Mathews, Yakima, Wash., Mrs. Pearl Gilmore, San Francisco, Mrs. Dorothy Ash, Morton Wash., Mrs. Lee Brown, Tulelake, a granddaughter, Janet Costello, who made her home for many years with her grandmother; eight other grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held from O'Hair's Memorial Chapel, at 11 a.m., today.

Interment and final rites will be in Woodlawn cemetery, San Francisco.

Prisoner Recaptured

Sheriff Murray Britton revealed Tuesday that Benjamin Gilpin, ex-convict, had escaped from the County Jail on November 7 and was apprehended Monday in Red Bluff, Calif.

Gilpin, whose criminal record dates back to 1925, was serving a year in the County Jail after he pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking a window not his own. He was arrested by city police after he forced his way into the Hahn Electric Co. store.

The fugitive, a cook by trade, was working in the jail kitchen at the time of his escape. He donned another inmate's coat and walked out of the jail with a pall of garbage.

Jail records show Gilpin served terms for burglary in Nevada and Washington state prisons. He has a coast-to-coast police record which reveals he was held in Miami, Fla., Richmond, Va., and many other cities. Red Bluff police are holding him on a vagrancy charge.

Youth Faces Liquor Count

A 19-year-old Sprague River youth, who juvenile officers say was bootlegging at a Bonanza school carnival was held in the County Jail Tuesday.

The accused liquor vendor is Ross William Montgomery. According to juvenile Officer Francis Mathews, the youth provided two bottles of wine and a dozen bottles of beer for three boys and two girls at the school carnival Friday night.

Mathews said the "customers" ranged from 11 to 15 years in age. The juvenile officer also said a 12-year-old boy became so ill from the effects of the beer and wine, he had to be treated at a hospital.

One of the girls in the party gave Montgomery a \$20 bill. Mathews declared, "He bought the beer and wine in a Bonanza tavern."

Montgomery was to be arraigned Tuesday in District Judge D. E. Van Vactor's court. He is charged with selling liquor to minors.

Thieves Nab Store Safe

Thieves, apparently experienced in heavy moving, broke into the Schneider's Variety and Remedy store, 4801 South Sixth, late last night or early this morning and hauled off a safe estimated to weigh 400 pounds.

The robbery was discovered when the store was opened at 8:40 a.m. this morning by the owner, M. Eklund, who reported about \$700 of store money was in the safe and an undetermined amount of stamps and money belonging to the Postal Department. The store is a Post Office sub-station.

Entry was made by taking out the center of the lock in the front door and tracks indicated the safe was skidded or rolled to the back door and loaded in a pickup or light truck.

The safe is said to have been about 30 inches high, 30 wide and about 30 inches deep.

A thorough check of the store failed to reveal anything else missing, according to Eklund. Oregon State Police were investigating the robbery this morning.

Tools Stolen From Camp Shack

Dennis Collins, employed by Tulana Farms at their Tulelake camp reported to Oregon State Police Monday that his room at the camp had been entered some time Sunday and a quantity of hand tools, wearing apparel and five uncashed pay checks totaling over \$700 taken.

Wade Crawford, Delegate To DC for Tribal Council, Speaks Out on Law Issue

Scores of Klamath Indians have been illegally prosecuted in state courts, Wade Crawford, tribal leader, declared Tuesday.

Crawford, who was an official delegate of the Klamath General Tribal Council to the 83rd Congress, issued a statement in which he said every Indian who was imprisoned or fined by the justice court in Chiloquin up until last August 15 has a valid claim for damages.

However, the Indian leader believes that when Public Law 280 became effective on August 15, the state or Oregon automatically obtained jurisdiction over all crimes committed by Indians on the Klamath Reservation.

The band benefit dance held at the Red Barn in Dorris the night of Saturday, Nov. 14, was an unqualified success, according to Mrs. Ray Wemple, chairman of the band benefit committee.

Fifty dollars was cleared from the auction of cakes donated by Butte Valley women. 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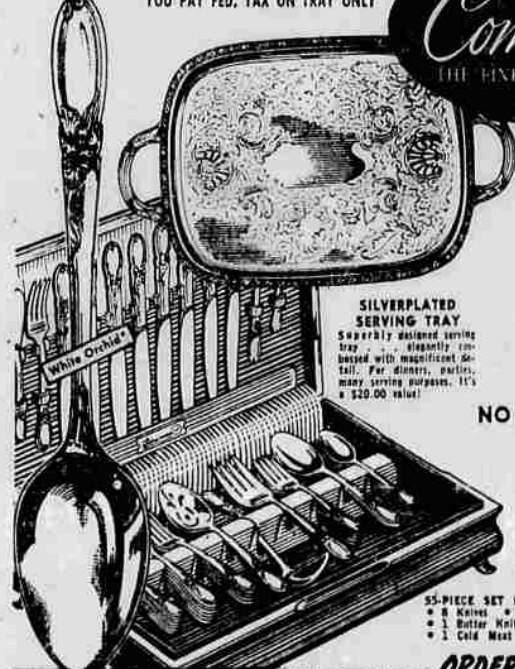
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23 Years Ago
