Duke Now Next in Line

LONDON (AP)—The Duke of Edinburgh took over the regency rights of Princess Margaret today as amendments to the 1937 Regency Act won final approval.

Queen Elizabeth II assented to the new legislation last night shortly after its final passage by the House of Lords. The House of Commons had unanimously approved the bill 10 days ago.

Now, if the Queen dies or becomes incapacitated before her 5-year-old son Prince Charles is 18, her husband would become regent ahead of her sister.

In the succession to the throne, however, Princess Margaret still stands third in line, after Charles and his baby sister, Princess Anne.

The Parliament rushed passage of the bill so action would be completed before the Queen and the duke leave on a Commonwealth tour. They are scheduled to depart Monday, going first to Bermuda.

Demo Leader Makes Speech

KANSAS CITY, Kan. (AP)—The American people will weigh the Republican Party's record against its promises despite "desperate attempts to divert attention from the real issues," Stephen Mitchell said Thursday night.

The Democratic national chairman quoted his Republican counterpart, Leonard Hall, as saying Communism would be the issue in the 1954 elections and asked this question:

"Does Mr. Hall mean that the Republicans are against Communism but we are in favor of it?"

"If Communism were truly an issue between the two parties, then somebody would have to be in favor of it and somebody against it," Mitchell told a dinner meeting of Kansas Democrats.

"Does he (Hall) mean that they are patriots but the Democratic Party, composed of more than half the people of this country, are something else?"

"Does he mean that they are opposed to having spies in government, but we are in favor of them?"

Mitchell said the Harry Dexter White controversy was a "political diversion" to cover up what he called the GOP involvement in scandals in New York and New Jersey and with farm problems.

Federal Spending Must Be Cut if National Debt To Be Held Down Next Year

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Eisenhower administration's best hope for the fiscal 1955 budget is a deficit of three to four billion dollars—attainable only if federal spending can be cut nearly six billions from the present rate.

A high administration official gave this estimate to reporters yesterday. He said that obviously a big part of any six-billion saving would have to come from national security spending, and is not yet in sight. He also said any such saving would be effected only if it could be done without impairing the national security.

His forecast assumed also that Congress will heed President Eisenhower's request for extension of present high corporate and excise tax rates beyond next April 1, when they are due for automatic reduction.

The informant, who stipulated that his name should not be used, gave these further forecasts:

1. The "cash budget" probably classifies as government income social security contributions, which exceed four billion dollars a year. The conventional budget does not, since they go into a special trust fund.
2. The administration will ask that the present 1 1/2 per cent rate of social security tax be extended for a year. The rate is due to go to 2 per cent on Jan. 1, before Congress convenes, but some adjustment could be made to refund any money collected at that rate.
3. The administration definitely will renew its request, rejected by Congress last summer, for an increase in the national debt ceiling from 275 billion dollars to 290 billion dollars.

There is not the slightest doubt, the official said, that the ceiling will have to be raised sooner or later.

This whole picture, an authoritative reflection of current talking at the Treasury Department, does not conflict with Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey's recent forecast of an eight to nine billion dollar deficit in the 1955 fiscal year starting next July 1.

Humphrey specified, in offering that estimate, that it did not take into account savings he said would be made.

If the savings are as substantial as top officials now hope, this is the picture which President Eisenhower will present to Congress in his budget message early in January.

Spending—66 or 67 billion dollars, compared to a 72-billion-dollar outline scheduled for the current fiscal year.

Income—About 63 billion dollars, as against more than 68 billion dollars this year.

Deficit—Approximately 3 1/2 billion dollars, or just about the same as this year's estimate of \$3,800,000,000.

"I Love Lucy" Keeps On Going Despite Harsh Critic

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—"I Love Lucy" keeps on rolling along. The Lucille Ball-Del Armatz show stays on its merry course, despite the headlines, critics' knocks and conflicting audience ratings. Some of the latter show "Lucy" still holding the No. 1 spot it has enjoyed for the past year or two. Other surveys claim "Dragnet" has overtaken the Monday night domestic show.

The "Lucy" troupe isn't worried, says Jess Oppenheimer, the sharp-eyed producer and head writer of the program.

"Ratings are nice, but they don't mean everything," he explained. "The important thing is audience acceptance, and I think we've got that. There was something wrong in the big lead we had over other shows last season. The situation wasn't good for TV. The other shows had to improve or something had to happen."

I asked if he thought the show had been affected by the sensational headlines about Lucille Ball's having registered as a Communist voter 17 years ago.

"No, I don't think it has had any effect," he remarked. "We were worried about it at the time, but now we can't notice any reaction. The number of crank letters we received are infinitesimal compared to how many we get commending Lucille."

There have been some critical raps about the sameness of some of the "Lucy" plots. What about it?

"We realize, too, that we can't go on doing the same things," Oppenheimer commented. "Perhaps we have had too many shows about Lucy wanting to get into show business or about the fights with her neighbors, the Mertzes. But we are getting more careful about seeking new kinds of plots."

BOSTON (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Benson said Friday a sound and prosperous agriculture cannot be built on "continuous subsidies from the federal treasury which result in burdensome surpluses and loss of markets."

Instead, Benson said, farm prosperity must depend on a strong demand for its products in the market place.

In a speech prepared for the New England Council, Benson outlined the contentions of those who advocate high farm price supports and those who want the support level flexible and dependent upon the level of supply.

There has been considerable speculation that the new farm program which the Eisenhower administration will present to Congress in January will call for flexible price supports.
