

# McCarthy Answers HST Charges In Fiery Air Address On Reds In US

NEW YORK (AP)—Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy says the Truman administration was "crawling with Communists."

In his formal rebuttal to former President Harry S. Truman, McCarthy charges that Truman—while a U. S. senator and vice presidential candidate—intervened against the dismissal from government service of George Shaw Wheeler, who later deserted to Communism.

McCarthy says that after Truman became president, Wheeler was reinstated, although he had been dismissed as a Communist.

The senator gives this description on what he calls "Trumanism":

"The placing of your political party above the interest of the country, regardless of how much the country is damaged thereby."

Praising the Eisenhower administration's efforts to rid the government service of subversives, he added however:

"Let us glance at a few cases where our (Republicans) battling average is zero—where we struck out."

As an example he cites John Patton Davies, who he says helped deliver China into Communist hands.

The Wisconsin Republican senator addressed a nationwide television and radio audience last night in answer to Truman, who had assailed "McCarthyism" in a TV-radio speech a week ago Monday night in connection with the Harry Dexter White controversy.

Truman was reported asleep in bed at his Independence, Mo., home last night an hour before McCarthy went on the air.

Nor was there any immediate comment from President Eisenhower.

In his reference to the handling of Communists in government, McCarthy said he is somewhat concerned that the Republican party might also fall victim to the same evil which beset the Democrat (sic) party and did so much toward destroying this nation."

Speaking of Davies, McCarthy said:

"He was unanimously referred by the McCarran committee to the Justice Department for indictment because he lied under oath about his activities in trying to put Communists and espionage agents in key spots in the Central Intelligence Agency. Why is this man still a high official in our government?"

Davies, a career diplomat who was cleared by the Loyalty Review Board during the Truman administration, recently was questioned by the board again and then returned to Germany, where he is an adviser to the U. S. high commissioner. He had been assailed by McCarthy before.

McCarthy also took the Republican administration to task because there has been no accounting of 909 Americans who are known to have been taken prisoner in the Korean War and who never returned. He said the Eisenhower administration is not responsible for the situation, but is responsible for its proper handling.

McCarthy, declaring his fight against communism in government to be an issue in the 1954 election campaign, said:

"The truth, hapless, unpalatable fact is that communism is an issue and will be an issue in 1954."

"It would not be an issue between our two great political parties if they were united in fighting communism. They are not so united today. Truman's diatribe against those who expose Communists is the best proof of that."

Looking to the 1954 Senate and House elections, McCarthy said:

"If the American people agree with Truman that what he calls 'McCarthyism' is bad, that it is wrong to dig out and expose traitors, they have a chance to get rid of me as chairman of the investigating committee next fall by defeating any Republican up for election."

President Eisenhower told a news conference last week that he hoped the problem of Communists in government would be resolved in time so that it would not be an issue next year.

McCarthy cited several previously mentioned persons as examples of Communists in government during the Truman administration, and added:

"Another case in which Truman intervened in behalf of a Communist agent was the case of George Shaw Wheeler. On April 13, 1950, Wheeler, who had been working for the U. S. government in Europe, deserted to the Communist cause, denouncing the 'Gestapo method' of the United States and stating that he was going to stand 'proudly with the Soviet regime.' Wheeler then disappeared behind the Iron Curtain."

"As early as 1944 the Civil Service Commission loyalty board had found Wheeler unfit for government service because of his membership in the Communist party. The record is replete with evidence of espionage on his part."

"On Oct. 4, 1944, the then Sen. Harry Truman, who was a candidate for the vice presidency on the Democrat ticket, wrote a three-page letter to the Civil Service Commission denouncing the commission in the strongest language for the procedure they followed in ordering the dismissal of Wheeler."

"In October of 1945, after Harry Truman became President, the Civil Service Commission reversed itself and ordered Wheeler reinstated."

McCarthy opened his rebuttal to a speech by Truman last week by calling Truman's reference to him "a completely untruthful attack upon me."

The senator said Truman's definition of "McCarthyism" was "identical word for word... with the definition adopted by the Communist Daily Worker, which originated the term."

Reviewing parts of Truman's speech, McCarthy said they indicated the ex-President backed down from his first flat denial of Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell's charges in the Harry Dexter White case. Brownell charged Truman promoted White in government service despite FBI reports that he was a Soviet spy.

## Reds Ignore Austria Plea

LONDON (AP)—The United States, Britain and France called on Russia once again Wednesday to join them in an effort to conclude an Austria independence treaty. The Soviets have turned a deaf ear to all such Western proposals in recent months.

The British Foreign Office said the Western Allies delivered new notes to the Kremlin Wednesday morning on the Austrian question. A spokesman declined to reveal precisely what the notes contained.

Informed Western officials, however, reported the Allies have proposed the Big Four powers consider the Austrian treaty question through diplomatic channels. In the past the four powers have negotiated at conferences of the deputy foreign ministers.

The notes answered Russia's last reply in September to Western efforts to get the long-stalled negotiations moving again. Russia then declined to attend a proposed deputy foreign ministers meeting and said further discussions would be carried on through formal diplomatic channels.

The Russians also have side-stepped recent Western attempts to arrange a foreign ministers conference to consider the German and Austrian questions.

Negotiations on the treaty which would end the four power occupation of Austria first began in 1947. The deputy foreign ministers have held more than 260 meetings without reaching agreement.

## Civil War Vet Hospitalized

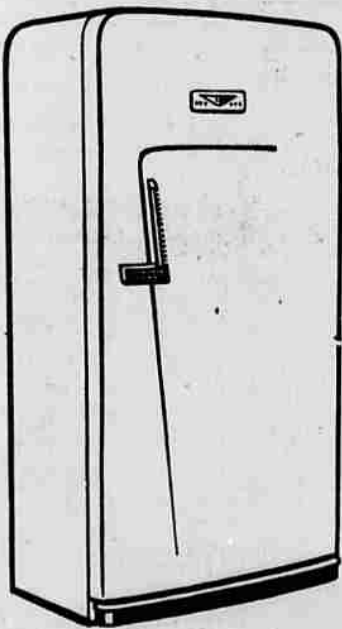

## Fighting In Korea Seen Ended—Now

TOKYO (AP)—Top American officials in the Orient are convinced there will be no more fighting in Korea unless something

touches off World War III.

At the same time, they see little chance now for peaceful unification of Korea since the treaty signed this week between Red China and North Korea in effect moved China's border southward almost to parallel 38.

South Korea's President Syngman Rhee has threatened to order his 16 American-trained divisions northward unless a peace conference makes progress toward uniting his country by Jan. 27—six months after the Korean armistice was signed.

But generals and diplomats who have visited Korea during the past month say Rhee will not reopen the war.

They cite these reasons for their belief:

1. Rhee has been told the United States will withdraw its forces from Korea if he rekindles the war.

2. ROK forces have only enough ammunition for six days if the United States shuts off the quarter-master supply faucet.

3. Rhee wouldn't risk losing almost a billion dollars in U.S. aid.

It is generally understood in higher circles here that responsible United States representatives have made it plain to Rhee that Uncle

Sam is not interested in fighting another war in Korea, especially a war of containment.

Therefore, it is understood, Rhee has been told if he reopens the Korean conflict which was stopped on July 27, the U.S. would get out. The only thing that would make the U.S. troops go into action in Korea again would be for the Communists to start shooting. In that case American doughboys, sailors and airmen would fight again.

But the fighting would not be restricted to Korea, top officials say.
