Mrs. Heady, a divorcee, has expressed a desire to marry Hall before their execution, court officials said. Hall, who also was married and divorced, has not indicated a similar desire, the officials reported.

The director of Federal Bureau of Prisons would have to give permission for such a marriage. There was small chance of an appeal. Roy Dietrich, court-appointed attorney for Hall, said he saw nothing to warrant appealing the decision of U. S. District Judge Albert L. Reeves.

The 34-year-old playboy and his 41-year-old alcoholic mistress watched dry-eyed as the tragic case drew to a dramatic close on the fourth day of the trial.

"They seemed relieved as they were hustled out of the courtroom, closely guarded by U. S. deputy marshals on their way back to their separate cells in the Jackson County Jail."

Acting U. S. Marshal William Tatman indicated they would be moved to the death row in the state prison at Jefferson City within a few days.

Mrs. Heady will be the first woman to die in the Missouri gas chamber. The 30 men who have been executed there have been stripped to the shorts to lessen the possibility of gas clinging to their clothing. Arrangements have been made for Mrs. Heady to be clad in long black shorts and a black halter. She will be blindfolded, as will Hall.

After the jury retired for its deliberations, a death recommendation for Hall was decided on immediately. However, one juror held out for life imprisonment for Mrs. Heady. It was learned last night.

He finally agreed on the death penalty for her also after an hour's persuasion.

The jury was out only 68 minutes.

Both Hall and Mrs. Heady, the once-respectable housewife who took to drink, pleaded guilty at their arraignment Nov. 3. The federal jury was called because without a recommendation of death from it the 79-year-old judge at most could have assessed only life terms against the two under the Lindbergh Kidnap Act.

Tax Case Authority Delegated Today

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey says he has delegated full authority to the Internal Revenue Service for handling individual tax cases.

This gradual handing down of authority, he said in an announcement yesterday, will cut duplication and delay while reserving policy decisions to the Treasury.

Discrimination In US Waning

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, Jewish service organization, was told today that religious and racial discrimination is on the wane in the United States.

In a report prepared for the opening of the league's 40th annual meeting, Judge David A. Rose of Boston, chairman of the group's Civil Rights Committee, said: "The nation has made substantial gains during the past year in reducing the incidence of racial and religious discrimination in employment, education, housing and other areas of American life."

Teen-Age Lawlessness On Gain in U.S. According To Children's Bureau Chief

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dr. Martha M. Eliot, chief of the Federal Children's Bureau, told investigating senators Thursday teen-age lawlessness is spreading fast and that facilities to stem the rise "are grossly inadequate."

The motherly looking witness, a veteran of more than 25 years with the bureau, said that at present rates of increase, the number of juveniles in serious trouble will have nearly doubled by 1960. She said the total might reach 750,000 by that year, a climb from today's level of an estimated 385,000.

Dr. Eliot accused economy-minded federal, state and local governments of failing to provide enough funds to do a real job in the juvenile delinquency field.

She spoke as the lead-off witness before a special Senate subcommittee holding public hearings on causes and possible remedies for the rise in youthful crime—an increase of 29 per cent in the last four years, she said.

"Only one out of six communities has a sufficient number of juvenile police officers," she said. She termed the 174 detention homes serving 2,500 juvenile courts across the land as far too few and imperfect in their setup. Too many of the courts handling delinquent children "lack proper counsel," Dr. Eliot said.

She said some persons have charged that "a breakdown" in the family home is a major cause of delinquency but "breakdown, I believe, is too strong a word for what is happening in most families."

"In most cases I think it is in-

difference, lack of understanding, perhaps ignorance, confusion."

"Juvenile delinquency is certainly not the worry of the family alone," Dr. Eliot said. What is needed, she said, is teamwork between the family, the community and government agencies.

She counseled that the nation needs "new modes of treatment, new types of facilities" to deal with wayward youngsters.

"With them we should neither be lax nor punitive. We must rehabilitate them. . . I do not believe that punishment ever in itself has changed attitudes or has brought about reform of the individual." The child in trouble, she said, is entitled to "tailor-made treatment" of his case by "better-trained workers" than now available.

STORM WARNING

SEATTLE (AP) — The Weather Bureau posted small craft warnings at 8:30 a.m. Friday for the Washington and Oregon coasts as far south as Cape Blanco. They also apply to the mouth of Puget Sound, from Everett and Port Townsend to Blaine.

The forecast was for southerly winds, increasing to 25 to 35 miles an hour during the afternoon and evening.

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
