Historical Society To Set Program

Winter programs of the Klamath County Historical Society will start Wednesday evening, Dec. 2 in the chamber of commerce rooms with Mrs. Ken (Edith) McLeod, member of the society and authority on Indian lore and artifacts to present the program.

She will speak on one of her hobbies, Klamath Indian Basketry. Probably no one in Southern Oregon, according to Hal Ogle, president of the society, is better informed on this subject than Mrs. McLeod. She has recently added more than 200 Klamath and Modoc baskets, gathered in this community in the 1880's, to her already extensive collection.

These baskets, brought from the East recently, are in perfect condition, and society members voice appreciation that through Mrs. McLeod's interest and knowledge, the line collection has been returned to the country of its origin.

In her talk she will cover the original owners and how the woven relics were gathered and carried to the extreme eastern part of the United States. She will give also, the basketry materials, patterns, names of designs and names of the various shapes. A few of the baskets will be on display at the meeting.

Mrs. McLeod also has an excellent collection of printed volumes on basketry and the history of this area.

Anyone interested in the local Indian culture of the past will find this an exceptional opportunity to learn more about it. The public is cordially invited and urged to attend.
