

New Memorial Shaft Will Replace Old Marker Soon

A new Memorial Shaft, to be erected on the courthouse lawn, will soon be under construction and current plans call for dedication of the new shaft on Memorial Day, 1954. The present shaft, which was constructed of wartime materials and erected in 1943, will be torn down to make way for the new, all stone, structure. A committee formed to renovate the old shaft succeeded in raising \$1000 toward the purpose of the \$2000 goal. In view of the fact that several pledges for a permanent memorial were received, the committee changed its plans and set their sights for a new shaft. With a generous contribution from the Elks lodge, sufficient funds were raised to start planning the structure. It is anticipated that a few hundred dollars additional for present funds may be needed, and those wishing to contribute should contact the Klamath War Memorial Committee through the County Veterans Service Officer in the courthouse or call 3326. A list of the honored war dead and those who have so generously contributed to the fund follows. WASHINGTON (AP) — Two financial experts were on hand for cross examination at the Hells Canyon hearing Wednesday after attorneys finish with Maj. Gen. T. M. Robins, former assistant chief of Army Engineers. Stewart S. Hawes and S. T. Mason Frey, New York investment bankers, were designated to follow Robins to the witness chair at a Power Commission hearing on Idaho Power Co.'s applications to build three dams in the Snake River between Idaho and Oregon. All three are witnesses for Idaho Power.

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Murder Trial End Asked

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) — Attorneys for Mrs. Diane Wells, 31, planned to ask a federal judge Wednesday to dismiss first degree murder charge filed after the fatal shooting of her businessman-husband.

In initial legal skirmishes in U. S. District Court here, the attorneys also planned to ask for a trial in another city, if the dismissal action failed, and for separation of Mrs. Wells' case from that of Negro drummer Johnny Warren.

Mrs. Wells and Warren were charged in a joint indictment with the slaying of Cecil Wells, 51, Fairbanks automobile dealer and president of the Alaska Chamber of Commerce, last Oct. 17. Both have maintained they are innocent of the crime.

Mrs. Wells attorney said they will ask for a change of venue on the grounds a fair trial would not be possible here. Warren was brought here Tuesday from Oakland, Calif., where he was arrested three weeks ago on an Alaska warrant. He was lodged in jail here.

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
