

Yugo Vote Fixed For Tito Regime

BELOGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Communist-dominated Yugoslavia elected a new "National Skupstina" — its People's Parliament — Sunday. The ballot will be sectioned but rigid rules make the election a one-party primary and assure a President Tito's administration a whopping vote of confidence.

The countrywide balloting will be conducted under the new constitution. It bans antigovernment candidates and restricts office-seekers to members of Tito's "Socialist Alliance of the Working Peoples." But it does permit allied member to contest for individual seats.

A voter also can mark out all the candidates to show disapproval.

Cattleman Of the Year Banquet Set

A banquet honoring Oregon's Cattleman of the Year for 1953 will be held in Prineville at the Ochoco Inn on Tuesday, December 1, according to Frank Beeson, Executive Secretary for the Oregon Cattlemen's Association. The winner will be selected from the following district candidates: Henry Gerber, Klamath Falls; Herbert Chandler, Baker; J. R. Breese, Prineville; Everett Shibley, Clackamas County; and Gerry Klose, Grants Pass.

District No. 1 candidate, Henry Gerber, is an outstanding community and civic leader as well as a cattleman in the Klamath Falls area. He is a past president of the Klamath County Cattlemen's Association, member of the executive committee of the American National Cattleman's Association, member of the Grazing District Board of Directors and a member of the Oregon Cattlemen's Association Executive Committee.

His extensive cattle operation is run in both Klamath County and Tehama County, California, where the cattle are wintered.

Herbert Chandler, Baker, the District No. 2 winner is a nationally known figure. He is president of the American Hereford Association and is one of the nation's outstanding purebred Hereford breeders. Mr. Chandler, with his son Charles Chandler operate their ranch near Baker, which was established in the role of registered Herefords in the year 1898.

Cook County nominee for Cattleman of the Year — winner of District No. 3 — is J. R. Breese of Tuttle Hereford Ranch. Mr. Breese is a pioneer stockman whose ranch was established in the year 1888.

Mr. Everett Shibley is the Clackamas County nominee for Cattleman of the Year and was the winner in the District No. 4 eliminations. Mr. Shibley began ranching at the age of 18 years and has been engaged in the business since that time. His ranch on Clear Creek has adopted excellent grass land practices including weed control, irrigation and fertilization.

Gerry Klose, Grants Pass was the winner of the District 5 eliminations. He came to the U. S. in 1929, an emigrant from Germany, and settled in Portland, Oregon. A thriving brick business in Portland was Mr. Klose early business career but interest in livestock soon caught his fancy. In 1929 he moved with his family to a 300 acre ranch on the Rogue River to raise purebred Angus cattle.

The state winner will be chosen from this group on November 23 and will be announced at the Cattleman of the Year banquet in Prineville on December 1.

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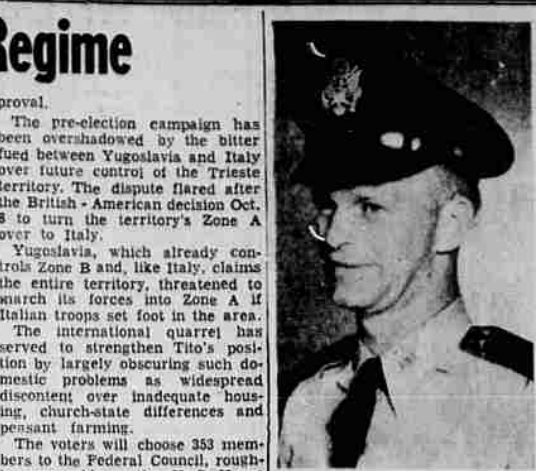
The Klamath County Dental Society elected to office for the year 1954 the following:

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Beer Sale To Minors Case Fails

It was evident Thursday that legally there is a lot of difference between the words "give" and "sell" when District Judge D. E. Van Vactor dismissed a charge of giving liquor to minors against John Thurman, 53-year-old railroad worker.

Thurman was arrested after he

was alleged to have provided "alcoholic spirits" in the form of beer for a teenage Halloween party.

Five KUHS students testified that they went to Thurman's home on the night of Halloween and asked him to buy some beer for them.

A 15-year-old girl declared from the witness stand that Thurman accompanied the students in an automobile to a nearby grocery store.

"He went in the store and a few minutes later came out with a case

of beer which he put in the car," the girl declared. "One of the boys who had given him a \$5 bill to pay for the beer, told him to keep the 50 cents in change."

After Deputy District Attorney Joe Thalhofer had finished the state's case, Defense Attorney George Proctor moved for dismissal of the charge. He contended that the state's evidence had tended to prove that Thurman had sold a case of beer to the minors instead

of giving it to them.

Judge Van Vactor held that the defendant should have been charged with sale of beer to minors. He dismissed the case.

Proctor declared his client denied that he had either given or sold beer to the students.
