down. Classrooms and administrative offices and a multi-purpose room, cafeteria, gymnasium and indoor playground, 32 x 70 feet are planned. Cafeteria capacity will be 360. Present school-room capacity as of Oct. 3 is 340. The new building will allow for expansion.

Mrs. Cornett and Mrs. James Mott, Republican state vice president, returned the count route, meeting with grass root party workers in Curry and Coos Counties. The final meeting was a luncheon at Coos Bay, Nov. 12.
