

Etradition Mixup Told In Letter

More trouble appeared in store Monday for Dawn Starr, Oklahoma night club dancer, freed here last month on a writ of habeas corpus. She was accused of giving a barber a bogus check for shaving her legs.

Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney of Portland, counsel for the dancer, made public a copy of a letter sent by Governor Paul Patterson of Oregon to Governor Goodwin Knight of California, turning down extradition but recommending further action.

Mahoney said the copy of the letter mailed to him by Governor Patterson stated:

"I have before me your application for extradition of Dawn Starr, charged with the crime of issuing checks without sufficient funds.

"I have been informed that a habeas corpus hearing was held and the said Dawn Starr was released from jail. She is not now in custody.

"Inasmuch as she was released as a result of this prior procedure, I am advised by the attorney general that I have no alternative but to deny these papers, pending her arrest.

"If it is your wish to submit papers again after she has been taken into custody, I, of course, will be most happy to give further consideration to your request. It is with reluctance that I deny your request for rendition of Miss Starr.

"However, I believe the protection inherent in our system of justice requires further action on the part of your state.

"Mahoney said that if any further attempt is made to extradite Miss Starr, he and the girl's associate counsel, U. S. Balentine, of Klamath Falls will fight it.

"We have notified Governor Patterson that if California takes further action, we will demand a governor's hearing," Mahoney declared. "We feel the girl has been persecuted enough."

Miss Starr is on one year's probation in Oregon after pleading guilty to a check charge in Circuit Court.

Three Die In Road Wrecks

Two were killed Saturday in a head-on collision of two cars two miles south of Sutherlin. They were James Edward Chambers, 55, Eugene, and Olef Olson, 63, Roseburg.

Chambers' wife and their two children, passengers in one car, were injured. Olson was alone in his car.

Jerry Newberg, 13, of Portland, died Sunday from injuries suffered in a two-car collision in Portland Saturday night. The other car was driven by Raymond K. Etter, 44, Salem. Etter and his wife were injured.

Asia Youth Draws Praise

MANILA (AP) — U. S. Vice President Nixon told an audience of 50,000 cheering youths Monday the "young people of Asia are on the march and will decide the future of the world."

In his only public speech in a four-day visit to the Philippines, Nixon said:

"The young people of Asia are going to be the ones who will decide the future of Asia and, deciding the future in Asia and southeast Asia, they will decide the future of the world."

Nixon said that while the world conflict today is military and economic, "the most significant battle which goes on in the world today is not military or economic but it is a battle for the minds, hearts and souls of men."

"Who wins that battle will rule the peoples of the world."

"In the Philippines you have made your choice on the side of free nations as against slave nations."

French Forces Open New Attack

HANOI, Indochina, (AP) — The French air force unleashed new attacks Monday on Communist-led Vietminh divisions threatening French positions in the Red River delta and northwest Indochina.

French fighters and bombers flew more than 100 sorties. Chief targets were highway No. 35 leading from outside the northern rim of the delta to Communist China, and points around Thain-guyen, reportedly the administrative capital for rebel chief Ho Chi Minh, 40 miles north of Hanoi, and Tuyen Quang, 65 miles northwest of Hanoi.

ROTERDAM, The Netherlands (AP) — The 6,214-ton American freighter Hurricane ran aground in a heavy fog Monday in the new waterway approach from the North Sea to Rotterdam harbor. There was no reported damage to the ship.

A companion, Charles Morton Copher, 38, managed to swim to shore when their boat capsized as they were lowering a net into the water.

Copher later was arrested on a charge of illegal operation of a set net in a closed stream.

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Rezoning Proposition In City Area Brings Protest From Some Home Owners

City Council will take final action tonight on the proposed rezoning of a portion of Main street. If the rezoning ordinance is passed, it will change the area of Main from the canal to the intersection of East Main and Martin from Zone 2 residential to Zone 3 business.

Residents and property owners in the area have expressed their views on the proposal, pro and con.

Persons who oppose the rezoning say that residential property owners in the area are almost unanimously opposed to rezoning, and that their opinions should be seriously considered for the following reasons:

"They purchased the property and built homes with the understanding it was residential property; they have a right to expect that designated residential areas will continue until there is a city-wide demand for a change, not a request of a few selfish individuals who would destroy a beautiful residential district to make money; the residential property owners have maintained attractive homes there—unattractive properties in the area are mostly vacant, purchased for speculative purposes or rental properties."

These same people say that good city planning requires that recreational areas be located in residential districts and that the swimming pool will increase property values.

"They say, too, that the traffic safety committee evidently recognized a traffic hazard in the area since parking is restricted to one side of the street; the opening of Alameda from Shasta Way will increase traffic on the street and add to the problem."

Other reasons opposing the rezoning have been submitted to the Council. Some of them follow:

"The residential property owners have permanent homes. If the proposed rezoning is allowed it is evident that the street must be widened and in effect the residential property owners will be taxed for the benefit of the commercial property owners around them, which from a standpoint of residential property owners is undesirable, not to mention the unjustified expense involved."

"The question as to the technical legality of certain operations presently located in the area has been extended by the proponents of rezoning. Not one of these operations is completely commercial: The paint shop is a storage and warehouse in conjunction with a residence. (Were it a retail outlet it would fall in the category of being completely commercial.)

"It has long been a recognized privilege of a medical doctor to practice in his own residence.

"A church, hospital and health service are not commercial.

"The citizens of the community voted for this location—a residential area—for the Municipal Swimming Pool. When the Recreation Committee selected this site it was with the idea in mind that this location is the only centralized location from the standpoint of population, having hot artesian water available and located in a residential area.

The Recreation Committee opposed the rezoning, saying that no necessity for rezoning was ever presented; the request for rezoning does not necessarily reflect the wishes of a majority of the affected property owners; the existing vehicular traffic problem will be increased by the operation of the pool and the operation of business houses on each side of the street would add the pedestrian hazard to this problem.

"If the council will examine the proposal with the long term view of the city and discount the prejudice and selfish motives which can be read into the controversy, they can make but one decision," according to the opposers.

Those who favor the rezoning point out that it would only be conforming to present conditions since there are what they term "business establishments" in the area already and the people gave their approval to making the area a semi-business district when they voted for the swimming pool.

Interested persons will have their last chance to express their views before action is taken by the Council tonight.

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
