Switch Comes In Check Case

SAN DIEGO (AP)—The forged checks which a University of Oregon music professor's wife once was accused of writing now have been blamed on another woman who resembles her.

The professor's wife, Mrs. Mary Ellen Allton, 38, Eugene, was cleared of the charge last May. She and her husband, Donald W. Allton, later filed a \$100,000 damage suit against the San Diego police chief and others, accusing them of false arrest.

Dist. Atty. Don Keller said another woman now has admitted writing the checks. He identified her as Mrs. Ann Esther Parham, 38, Ventura, Calif., who is held in the Los Angeles County jail.

He said she was arrested in Denver last month and accused with her former husband and his present wife of counterfeiting currency. The man, Donald Roquerre, 41, went to prison, the women were put on probation.

Mrs. Parham was brought to California for investigation of forgeries. Police said there were 50 to 60 checks passed in the Los Angeles area for about \$3,000.

Keller said Mrs. Parham admitted passing about 13 checks in the San Diego area for about \$1,000.

SALEM (AP)—Burglars took \$2,500 worth of liquor Tuesday night when they broke into a market at St. Paul, 20 miles north of here, state police said Wednesday.

The loot included 40 cases of whisky, 70 cartons of cigarettes, 12 boxes of cigars, and several boxes of candy.

They entered by climbing through a transom over the front door.

Police said they also entered a nearby lumber company store, taking saws, drills, saws, and other tools.

According to a report filed with the Oregon State Police by Harry DeLaour Nelson, Verlin L. Gebhart and Don W. Jarman, all of the Naval Air Training operations at San Diego, they had parked their car to attend a show and upon returning found the car stripped of its contents.

Missing articles included: one 650x16 tire, tube and wheel, a Craftsman tool box full of tools, three khaki blankets, two small hand bags containing clothes, one set of tire chains, one Ford fuel pump and a case containing a pair of size 10 roller skates.

CHILLOQUIN—A six months old baby was found dead this morning in his crib, allegedly the victim of suffocation or strangulation.

The infant, Phillip Marchington, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Marchington, was fed about 11 p.m. Wednesday night and according to the parents, it was customary for the baby to sleep through until morning.

On arising this morning, the parents found the baby lying face down. He had regurgitated his feeding and apparently died soon after.

The infant is survived by his parents, one brother, Scott, 3 years old; maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Marchington, Portland; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Adams also of Portland. His father is the science and mathematics instructor at Chiloquin High School.
