NEW YORK (AP)—The ancient and honorable baseball managers' union is in the midst of its annual fall outing, with the major attraction, as usual, being the merry-go-round.

Rogers Hornsby started the meeting off by falling from his seat in Cincinnati. This marked the sixth time that The Rajah had been dismounted in the major leagues alone. This time, he came close to finishing the season—an accomplishment for him.

Charley Dressen balked and was thrown out in Brooklyn, where Pee Wee Reese refused to reach for the brass ring.

Jimmy Dykes highlighted the party by slipping from the White

Elephant in Philadelphia, but quickly hopped back on the wagon in Baltimore, even though his signing means that the new club will pay two other blokes, Marty Marion and Hornsby, for not managing the Orioles.

Dykes was a cinch to get back in business. The little round man with the big cigar is a long established member of the guild in good standing, you see. When you're that, you don't have to worry. It's been that way for years. Whenever they fire a manager, they invariably hire a guy somebody else tied the can to.

The society lost hardy perennials in Bill McKechnie, Joe McCarthy, Burt Shotton and Billy Southworth. McKechnie decided he had enough after his final fling in Cincinnati

When Branch Rickey was fed up with Leo Durocher at Ebbets Field, the Giants took The Lip and last summer gave him a two-year contract for finishing 35 games off the pace.

Steve O'Neill has moved often enough to do a travel column. When the Red Sox fell apart under Stout Steve, Joe Cronin brought in Lou Boudreau, whom Hank Greenberg thought couldn't handle the Indians' pitchers.

Charley Grimm, twice fired by the Cubs, is a Miracle Man in

Milwaukee. Fred Haase hasn't had a big league break in 17 years. Practically a genius in Triple A, he drew the Browns in the American and now has the Pirates.

Casey Stengel was paid for not managing the Dodgers. When a taxicab hit Stengel and mangled his leg, one writer said the driver should have been proclaimed Boston's baseball man of the year. Six years later, at 58, Ol' Case won the first of an unprecedented five consecutive pennants and world championships with the Yankees.

Whenever Bucky Harris is out of a job, he just goes home to Washington. Nothing adds up in baseball except the attendance figures.

And, in more places than not, they're getting too easy to count.

Pasadena Tilt Hangs In Balance for Both

The concluding and most exciting chapter of the 1953 Pacific Coast Conference football schedule will be written Saturday on widely separated fields—Los Angeles and Palo Alto.

Rose Bowl hopes of the UCLA Bruins and the Stanford Indians hinge on the outcomes of these games. The Bruins clash with their cross-town foes, the Southern California Trojans, in the south.

Stanford entertains the California Bears at Palo Alto in the Coast's oldest gridiron rivalry formed in 1892.

UCLA and Stanford possess equal conference records of five wins and one defeat. They must win to remain in consideration for the bowl nomination.

If both come through, Stanford will have a technical edge in already having conquered UCLA, 21-

20. However, the Bruins would have a superior overall record for the season, marred by only the one setback by Stanford.

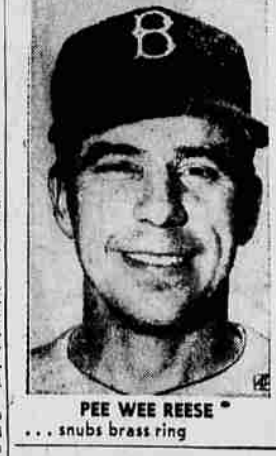
Stanford lost in the PCC to USC 23-20 but also was defeated by College of the Pacific and Illinois outside of the league.

The Bruins are 6 point favorites to get by USC and Stanford is a like choice over California.

The Rose Bowl nominee will be decided by a vote of the conference faculty athletic representatives. Results will be announced Monday from the commissioner's office in Los Angeles.

Other conference encounters send Washington against Washington State at Seattle and Oregon State against Oregon at Eugene. These also are tradition-steeped rivalries. Washington and Oregon are the favorites.

Idaho closes out a disappointing schedule in a non-conference contest with Utah State at Boise.

Oregon Wins Run Grind

PORTLAND (AP)—The University of Oregon won the team championship and the school's Ken Reiser set a new record in the sixth annual Oregon Intercollegiate Cross-Country races Thursday.

Reiser was timed at 15:40.5 for the three miles, 36.2 seconds under his old mark set in 1951.

Team scores were: Oregon, 39; University of Portland (the host school) 52; Oregon State College 92; Portland State College 118; Clark Junior College 148.

Other schools entered were Oregon College of Education, Reed College, Willamette University and Pacific University.

University of British Columbia entered two men in the race, but since five entries are required, its team score was not counted.

The lineup will include three seniors playing their last game for OSC. They are guard Laverne Ferguson, team captain; center Joe Pulwyley, and halfback Ralph Carr.

Iowa Threatens Irish Record

NEW YORK (AP)—Top-ranking Notre Dame takes the first of its last three big steps toward an undefeated football season tomorrow when it meets Iowa, always a tough foe for the Irish.

After the Hawkeyes, Notre Dame faces Southern California and Southern Methodist. One of the

three might stop Frank Leahy's club.

Iowa has a pesky habit of breaking Notre Dame winning streaks. In 1921 it stopped the Irish after they had gone 22 games without defeat. In 1939 Notre Dame won six, then lost to Iowa. The same thing happened in 1940.

Southern California will have its hands full this weekend too when it runs up against UCLA. The Bruins are bidding for Rose Bowl glory and need this one to be assured of at least a tie for the Pacific Coast Conference title.

They could win it outright if California stops Stanford. Losses by both Stanford and UCLA would leave them tied for the crown, just as would victories by both clubs.

A tie would mean a vote of the conference schools just as in the Big Ten, where a deadlock also is in prospect for the Eastern Rose Bowl representative. Illinois, crushed by Wisconsin a week ago, needs a decision over Northwestern tomorrow to finish even with Michigan State. The Spartans finished their conference play last week with a single loss, 6-0 to Purdue.

Four Race Fans Killed

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Death haunted the road today as 128 drivers prepared for the second lap of the Pan-American Road Race, which so far has cost five lives.

The 1,912-mile drive from southern Mexico to the United States border began yesterday. Near Tehuantepec, a Ford driven by Robert P. Christie of Grants, Pa., Ore., overturned on a curve. A crowd of spectators swarmed onto the highway and into the path of another Ford driven by Mickey Thompson of El Monte, Calif.

Before Thompson could stop, his car plowed into the throng, killing four of the spectators. Neither Thompson nor Christie was injured.

Minutes later and only a short distance up the highway Giuseppe Escosutti of Italy was killed when the Ferrari in which he was the co-driver overturned.

A Lancia driven by Felice Bonetto of Italy was first, covering the 330 miles from Tuxtla Gutierrez on the Guatemalan border to Oaxaca in 3 hours 28 minutes 14 seconds.

Maryland appears to have the inside track to the Orange Bowl, which matches the Big Seven champion against the best in the Atlantic Coast Conference. However, since the ACC is brand new this year and the members aren't playing a full schedule, the bowl nominee will be picked by ballot with Duke being about the only opposition to Jim Tatum's lads.

The Blue Devils were upset by Army and tied by Navy but they get a chance to polish their reputation tomorrow against Georgia Tech.

BOUNCED

In the Southwest Conference, where the Cotton Bowl host is still undetermined, the Rice Owls will try to stay in the picture with a victory over Texas Christian Baylor, which was bounced from the unbeaten ranks to the role of a two-time loser in two weeks, will try to regain winning form against Southern Methodist but it probably will be close.

Oklahoma, the only team with a major bowl invitation signed, sealed and delivered, ends its Big Seven season against Nebraska. The Sooners, Big Seven champions, will play in the Orange Bowl.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Stanford halfback Al Napoleon, charged in Honolulu with draft evasion, surrendered Thursday and was released immediately, to reappear in two weeks after his attorney has studied the case.

Napoleon said "I thought I was deferred. I can't understand where the foulup occurred. I'm ready to volunteer for the Army any time."

Bruins Favored

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Striving to remain in the run for the Rose Bowl, the Bruins of UCLA Friday remained slight favorites to edge past the University of Southern California in their showdown game Saturday.

These rabid rivals for local and Pacific Coast Conference honors, meeting for the 22nd time, were promised good weather and a turnout of more than 80,000 in Memorial Coliseum.

The nation's football fans—television, that is—can view the warfare, too. It is the "Game of the Week" on the college schedule and will be screened by 85 or 90 stations across the country by the National Broadcasting Company.

The game starts at 1:30 p.m. UCLA, beaten only by Stanford in its eight games, must win to stay abreast of or pass Stanford in the bid for the bowl assignment against a Big Ten team New Year's Day.

A victory by the Bruins, coupled with a Stanford triumph over California in their traditional clash at Palo Alto, would give UCLA and the Indians an identical conference-Bowl record of 6-1-0.
