Budget Cut Veto Draws Demo Wrath

WASHINGTON (AP)—Key Democrats in Congress today hopped on President Eisenhower's prediction of an unbalanced budget next year as a concession that his administration is reneging on campaign promises.

Administration may lead a hand, Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.), a member of the Appropriations Committee, said he was not surprised at Eisenhower's statement.

The Republicans promised in the election campaign last year that they would reduce taxes, balance the budget, and provide an adequate national defense," he said in a separate interview.

Demos Tell Of Air Fund Battle Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. John W. McCormack (D-Mass.) said today Democrats will fight in the next session of Congress for a two-billion-dollar increase in air defense funds to provide "adequate protection for American cities and American people."

McCormack, assistant Democratic leader in the House, said such a program could provide radar, interceptor planes and other devices to knock out all but 10 per cent of enemy bombers in any sudden attack.

Currently, he added, "it is a disgraceful situation—in case of a sneak attack our defenses are such that 70 per cent of the attacking planes can get through."

Rep. Winstead (D-Miss.), a member of the House Armed Forces Committee who returned last week from an eight-week inspection tour of American military bases abroad said in a separate interview he is convinced "we certainly must strengthen our air defenses at home as rapidly as possible."

He added that two billion dollars to finance such a program "could be saved easily" from foreign aid. "We have been spending money recklessly in some countries which are contributing little to the free world defense," he said. "We must concentrate our aid in the key countries which are cooperating with us."

Rep. Fisher (D-Tex.), another committee member, said he would favor increased air power, a complete radar screen, and all-out development of guided missiles.

The Eisenhower administration has indicated it favors boosting air defense funds, but by a much smaller amount than urged by McCormack. Secretary of Defense Wilson has suggested perhaps half a billion dollars.

Storms Rip Big Area Of U. S. Today

Stormy weather hit wide areas in the Rocky Mountains and Plains States Thursday but November's spell of spring-like weather continued over most of the eastern third of the nation.

Much of Colorado, Wyoming and Montana was snowed under with nearly a foot of snow in some sections. Rain and snow pelleted Eastern Utah and Western Kansas. Snow fell in Western Nebraska while heavy rain hit areas in Texas and Oklahoma. The storm centered on northeastern New Mexico and the Texas Panhandle early Thursday.

Temperatures dropped below freezing over much of the snow-covered area with readings near zero in some parts of Montana.

Light rain fell Thursday in the upper Mississippi Valley and from the Southern Plains. Showers or light rain also hit areas in Eastern Texas. There were some heavy falls, with Houston reporting 3.18 inches in 24 hours. Other rainy spots were in Western Washington and Oregon and extreme Northwestern California.

But skies were clear over most of the areas east of the Mississippi River and another day of spring-like temperatures were in prospect.

Morse Asks Caution In White Case

HILLSBORO (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse urged Oregonians Wednesday night to wait until all the facts are in before reaching any conclusion about the Harry Dexter White case.

The senator, addressing 400 persons in a speech sponsored by Washington County Democrats, said there were many questions still unanswered in that case.

He said he believed former President Truman should make available all the facts he knows, and added, "I won't condemn him until I know all the facts."

The senator said the former President's motives and loyalty were beyond questioning.

In the end, if the facts show a mistake was made, Morse continued, there are some extenuating circumstances to keep in mind: "The feeling in Washington then that an agreement could be reached with Russia; and the fact that Truman had no chance under President Roosevelt to prepare for the presidency and still was feeling his way along in the job in 1949."

The senator also urged federal construction of a Hells Canyon Dam and federal steps to ease the farmers' problems.

He advocated a food barter program with the U. S. getting in return for food some economic opportunities in foreign countries for U. S. capitalists.

"I'll never sit in the Senate and vote to put the farmer through an economic wringer of austerity on grounds that a food party is some form of creeping socialism," Morse said.

"You can't turn to the pages of history and show me any great civilization that rose to the pinnacle of military might, then followed a course of narrow economic isolationism and then survived," he said.
