CHICAGO LIVESTOCK

CHICAGO (AP) — Receipts of hogs fell 3,500 below expectations Wednesday and prices responded by jumping up 50 to mostly 75 cents. A few loads of choice 180 to 220 pound weights brought a top of \$22.75, up 75 cents from Tuesday.

In early dealings slaughter steers and heifers sold unevenly steady to 50 cents lower. Top was \$32.90 for high prime steers.

In the sheep section prices were weak to mostly 50 cents lower on slaughter lambs. Most good and choice woolled lambs sold from \$18.00 to \$20.50.

Salable receipts were estimated at 6,500 hogs, 14,000 cattle, 300 calves and 1,500 sheep.

CHICAGO (AP) — All corn contracts except December moved up into new seasonal high ground on the board of trade Wednesday in reflection of continued light receipts of the cash grain.

Strength in corn helped the rest of the market, which firmed after an erratic start. Soybeans came ahead strongly in the closing half hour on short covering prior to the Thanksgiving holiday.

In addition to the light receipts, which is in part a result of importations under the government loan program, corn demand stemmed from a reported sale of 300,000 bushels to Mexico.

Justice To Stick To German Job

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP) — Chief Justice William Clark of the U. S. Court of Appeals in Germany said Wednesday he had been fired by the State Department for "failing to take orders." However, the jurist declared he would ignore the dismissal notice and continue to hold court.

Clark, a native of Princeton, N. J., was recently named head of a three-man group assigned by the American Association of Lawyers in Germany to investigate reports that telephones in the headquarters of U. S. High Commissioner James B. Conant were equipped with recording devices.

The U. S. high commission at Bonn issued a statement saying the State Department decided a decline in court business and for against reappointing Clark due to economy reasons. The commission refused to comment on Clark's statement that he was fired for failing to take orders, and that he would continue to hold court.

At a news conference Wednesday, Clark said he had received a cable Monday from the State Department declaring him "surplus" and advising that he would not be reappointed when his regular term ends Jan. 8.

"They ordered me back to the United States for consultations" within the next 10 days," he said. "But I am not going to go. This is an attempt to discipline somebody who won't take orders. The shocking thing is that judges are not supposed to take orders. I am the chief justice of an independent court."

Charging that the State Department regarded the chief justice as "a State Department clerk," Clark asserted it "would take much more than locking the door" to keep him from the bench.

Clark is a former judge of the Third U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals at Philadelphia.

Clark said he would not vacate his office even on Jan. 8 because he believes his tenure is indefinite and that any removal must come for cause.

Police Check Break-Ins

City police were called Tuesday to investigate a break-in and an attempted break-in at two South Sixth Street business houses.

George Anderson, owner and operator of the Roundup Tavern reported finding the front door open when he came to work. Investigation disclosed the back door was also ajar and a four gallon jar containing about \$150 in pennies and 15 or 20 one dollar bills was missing from the back bar.

The janitor who had closed the tavern at about 3:30 a. m. stated he was positive the doors were closed when he left. A lid to the jar was found near the back door.

An attempted break-in that was apparently unsuccessful was reported by the Lee Hendricks Drug Store, 2212 South Sixth.

Unable to get his key in the lock when he arrived to open the store Tuesday morning, Hendricks told city police it appeared that someone had used a chisel and hammer in an effort to pry the plate from around the lock.

A check of contents of the store disclosed nothing was missing and it was believed the attempted robbery was scared off before gaining entrance.

Man Held In Check Deal

A call from Warren Mason, manager of the Piggly Wiggly store at 7th and Pine Tuesday sent city police searching for a man who the night before had bought groceries at the store and paid with two checks, one for \$12.83 and the other for \$25.

Both checks were signed by William Lonnie Shoemaker, who received considerable change from the checks after paying for his purchases.

Obtaining a description of the man city police picked him up a short time later as he was about to board a southbound bus.

Taken to the police station for questioning he presented a transfer slip from a Bakersfield bank showing his account was being transferred to a local bank but no amount was listed on the slip.

When first questioned Shoemaker stated he had \$125 in the Bakersfield bank, but further questioning brought the statement that he had only about \$6.

He was arraigned on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses and waived preliminary hearing. His bail has been set at \$1500.

Thanksgiving to be Quiet In Korea, for First Time Since War Started in '50

SEOUL (AP) — American troops in Korea and their United Nations and Korean friends will eat turkey and fixings together Thursday on the first Thanksgiving day in four years unmarred by Communist shellfire.

South Koreans and soldiers of United Nations in this war-torn nation have eagerly adopted the traditional American Thanksgiving holiday and will join in the celebration.

Prayers, turkey dinners and entertainment are planned.

Army officials emphasize there will be no relaxation of the alert for possible Communist renewal of the war.

Many Army and Marine units will enjoy their first real day off in months under the policy of Gen. Maxwell Taylor, 8th Army commander, to celebrate "Thanksgiving as normally as possible" within the tactical situation.

The Army announced that more than 750 tons of turkey will be eaten, willingly and unwillingly.

Turkey might be an anticipated, special dish in the United States but in Korea it is a standard staple, reaching troops in one form or another two or three times weekly.

One Marine officer, asked about his meals, failed to mention turkey but pointed with pride to a menu including shrimp. Another mess officer told Associated Press reporter William Barnard he was trying to arrange for another delicacy—boiled eel with mustard.

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Trieste Term Discouraging

ROME (AP) — Source close to the Italian government said Wednesday it was discouraged by Yugoslavia's latest conditions on a live-power conference to settle the Trieste dispute.

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Court Kept Busy With Full List

An AWOL army private who recounted how he went to prison in Wyoming after an old-fashioned gun duel in which his adversary was slain, pleaded guilty in Circuit Court Wednesday to burglary in a Merrill clothing store.

Also before the court Wednesday morning was Louis Jose Mays, 67, probation violator, who was sentenced to not more than five years in Oregon State Prison.

Judge David R. Vandenberg castigated Mays for repeated law violations.

"The record shows you entered a plea of guilty to obtaining money under false pretenses in January, 1950," the judge said. "At that time you had a record. I gave you probation."

"You violated that probation and were convicted of crime in another state. You were brought back here and I gave you probation again. Within two weeks, you violated the terms of that probation. I sentence you to not more than five years in Oregon State Prison."

The AWOL army private was Charles A. Ballard, 37, who admitted stealing clothes from the Merrill Clothing Store. He told Judge Vandenberg he was sentenced to serve one to 16 years in Wyoming State Prison after he killed a man in a gun fight.

Ballard also told the court he was set aside by the court last week, Wednesday entered a plea of not guilty to the charge. Secor, on his last appearance, told the court he took the car with the owner's permission. He entered a new plea of not guilty to the charge. Secor is represented by Attorney George Proctor. Trial was set for November 30.

Lawrence Richard Swain, alias Larry O'Shea, charged with passing a bogus check, was remanded to the sheriff pending further investigation of his case.
